The Mansfield Division of Police is experiencing increased violent gun crime. The issues/challenges to be addressed includes gun violence such as Felonious Assault, Shooting into a Habitation and Homicides. Additional issues include increased crime analysis, information gathering/sharing, and community engagement to better address gun violence and the targeting of high risk offenders and geographic hot spots. In response to these issues and challenges, the Mansfield Division of Police looks to enhance an existing evidence-based strategy by supplementing current efforts through the addition of technology /equipment to address current and new target areas experiencing these crimes. Safety is important to the well-being of residents in our community and requires the leadership of the police department and the engagement of the community to address the crime problems identified. \*

In 2015 Mansfield Police began an evidence-based Focused Deterrence project to identify violent gun crime offenders within the city. This resulted in a reduction of gun crime over the next few years. However, in 2020 with the COVID-19 Pandemic raging and the Focus Deterrence Project on hold to decrease person-to-person interactions, "Felonious Assaults involving Guns" increased 75% while "Shooting into a Habitation" increased 85.7%. "Overall Gun Crimes" in the city increase of 39.8% as compared to 2019. This increased trend continued as "Overall Gun Crimes were up 100% the first 4 months of 2021 as compared to the same time period in 2020. However, this one mile square area is small and does not allow us to cover all the major areas of gun violence. Especially, given that the criminal element responsible for these gun crimes are constantly on the move, often resulting in crucial areas of the city not being addressed due to the current limited coverage area.

The City of Mansfield, Ohio is the county seat for Richland County, a mostly rural area with a population of over 126,000 residents. Mansfield covers nearly 31 square miles and is a typical mid-west blue collar community with an approximate population of 47,000 residents in 2019. The City of Mansfield is the largest city in Richland County and the largest city between Cleveland and Columbus, sitting on Interstate 71, a major highway traversing several states. Mansfield's poverty rate is at 23.8% as compared to the poverty rate across the state of Ohio which is 14.9%. This means Mansfield has a dramatically higher than average percentage of residents below the poverty line when compared to the rest of Ohio. This issue, no doubt, has helped fuel the increase in violent crime in our area. Mansfield's demographics show 70.8% White, 21.6% Black or African American, 5.7% two or more races and 1% Asian. Mansfield has shown a decline in growth of 2.3% over the past 10 years. \*

The Mansfield Division of Police is currently operating evidence-based violence reduction strategies as part of the U.S. Justice Department Project Safe Neighborhoods initiative. We not only utilize Shotspotter to inform officers of gun shots within 60 seconds

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improving response times/follow-up investigations; but we have in place a Focused Deterrence Project supported by numerous local community leaders, Neighborhood Watch Groups, City Schools and several law enforcement and judicial agencies. The 2015 evidence-based Focused Deterrence project resulted in a reduction of gun crime over the next few years, while the recent implementation of ShotSpotter gun detection system has reduced overall gun crimes significantly within the first 6 months of implementation. \*

In March 2021, Mansfield PD implemented Shotspotter gun detection system in a 1 mile square area. Since it's implementation, the same gun crimes mentioned previously have decreased with "Felony Assaults involving Guns" down 75%, "Shooting into a Habitation" down 66.7% and "Overall Gun Crime" down of 56.4% from May to October 2021. The recent implementation of ShotSpotter gun detection system has, also, resulted in saving the lives of two gunshot victims who were shot in the leg during two separate shootings. In each instance, responding officers were able to apply a tourniquet, stopping the profuse bleeding from an artery. \*

To maximize the impact of the existing efforts, the planned enhancements/expansions are targeted and employ evidence-based practices which will amplify successes. For example, within the first 6 months of Shotspotter implementation, gun crimes were significantly reduced in those areas. Also, after beginning implementation of the strategies in 2021, lessons learned and up to date crime analysis will help to guide the most effective use of the additional funding from the Ohio Violent Crime Reduction Program. For example, success in reducing crime in a targeted area may result in displacement of crime to a new area. Data-driven decision-making will inform the department to deploy the technology and/or personnel in the most effective and efficient ways in their efforts to reduce violent crime.\*

