We have included the following records responsive to your request specifically regarding Joseph M. Rangel from 2008-2018.

- The discharge of a firearm at a person by a peace officer (Rangel) —
 The shooting involving Joseph Rangel occurred outside the city of Citrus Heights and multiple agencies responded to the City of Roseville to assist the Roseville Police Department. As a result, the Citrus Heights Police Department does not hold the primary crime report for this incident.
- A use of force by a peace officer resulting in death, or great bodily injury –
 No records exist responsive to your request.
- A sustained sexual assault involving a peace officer and a member of the public –
 No records exist responsive to your request.
- A sustained finding of dishonesty or false statements by a peace officer —
 Records responsive to your request are attached, to include the specific settlement agreement
 requested with allowable redactions to protect confidential medical or personal financial
 information.

OFFICER INVOLVED SHOOTING; DURAN; OCTOBER 25, 2013

This office has completed its review of the October 25, 2013 shooting of Samuel Duran by **Citrus Heights Officer Joe Rangel**. Several other members of law enforcement also fired shots at Duran during the incident. The review was based on Roseville Police Department report number 298-13-011207 with reference to applicable California Law.

On October 25, 2013 Samuel Duran was a parolee-at-large (PAL). Duran was on parole for convictions of assault with personal use of a deadly weapon (PC 245(a)(1)) and attempted car-jacking (PC 664/215). Both of those occurred in Placer County and both convictions are "strikes" under California Law. Duran was a validated Sureno gang member and has had numerous contacts with members of law enforcement, primarily Roseville PD. Duran and his extended family have resided in the Thieles neighborhood of Roseville for many years. It is well known throughout the local law enforcement community that Duran, his extended family and his fellow gang members control the neighborhood through fear and intimidation. Roseville Police sent out an Officer Bulletin on Duran on December 8, 2012, when Duran was paroled, which warned the law enforcement community about the violent nature of Duran. The bulletin warned officers to be extra careful. Again on September 5, 2013 officers were warned of Duran who has a history of carjacking and assaulting officers. Both bulletins had pictures of Duran.

On October 25, 2013, Roseville Police Officers Ryland, Sidebottom and HSI Agent located the Duran riding a bicycle at the intersection of Sixth Street and B Street in the City of Roseville. All three officers were in a vehicle at the time. Ryland and Sidebottom recognized the Duran as a Parolee at Large. Sidebottom exited the vehicle and attempted to stop Duran, but he fled on his bicycle.

Duran fired at Officer Ryland and Agent l	with a .45 caliber handgun and struck
Agent Kennedy in the leg as Agent	was walking up the driveway. Immediately
after shooting Agent Duran fled	through the backyard of Windsor. The
call went out that an officer was down and	numerous officers from many agencies around

the area responded to the Thieles neighborhood. The officers held their positions and additional officers eventually came to create a perimeter around the area where they suspected Duran to be hiding. Duran continued to flee from the Officers.

Additional units arrived to assist in the apprehension of Duran. These officers were advised via radio and computer about Duran, which included his criminal history and his violent nature. When they arrived they were given pictures of Duran including his distinctive tattoos. They were additionally informed that Duran had already shot and wounded one officer. Officers eventually located the Duran in a house. A family of three was home at the time, which included an infant. SWAT members were at the two-side of the house (south side) looking for Duran inside the house when Duran opened fire on the SWAT officers. One of the SWAT officers, Officer Szeto, was shot in the jaw at point blank range. His fellow officers extricated him from the scene and he was treated on the front lawn of the residence. Other SWAT members opened fire on Duran but he managed to escape to another part of the house. Duran confronted, threatened and assaulted the residents. They were able to barricade themselves in a bedroom where they escaped through a side window. Thereafter Duran would shoot at various times at officers and they would return fire. The perimeter of the house was maintained, and after several hours, Officers convinced Duran to surrender. Duran was not seriously injured.

