On November 6th, 2019, I was assigned to the school district as the school resource officer. At approximately at 0705hr I was emailed by Mike Woodlock (Principal of GDRHS) regarding a student that allegedly made some alarming statements at his job the night before. These statements may possibly have to do with the high school. Mr. Woodlock was given this information via email on 11/5/2019 by the shift supervisor Sgt. Mead and the patrolman who took the report (11GRO-505-OF) Det. Mike Lynn. The student's name is [REDACTED] and he is a junior at GDRHS.

Upon arrival, I spoke with Mr. Woodlock about [REDACTED] and what happened the night before. At 0928hr myself and Mr. Woodlock had [REDACTED] come down to Mr. Woodlock's office so we could speak with him about what he was overheard saying. The manager had reported that a few people overheard him saying disturbing statements to a co-worker at the [REDACTED] the night before. It was reported that [REDACTED] was talking about some unusual things that made some staff members feel uncomfortable. What made staff and his manager uncomfortable and nervous was that [REDACTED] was speaking with another employee on 11/3/2019 about a "hit list" and killing "13 people" and that he "wanted to go out in a blaze of glory in a shootout with police".

Mr. Woodlock gave [REDACTED] a chance to respond to these accusations. [REDACTED] stated that he did say these things but it was just his dark humor, that people misread the conversation, and that he did not mean any of it. [REDACTED] also stated that he would never intentionally hurt anyone and that it is all a big misunderstanding. [REDACTED] also stated that he did not mean to cause any issues with the comments that he made and that he was very sorry.

Mr. Woodlock then explained to [REDACTED] due to these types of comments that he would like to search his back pack for any weapons or any contraband that he should not have. Mr. Woodlock also stated that the reason why he is doing this is for the safety and security of the high school and the students in it. He also told [REDACTED] that his mother and father would both be notified of this situation and would ask one of them to come pick him up so he can further investigate the situation.

Mr. Woodlock with [REDACTED] permission did a check of [REDACTED] back pack. Before checking his backpack, Mr. Woodlock asked [REDACTED] if there was anything in it that he should know about before going through it. [REDACTED] first stated that he did think so but there might be. He continued to try and remember if anything was inside his back pack or on him. Once Mr. Woodlock started to take things out of the back pack and asked [REDACTED] again as he was going through every pocket of the back pack if he was going to find anything. [REDACTED] finally said yes there could be a pocket knife in that pocket. As Mr. Woodlock emptied that pocket, he found the pocket knife [REDACTED] was talking about, right where he said it would be.

Mr. Woodlock found [REDACTED] wallet in the backpack and asked what was in his wallet; [REDACTED] gave him permission to go through that as well. While going through [REDACTED] wallet, Mr. Woodlock found a credit card knife in the wallet. I took possession of both knives and measured the lengths of them. The pocket knife he found was 6-1/4inches long fully extended with the blade alone being 2-3/4 inches. The credit card knife was 3-1/2inches long when closed with the blade alone being 2-1/2inches. With the credit card knife fully extended it is 5-1/2inches long.

I then told [REDACTED] that the comments he made could be taken as threats and the way that he said it could make people think that he really wanted to follow through with it and that he could be charged with a crime for that and for bringing the knives to school. I also explained to him that you can't go around saying things like this

and then have these knives on his person and another in his back pack and then say it's his dark humor.

After speaking with [REDACTED], his father [REDACTED] and his mother [REDACTED], I reached out to the Diversion Program Director (ADA) Melissa Conroy Hartford and asked what her thoughts were on this case and what's the possibility of this being a diversion case. The program director stated she would like to hear a more detailed run down what happened from myself and Mr. Woodlock.

After she spoke with me and Mr. Woodlock the director stated that she would lean more towards charging him and not making this a diversion case due to the seriousness of what he did. She also stated that she would like to talk with the ADA's at Ayer District Court and talk about PTP with the focus on his mental health would be the way she stated she would like to go.

The charges would be Chapter 269 Section 10A, Carrying a Dangerous Weapon on School Grounds and Chapter 275 Section 2, Threat to Commit a Crime and as said above she wanted to talk with the other DA's to come up with a plan to help get [REDACTED] the services he needs.

I spoke with [REDACTED] mother and father and asked them both if it would be possible for me to take his phone and any other electronic devices to see if there was a list or not or any other red flags and or things of that nature. [REDACTED], [REDACTED] dad signed the Consent Search of Electronic Media Device form and gave his gaming computer tower without hesitation. [REDACTED], [REDACTED] mother did the same and handed over [REDACTED] cell phone. Both electronic devices are currently at the FBI Office (FBI RCFL) in Chelsea MA being looked at by their analyst to make sure [REDACTED] devices have nothing alarming on them. I should hopefully be receiving the report and devices back shortly.

Jim Schwab of the FBI-RCFL and he stated that there was no list and no threats found on either of [REDACTED] devices that he checked. Jim also stated that he will sending me a report of what he found on the devices shortly. I will send them to court once I have them in my possession. I returned [REDACTED] devices to him at his father's house on 11/23/2019. I still have both weapon's in Groton Police Department's evidence room.
