Jury indicts five Indians on gun charges

WICHITA, Kan. (P) - A federal grand jury indicted five American Indians yesterday on charges of possession and interstate transportation of illegal firearms and explosives.

The grand jury returned a 10count indictment affirming previous charges against the accused. who were arrested Sept. 10 when a station wagon caught fire and exploded on the Kansas Turnpike near Wellington.

Indicted were Darlene P. Nichois, 20, Shawnee, Okla.; Bernadine Nichols, 21, Pine Ridge, S.D.; Keith DeMarrias, 22, no permanent address; Norman Charles, 19, Rosebud, S.D., and Robert Eugene Rodibeau, 28, Pine Ridge.

Bond was set at \$75,000 for Robideau and Charles; \$25,000 for DeMarrais, and \$7,500 each for the two women.

Darlene Nichols, the commonlaw wife of American Indian Movement leader Dennis Banks, had posted bond on the earlier charges and remained free.

Federal agents said the station wagon carrying the Indians from Rosebud to Shawnee contained hand grenades and firearms with obliterated serial numbers.

The station wagon caught fire after its muffler fell off and heat finally ignited its flooring or some of the explosives.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. (NYT) — El Servicio Secreto todavía no ha podido localizar a un ex-convicto armado que el mes pasado, en relación con un grupo disidente indígena, posiblemente trató de organizar un atentado contra el Presidente Gerald Ford durante una gira de éste al Estado de Oklahoma.

La información fue suministrada por Rex D. Davis. director de la Oficina de Ta-

baco, Alcohol y Armas de Fuego del Departamento de Hacienda. .

En las últimas semanas, Davis ha informado al Servicio Secreto — también dependiente de Hacienda — de dos aparentes intentos de magnicidio.

En el caso de Oklahoma, no se dio a conocer el nombre del ex - recluso; un soplón del bajo mundo informó a Davis que un hombre que ha estado dos veces en prisión viajó a Oklahoma para establecer contacto con el Movimiento Indio Norteamericano - un grupo impugnador — con el aparente propósito de provocar disturbios durante la gira del Presidente.

Davis dijo que se sabe que el delincuente iba armado con dos fusiles de alto poder y

una metralleta.

James Burke, funcionario del Servicio Secreto, dijo que hay indicios que la presencia del ex-recluso tiene relación con un incidente ocurrido cerca de Oklahoma City, a principios de septiembre pasado y en visperas de una visita (C) 1975 The New York Times News Service. de Ford.

En aquella ocasión, al investigar el incendio y explosión de una camioneta guavín estacionada cerca de una autopista, hallaron en los restos del vehiculo fusiles, bombas de mano, pistolas y armas automáticas.

Una investigación condujo al arresto de Darlene Nichols, de veinte años amiga de Dennis Banks, líder del Movimiento Indio Norteamericano.

El otro caso es menos importante: se refiere a un alcohólico y enfermo mental, Ralph Bates, de treinta y siete años, vecino de Belleville, Illinois, quien ofreció a un agente del Servicio Secreto infiltrado en círculos del bajo mundo veinticuatro mil dólares (trescientos mil pesos) por matar a Ford.

El agente arrestó a Bates; éste aceptó someterse voluntariamente a tratamiento en instituciones del gobierno.