Duran is charged with three counts of attempted murder on a peace officer and several more counts of assault with a semi-automatic firearm on a peace officer. Defendant is also charged with residential burglary, criminal threats and false imprisonment on the family members of the house he broke into and barricaded himself in.

During the stand-off, numerous officers fired at Duran, including Officer Rangel. At this time all law enforcement officers had a "green light" to fire at Duran who had shown by his actions to be a significant threat to officers. This was after Duran had shot point-blank and wounded both Officer Kennedy and Officer Szeto. It was also after Duran had ran into many backyards and one house where a family of three was present. Duran at that time had indicated no interest in surrendering.

California Law provides that Homicide (or attempted) is justifiable as to officers when the homicide is necessarily committed in overcoming actual resistance to the execution of some legal process, or in the discharge of any other legal duty. <u>Penal Code section</u> 196(2).

Additionally, <u>CALCRIM 505</u> provides that Homicide is justifiable when:

- 1. The person reasonably believed that someone else was in imminent danger of being killed or suffering great bodily injury
- 2. The person reasonably believed that the immediate use of deadly force was necessary to defend against the danger
- 3. The person used no more force than was reasonably necessary to defend against the danger

After a thorough review, it is my opinion that Officer Rangel did not commit any crime on October 25, 2013. The information given to the officers and the other officers was that Duran was armed and dangerous. Officer Rangel as well as the other officers believed that Duran posed a serious and imminent threat to the officers and to any neighbors and the many on lookers who were present in the neighborhood. Given circumstances at the time coupled with what the officers were told about Duran, the officer's actions were reasonable given the situation.

No action by the District Attorney's Office is recommended against Officer Rangel or any other member of law enforcement who fired their weapon during this incident.

CITRUS HEIGHTS POLICE DEPARTMENT By: CSI

On 10/25/13, at approximately 1900, I was contacted by Sgt. Courtney requesting I
respond to 1600 Vernon in Roseville. Sgt. Courtney requested I contact CSI to respond with
me. I contacted CSI and requested she respond to the police department. At approximately
1939, CSI and I were en route to the command post located at 1600 Vernon in Roseville. W
arrived on scene at approximately 2000. We met with Sgt. Courtney and were advised that he
wanted us there for standby purposes. CSI was released from the scene at approximately
2247.

At approximately 2300 hours, I was advised that Officer Rangel had fired his weapon. He was brought to the command post and I photographed Officer Rangel. I then walked with Officer Rangel over to the area that Roseville's CSI was processing out Officers that were involved in the shooting. I photographed Officer Rangel again, along with his weapon and his ammunition. Sgt. Courtney advised that Officer Rangel's weapon would be released back to him; however, his ammunition would be confiscated. I counted the twenty two (22) bullets from magazine one (5). Twenty eight (28) rounds were counted from the second magazine (6).

Later I was advised by Sgt. Courtney; Officer Rangel's rifle was taken as evidence along with the magazines and secured in the back of the Sgt's vehicle (-3, -4).

I cleared the scene at approximately 0133 with Sgt. Courtney. All evidence was taken back to the Citrus Heights Police Department and booked into evidence.

SUBJECT:

I/A 13-008: Shooting Review

PROBLEM STATEMENT:

On October 25, 2013 at approximately 1507 hours, Officer Rangel was in his assigned marked patrol vehicle in the area of Antelope Road and Roseville Road when he was dispatched to the City of Roseville to assist Roseville Police Department with an officer involved shooting incident. A Federal Agent was shot by an adult male who fled on foot in the area of Windsor Drive. The suspect was considered armed and dangerous.

Officer Rangel and Detective Kissam were at a perimeter position at Drive. They were facing the west side of a home where it was believed the suspect was inside.

Officer Rangel had an obstructed view of the backyard of the location, Hampton Drive, as he could partially see through a damaged wooden fence. The fence was leaning, at approximately 45 degrees in a westward direction toward Officer Rangel.

