Monolith Update

On the afternoon of Wednesday, December 2, 2020, the City of Atascadero received reports from hikers of a steel Monolith or Obelisk structure at the top of Pine Mountain in Stadium Park.

As of early this morning, the Monolith had disappeared. The City has received the actual video that has surfaced on social media showing a group of men from out of the area removing the Monolith and replacing it with a plywood cross. The video shows them replacing the structure and talking amongst themselves.

"We are upset that these young men felt the need to drive 5 hours to come into our community and vandalize the Monolith. The Monolith was something unique and fun in an otherwise stressful time," said Mayor Heather Moreno.

The Atascadero Police Department has not received any reports to date that the Monolith had been removed and/ or stolen. Currently, the Atascadero Police Department is reviewing the video and looking into this incident further. We will provide updated information as soon as it's available.

The steel 3-sided structure stood about 10 ft. tall and appeared to weigh an estimated 200 pounds. The area of Stadium Park offers a 2 mile looping trail up to the top or you can take a more challenging trail with a higher level of difficulty to the top that would be about a 30-minute hike. The altitude of Pine Mountain sits at 1300 ft.

and there is no vehicle access to bring something that large to the top. The City owns and maintains 75 acres of the Stadium Park area and the five-acre entrance is owned and maintained by the Atascadero Land Preservation Society (ALPS). At this time, neither the City nor the ALPS have any information on how the structure found its way to the top of the mountain or who placed it there.

Rachelle,

Would it be appropriate for me to bring this matter up at personal considerations Tuesday and offer to be on a task force with the Mayor or other member as appropriate to vet this offer and work with city staff on it? Our unexpected moment of fame was more like 15 seconds than 15 minutes, so I'm not sure it is enough to attract the funding that a stable monolith sculpture would require, but it seems a low-risk opportunity to add a tourist attraction to our community, even if its just a novelty item.

I actually rather like the Pine Mountain location for that reason despite inaccessibility that will exclude a lot of people -- having to hike up to it adds to the mystique, and hikers could celebrate their treks at many nearby locations, including Wild Fields, Sylvester's, or Dead Oak Brewing, or Malibu Brew for the health-conscious ones. Terrie could make good use of a steady flow of Instagram posts tagged to the Atascadero Monolith from randomly sourced visitors. Also, that's not land that can be used for other recreational purposes, and putting a sculpture up there won't interfere with current uses. Funding would need to include camera installation so that APD could check activity there without having to hike up, obviously.

I do still wonder who was the original installer. It would have to be someone already familiar with that location.

Glad to hear back from you Susan.

No, we are not the originator's of the monolith, but we do appreciate what we feel it represents. We do believe that the monoliths are from disparate auteurs, and as such even with few numbers they imply a movement to simple beauty, which many perceive as an ode to new future that integrates disparate elements (technology and nature) than an inscrutable enigma. I'd thought the monuments were a cute phenomenon until the Atascadero one was taken down, which changes the light in which they are cast.