The Mansfield Division of Police is looking to retain and expand a previous PSN project that addressed violent gun crime within our city. Currently, our Shotspotter gunshot detection system cover a 1 square mile area of the city. We are looking to retain that 1 mile of coverage as well as to enhance the coverage an additional 2 square miles. This would allow us gunshot detection coverage in the most populated areas of the city as well as address those areas of gun violence that are not currently covered. \*

The Mansfield Division of Police has embraced collaboratives and partnerships with local criminal justice partners for decades. We have been a part of the county DV/SA Collaborative for at least 20 years and more recently, have formed partnerships with the US Marshals Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force and well as the Northern Ohio Violent Crime Consortium (NOVCC) which is comprised of 8 Ohio cities including Akron, Canton, Cleveland, Elyria, Lorain, Toledo and Youngstown. Mansfield has been an integral part of several specialty courts initiatives including Drug Court, Veterans Court, DV Court and Mental Health Court. All Mansfield Police officers attend a 40 hour Crisis Intervention Training (CIT) to better serve those community members with mental health issues. The Mansfield Division of Police recognizes that their success in reducing violent crime and strengthening understanding of the community is dependent on inclusion of a wide range of stakeholders. \*

The Mansfield Division of Police is committed to developing effective relationships with residents, understanding their needs and priorities, and effectively communicating efforts to reduce crime. The City of Mansfield/Mansfield Division of Police has received numerous grants, totaling tens of millions of dollars, over the past 35 years and has extensive experience in managing and reporting on grant funding. A separate grant account will be managed by the city's Finance Department using the "New World" system, a software operating system with quarterly reporting and draw-downs completed by the Grant Project Director. Mansfield Division of Police will rely on its success to ensure the project is kept on target and meets its objectives. Examples of partnerships include a nationally acclaimed and state award winning Community Policing Parole Partnership; specialized Courts with Mansfield police officers participating; the METRICH Drug Taskforce, a ten-county drug task force (largest in Ohio) serving area residents since the mid 1980's with its home office in Mansfield; and the local United States Marshal's Fugitive Taskforce or NOVFTF. \*

She is a member of the Richland County Domestic Violence/Sexual Assault Collaboration Board, Past President of the Ohio Crime Prevention Association, NOVCC Executive Committee member and holds a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration. She has served as a Peer Reviewer for OCJS and BJA over the past 10+ years. In 2017, she earned and was awarded the Division's "Legion of Merit" for her "distinguished police service" in recognition of her grant writing and managing efforts..\*

The project's partners are committed to developing effective relationships with the community. LE agencies and community leaders see the need and priority of the community and that technologies are extremely helpful in combating crime trends. Collaborative enforcement efforts are helpful to reducing crime and increasing public safety. The involved agencies recognize that they cannot "arrest their way out of crime" and are dependent on the community to join in their quest to have safer communities and neighborhoods. The mission of the Mansfield Division of Police is just one example of this commitment - "It is the mission of the Mansfield Police Department to preserve life, protect property and reduce crime within our community. We are a professional organization dedicated to our core values of Integrity, Honesty, Respect, Professionalism, and Self-Discipline. We are committed to improving the quality of life through Community Partnerships with the citizens of Mansfield." \*

The Mansfield Division of Police instituted a Community Policing philosophy to the city in the early 1990's in an effort to improve police and community relationships as well as to establish "ownership" for officers of identified areas or beats. As the years have passed, the Division expanded on that initiative and philosophy to successfully implement a "Community Policing Partnership involving local city and county agencies. Through a coordinated and effective effort that included state award winning CP initiatives in 1999 to the present, those same partnerships exist today and continues to thrive due to the belief that a collaborative response inclusive of all stakeholders will yield the best possible outcomes in creating safer communities. \*

The Mansfield Division of Police established a community policing philosophy in the early 1990' s in an effort to reduce crime in neighborhoods by assigning officers to a Zone/Sector, thus, giving the, "ownership" of the area and the ability to address ongoing problems. Through a coordinated the partnership between local LE agencies and the court system, this initiative will continue to seek ways to positively impact violent gun crimes plaguing our city. Mansfield Police will act as the Board Chair and seek input from other stakeholders based on their service to the community. For example: Prosecutors, Law Directors Office and Courts will assist with ensuring repeat violent offenders are given acceptable incarceration terms ; APA will assist in locating identified violent offenders and NW will provide feedback on the project and it's initiatives to reduce violent gun crime. \*