After hearing gunfire coming from the direction of Hampton Drive, Officer Rangel fired four rounds from his M-4 rifle. All rounds struck the #3 side of the residence at Hampton Drive. Officer Rangel immediately transmitted on the RPD radio channel that the suspect was running southbound. Other officers, positioned on the south and east perimeter positions transmitted that the suspect was not running southbound and he was inside the Hampton Drive residence. Officer Kissam did not see the suspect at the time of Officer Rangel discharged his rifle. Officers on the perimeter did not see the suspect outside in the area where Officer Rangel fired his rifle. Witness Officers and a Sergeant stated Officer Rangel made statements he was shot at by the suspect. This conflicted with information provided by Officer Rangel.

INVESTIGATION

FINDING

After a critical internal review of the Roseville Police Department report (298-13-11207), related documents, and evidence associated with the shooting by Citrus Heights Police Officer Joseph Rangel, I find that the shooting justifiably falls within Lexipol policy 304.1.1 (a) and 304.1.1(b) which states:

- (a) An officer may use deadly force to protect himself/herself or others from what he/she reasonably believes would be an immediate threat of death or serious bodily injury.
- (b) An officer may use deadly force to effect the arrest or prevent the escape of a suspected felon when the officer has probable cause to believe that the suspect has committed or intends to commit a felony involving the inflicting or threatened inflicting of serious bodily injury or death and the officer reasonably believes that there is an imminent or future potential risk of serious bodily injury or death to others if the suspect is not immediately apprehended. Under such circumstances, a verbal warning should precede the use of deadly force where feasible.

Because the shooting is within policy, there is sufficient evidence to support the finding of Exonerated.

Summary:

On October 25, 2013 at approximately 1800 hours, Lieutenant Ford assigned me the shooting review and administrative investigation of Officer Joseph Rangel. This investigation was regarding the discharge of his department issued rifle during an incident that occurred outside the jurisdiction of the City of Citrus Heights.

Investigation:

The following is a summary and review of the events that took place on October 25, 2013.

Officer Rangel was assigned to the Patrol Division on Team 1 working day shift. His assigned work days and hours were Wednesday thru Friday from 0600 to 1830 hours. Officer Rangel arrived to work on time and was dressed in full police uniform (Class B) per Lexipol departmental policy 1046.3.2.

At approximately 1507 hours, Officer Rangel was in his assigned marked patrol vehicle in the area of Antelope Road and Interstate 80 when he was dispatched to the City of Roseville to assist Roseville Police Department with an officer involved shooting incident. An officer was shot by an adult, Hispanic male who had fled on foot in the area of Windsor Drive, in the City of Roseville. The suspect was considered armed and dangerous.

Officer Rangel arrived at the area of Cirby Way and Riverside Avenue at 1520 hours. He took a perimeter position at the BMX race track until hearing additional officers were needed at the Command Post located at 1600 Vernon Street. At the Command Post, Officer Rangel teamed up with Detective Joseph Davis, Officer James Garing, and Detective Kane Kissam. Lieutenant Turcotte directed all four to 6th Street and Mayfair Drive to assist Roseville PD with securing a Tactical Command Post. After arriving at the location the CHPD personnel were teamed up with the Sacramento County

Sheriff's Department Special Enforcement Detail, including Deputy Steve Murphy who was interviewed in this investigation. Refer to Exhibit #16.

While positioned near the intersection of Mayfair Drive and 6th Street, Officer Rangel and other personnel assisted with the evacuation of two adults and one child who had fled from a home located at Hampton Drive. This was where the suspect was believed to have entered prior to the citizens evacuating the home. Officer Rangel and other law enforcement personnel directed the citizens to the Tactical Command Post.

Officer Rangel and Detective Kissam then took a perimeter position near the of Hampton Drive. This was directly west of the location in an adjacent side yard located at Mayfair Street. They both lay prone between the Mayfair house and 6th Street.

Officer Rangel and Detective Kissam were wearing their protective helmets and they were armed with rifles and duty handguns. Officer Rangel's rifle was his assigned M4 SWAT rifle. This rifle has the capability to be fired in both automatic and semi-automatic modes. Both had their patrol rifles pointed in an eastward direction toward the of the home at 600 Hampton Drive. They were positioned within a few feet of each other, side by side. Their positions were 15 to 20 yards distance from the target residence.

Detective Kissam had a view of the north fence line along 6th Street. He also had a view of the backyard of Mayfair Drive. His view of the location was obscured by a fence. Officer Kissam maintained concealment behind a broken wooden fence.

Officer Rangel was prone and to the right of Detective Kissam. He was wearing his eye glasses and he had a partial view of the backyard of Mayfair Drive. His view

Hampton Drive and the Mayfair Drive backyard. The fence was damaged with an approximate 12' section leaning at a 45 degree angle. The fence leaned in a westerly direction toward both officers. This provided an obstructed view allowing only a small portion of the target area to be seen by Officer Rangel. Officer Rangel stated in his interviews he could see a portion of the wall of the residence through a "V" created by the broken fence.




Viewpoint from a prone position where Officer Rangel discharged his rifle.

At approximately 1717 hours, after hearing gunfire coming from the target location, Officer Rangel discharged four rounds from his rifle. All rounds struck the of the target residence. There are no windows or doors on the #3 side of the home. Officer Rangel immediately transmitted on the RPD radio channel that the suspect was running southbound. Immediately after Rangel's radio transmission, RPD personnel, located on the south and east perimeter positions, transmitted that the suspect was not running southbound and he had gone back inside the target location.



After discharging his rifle, Officer Rangel and Detective Kissam moved back to a RPD Tactical Suburban at 6th Street and Mayfair Drive. Shortly after moving to this location, the Citrus Heights Police Department MRAP vehicle arrived. It was driven by Officer Miller. Sergeant Evans was the front passenger. The vehicle was also occupied by West Sacramento PD personnel. As the vehicle moved toward the target location, Officer Rangel ran alongside it unannounced and unknown to the driver. Officer Rangel

remained on the driver's side of the vehicle as it parked close to the target location on 6th Street. Officer Rangel requested his SWAT gear. As the MRAP vehicle was fully occupied, Officer Rangel could not enter inside. In an effort to help Officer Rangel, Officer Miller provided his own gear to him to wear. Officer Rangel announced to Sergeant Evans that he was involved in a shooting. He told Sergeant Evans that he was shot at by the suspect and he shot back at the suspect.

Officer Rangel remained outside the vehicle for several hours using the vehicle as cover. During this time. Officer Rangel telephoned

Dispatcher Okay.

Officer Rangel: All right.

Dispatcher You need your gear and then what was the first thing again?

Officer Rangel: I've shot, shots fired, I've been in a shooting.

Dispatcher Okay, I'll let the sergeant know, thanks.

Officer Rangel: That, that, that will be important later.

Dispatcher Okay. All right.

Officer Rangel: Okay.

Dispatcher All right. Bye-bye.

After Officer Rangel telephoned dispatch, he received a telephone call from Sergeant Perez. He told her he was involved in a shooting and he requested water. Officer Rangel later telephoned dispatch a second time. During this call he was transferred to Sergeant Dias at the Command Post. Officer Rangel notified Sergeant Dias that he was involved in a shooting.

Officer Rangel remained outside the MRAP tactical vehicle for several hours. During this time, he believes he left his eye glasses at the scene. The glasses were later

recovered on a vehicle parked along 6th Street. By the request of Sergeant Evans to replace Officer Rangel, Sergeant Lewis arrived at the MRAP. Officer Rangel was then relieved by Detective Tedford and directed to the Tactical Command Post, located at a church on 6th Street. At the church parking lot, Officer Rangel notified Lieutenant Russo that he had been in a shooting. Officer Rangel then provided Lieutenant Russo with a Public Safety Statement. While at the Tactical Command Post, Officer Rangel made comments to Officer Lombardo and Officer Garing about discharging his rifle.

Between 2130 hours and 2200 hours, Officer Rangel left the Tactical Command Post without notifying a supervisor. He walked to his parked vehicle and then to the Command Post at Vernon Street. Upon arrival, he contacted Sergeant Dias.

At 2320 hours, I admonished Officer Rangel explaining he was directed not to discuss the incident with anyone other than his legal representative. I also explained he was not on administrative leave and I or Lieutenant Ford would notify him if his status were to change. I conducted a firearm and ammunition count inside a building located at the Command Post. Present were Officer Rangel, Attorney

CHPD CSI Technician

and a RPD CSI Technician. The following items were observed in Officer Rangel's possession:

- One M4 Rifle with serial One unexpended .223 round in the chamber. One attached magazine with 22 unexpended rounds inside. One unattached magazine with 28 unexpended rounds inside.
- One Sig Sauer P226 .40 caliber duty firearm with serial unexpended one unexpended round in the chamber. One attached magazine had 12 unexpended rounds inside. Two unattached magazines had 12 unexpended rounds inside each. Both unattached magazines were located inside magazine holders on Officer Rangel's duty belt.
- One Taurus PT 145, a .45 caliber back up firearm with serial
 One unexpended round in the chamber. The attached magazine had 10 unexpended rounds inside. The firearm was secured on Officer Rangel's left ankle in an ankle holster.

All firearms, ammunition, and duty gear were photographed. Officer Rangel retained all firearms. The M4 rifle and ammunition were later secured as evidence by me prior to Officer Rangel leaving the Command Post and going off duty.

At 2325 hours, Placer County District Attorney and RPD Detective Phelps conducted a voluntary Public Safety Interview with Officer Rangel inside the building at the Command Post. Officer Rangel's attorney, and I monitored the interview. Officer Rangel stated he had fired four to six shots in an easterly direction and he pointed to his position on a map. He explained Officer Kissam

witnessed the shooting, as he was positioned on his He then provided the description of the suspect as aired on the radio prior to the shooting.

At 2350 hours, Officer Rangel met with Commander Christensen and Commander Anderson at the Command Post. He refused the assistance of Peer Support. I collected Officer Rangel's M4 rifle and ammunition as evidence and Officer Bayer-Evans transported Officer Rangel to the Citrus Heights Police Department to go off duty.


On October 26, 2013 at 1600 hours, CSI Technician and I met with RPD Detective Phelps at the crime scene to conduct a walk-thru and collect photographs of the scene. We noted damaged backyard fencing on the at Hampton Drive. The investigation revealed the damage occurred when tactical vehicles and officers removed the fence slats for better visibility into the yard of the target location. The damaged fence along the giving Officer Rangel visibility into the yard, was damaged previously to this incident. There was also a damaged fence at the northwest corner of the backyard at Mayfair Drive. This was the location where Officer Kissam and Officer Rangel at the time Officer Rangel discharged his rifle.



Four shell casings were located in the immediate area between 6th Street and the residence at Mayfair Drive. Photographs were taken of the shell casings and Detective Phelps was notified of the evidence. All casings were left in the location found and not disturbed. The photographs were booked into evidence by CSI technician



6th Street and Mayfair Drive where four expended shell casings were located.



During this interview Officer Rangel explained how he was dispatched to the incident and how he was assigned with a team to meet Roseville PD near the area where the suspect shot an officer. He explained how he obtained the suspect's physical description and how he believed the suspect was a gang member in possession of a firearm. Officer Rangel told investigators he was positioned near a Tactical Suburban with Officer Garing and SSD officers when he heard gunfire. In summary, Officer Rangel made reference to Officer Garing being new and inexperienced. He commented that he had to pull Officer Garing to the ground to prevent him from being injured by potential gunfire.

Officer Rangel explained how he saw a woman with a baby exit the target location. He stated, "Some of the SWAT cops tried to go up and guide her a little bit but she's just standin there. And, uh, I broke cover and I ran up and I grabbed her and I ran her back to Dan Blair and her husband followed and then I went back to join Kane."

Officer Rangel's description of the event was later corroborated by SSD Deputy Murphy during his interview. As SWAT approached the target house and the citizens with shields and protective equipment, Officer Rangel's decision making for leaving his position without protection is in question.

Officer Rangel explained how he took a concealed position next to Detective Kissam. He told investigators he was "pretty freaked out" due to not having safe cover at their position. He explained that he heard Roseville Command announce to all SWAT units there was now a green light on the suspect. He stated he understood the order to mean, "If you see the suspect take him out." He then explained he heard an exchange of gunfire and screaming over the radio. He said he had an obstructed view of the off the target location through a "V" shaped gap in the broken fence. He estimated his distance from the off the target location as 15 yards.

Officer Rangel told investigators he utilized his EO Tech sight on his rifle at the time he believed he saw the suspect, Anthony Duran. He described seeing the round part of the suspect's bald head and the upper part of his shoulder as the suspect quickly moved south across his obstructed field of view. Officer Rangel's sight picture was limited by the break in the fence. It was also limited by his use of his scope.

Officer Rangel believed he discharged 6 rounds at the suspect. He was unsure if his rifle was on automatic or semi-automatic at the time of the discharge and he was unsure if he fired two 3 round bursts. He told investigators he fired his rifle because he believed if the suspect did escape through the fence, he would kill Officer Kissam and himself. This reinforced his mindset at the time he discharged his firearm.

Officer Rangel said he made two transmissions on his portable radio to announce the suspect was running south. He then heard other units transmit that the suspect did not run south and that he was inside the target location. The Roseville Police Department report later revealed that the suspect had exited the of the home. At that time, the suspect ran toward the front driveway of the house just south of Hampton Dr. Officers fired on the suspect and the suspect immediately returned to the target location and went inside. This occurred just prior to Officer Rangel's discharge of his firearm.

After transmitting the suspect's direction of travel, Officer Rangel told investigators he observed Detective Kissam with his face down and his hands out to the side. He explained the detective had let go of his rifle and he thought Detective Kissam was hit by gunfire.

On October 29, 2013, at 1545 hours, I conducted a voluntary Administrative Interview with Officer Rangel inside an Investigations Division office at the Roseville Police Department. Lieutenant Ford and Officer Rangel's attorney were present. Prior to the interview, I served Officer Rangel with the Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation. I advised him of the confidentiality directive which he signed and acknowledged, and provided him a copy. The Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation has been affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #11. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A CD-ROM containing the interview has been affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #7.

During the interview, I utilized the Citrus Heights Police Department Interview Procedure form and explained there were no general allegations. I advised him that the interview would be recorded. Officer Rangel confirmed he understood the nature and scope of the investigation and understood the admonishment that he was ordered to answer all of my questions. I signed the Citrus Heights Police Department Interview Procedure form as did Officer Rangel. The signed Interview Procedure form and the dictated copy of the interview have been affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #11.

The goal of this interview was to answer several questions not asked during the earlier interview conducted by Roseville Police Department. While at the scene, Officer Rangel had told me he had lost his eye glasses. I needed to know if he was wearing his glasses at the time he discharged his rifle. Officer Rangel explained he had his glasses on when he fired his rifle and he believed he lost them sometime after the MRAP arrived on scene.

I asked Officer Rangel about his exact location when he discharged his rifle. I also attempted to have Officer Rangel identify other witnesses who may have seen the suspect at the time. Officer Rangel described his position and I determined it was the same area where we observed the .223 caliber casings on the ground. He could not identify other officers or other witnesses who may have seen the suspect at the time he fired his rifle.

Officer Rangel showed me, on a sketch provided earlier by Detective Kissam, where he was positioned at the time he discharged his rifle. He said he had a limited field of fire, but he knew where his bullets hit the house by observing the holes in the wall of the target location.

He was asked how he conducted notification after he fired his rifle at what he believed to be the suspect. He told me he did not utilize his radio. His reasoning for this was two-fold. He stated he wanted to limit radio traffic on the Roseville PD channel and he did not want to "freak out patrol" by making a notification on the CHPD radio channel.

He explained that he waited until after he was behind the MRAP vehicle before making several telephone calls. He stated he first called was safe. He then called dispatch to make notification to a supervisor and to obtain his SWAT gear.

Another call was made to CHPD dispatch to speak with Sergeant Dias. He was then transferred to Sergeant Dias and he explained he was in a shooting. He later received a telephone call from Sergeant Perez and he notified her that he was involved in a shooting.

He was asked if he had spoken to anyone regarding the incident. He said he had, but not in details. He explained that he had met with his SWAT team the night of October 28th, after the team had debriefed the incident. He made reference to everyone knowing he was involved in a shooting because it was placed in the department's watch log. He also said he only spoke about the shooting by using generalizations.

On October 29, 2013, I reviewed a copy of the CAD Police Call #RO132980212 from Roseville PD Detective Phelps. The copy was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #3. The report provided a time frame of events and it logged key information such as the suspect's description, which units were on scene, and when shots were fired. The log showed the residents evacuating the target location at 1713 hours. The log also showed shots fired at 1716 hours and a RPD Sergeant on scene (7S11) transmitting the suspect made it back inside. At 1735 hours, the log showed CHPD MRAP moving into position on the

On October 29, 2013, I reviewed a CHPD CAD Incident Report 131025117. The copy was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #4. The report showed Officer Rangel, call sign Adam 1, on scene at 1520 hours. It did not log Officer Rangel's activity at the time he discharged his rifle.

On October 29, 2013, I reviewed the radio transmission of the incident from Communications Senior Dispatcher The recording was taken from CHPD Channel Tac 1 starting on October 25, 2013 at 1633 hours. The CD-ROM containing the radio transmission was affixed to this investigation as an exhibit. The recording did not reveal information pertinent to Officer Rangel discharging his rifle.

On October 30, 2013, I interviewed Detective Kane Kissam in my office. Detective Kissam signed the Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #13 and a CD-ROM containing the interview has been affixed to this investigation as an exhibit.

Detective Kissam explained he was with Officer Rangel behind a Tactical Suburban at Mayfair and 6th Street when SSD breached the fence near the corner of their location. He and Officer Rangel were then requested by SSD to hold the position. He described he and Officer Rangel in a behind the broken fence with Officer Rangel's rifle barrel placed within 6" from his head. He described his view, the backyard of the target location, as limited by bushes inside the yard at 6 Mayfair Drive. He maintained a better view of the fence line along 6th Street and occasionally glanced over at the broken fence between the two yards.

Prior to Officer Rangel discharging his rifle, Detective Kissam observed Officer Rangel breathing heavily. He described the breathing as very rapid, huffing, and panting. He explained that he told Officer Rangel to calm his breathing down and Rangel replied,

"This is how I'm gonna kill you breathing". Officer Rangel then told Kissam he was okay.

Detective Kissam heard gunfire coming from what he believed to be the south and north sides of the target location just before Officer Rangel fired four rounds from his rifle. Kissam did not see the suspect or any movement prior to the shots and his attention was directed along 6th Street. He heard Rangel radio that the suspect was running south

and he asked Rangel what he was shooting at. Rangel replied, "See those holes right

there? Those are my shots right there."

When Detective Kissam was asked if anyone else witnessed the event, he mentioned SSD Deputy Murphy asked him about it shortly after Officer Rangel discharged his rifle. He explained Deputy Murphy asked him what Rangel was shooting at. Deputy Murphy's interview is affixed to this investigation.

On October 31, 2013 I interviewed Detective Kyle Tedford in my office. Detective Tedford signed the Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation form. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #15 and a CD-ROM containing the interview has been affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #7.

Detective Tedford explained he arrived on scene after Officer Rangel had discharged his firearm. He stated Officer Rangel did not speak to him about the event.

On November 1, 2013, I interviewed Sacramento County Sheriff's Department Deputy Steven Murphy in my office. Deputy Murphy provided a signed copy of the SSD Order to Cooperate with an Outside Agency Investigation. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #16.

Deputy Murphy related he was positioned between Mayfair Drive and Hampton Drive when he observed the citizens exit the target location. He shielded the female and brought her back toward the Tactical Command Post with the help of Officer Rangel. He then took cover behind a Placer County Tactical Suburban located at the intersection of 6th and Mayfair. He explained he had no view of the soft the target location and his distance away from Detective Kissam and Officer Rangel was approximately six to ten feet. His attention was directed toward 6th Street and the explained that he heard gunshots which he thought were coming from the saw Kissam looking at Rangel. He then checked with his SSD team and no one had seen any suspect movement at the time shots were fired. He told me there were several officers with views of the saw for the saw movement from the suspect. Deputy Murphy was convinced that if the suspect had fled out the sand ran south along the

he would have been seen by the many officers along 6th Street. Deputy Murphy never spoke to Officer Rangel after he discharged his rifle.

On November 1, 2013, I interviewed Sergeant James Evans in my office. Sergeant Evans signed the Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation form. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #17.

Sergeant Evans related he was in the front passenger seat of the MRAP when they drove up to the of the target location from the area of 6th Street and Mayfair Drive. He did not see Officer Rangel until after they had parked and taken a tactical position on the house. Sergeant Evans explained that Officer Rangel appeared when Officer Miller, the driver, opened his door. He heard Officer Rangel request his tactical gear and then heard Officer Rangel state, "That guy tried to shoot me. He was shooting at me". Sergeant Evans asked Officer Rangel, directly, if the suspect shot at him and he shot back. Officer Rangel confirmed this information and explained that he did not know if he hit the suspect. Sergeant Evans then telephoned Lieutenant Kinnan and suggested Officer Rangel should be pulled off line as he noticed Rangel appearing worried and stressed. Sergeant Evans observed several officers in the area. Sergeant Evans did not have any further conversations with Officer Rangel regarding his discharge of his firearm.

On November 3, 2013, I interviewed Officer Salvatore Lombardo in my office. Officer Lombardo signed the Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation form. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #18.

Officer Lombardo related he was at the Tactical Command Post when he saw Officer Rangel. He described Officer Rangel as looking distraught and tired. He said he was breathing heavy and sweating. He told me Officer Rangel told him he was shot at by the suspect and he shot back at the suspect. He also told him that Detective Kissam took cover and appeared shocked at being shot at. Officer Lombardo further explained that Officer Rangel told him he had seen the suspect poke his head from either a window or a sliding door and shoot in his direction when he shot back. Officer Rangel also told him he observed the Roseville officer get shot. According to Officer Lombardo, he was with Officer Rangel inside the church just prior to him disappearing. He later learned Officer Rangel was at the Command Post commenting that the SWAT team had left him. Officer Lombardo had no further interactions with Officer Rangel after he left the Tactical Command Post.

On November 7, 2013, I interviewed Sergeant Eric Dias in my office. Sergeant Dias signed the Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation form. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as an Exhibit #19.

Sergeant Dias confirmed he received a telephone call from Officer Rangel approximately one or two hours after he had learned a CHPD officer had discharged their firearm on scene. Officer Rangel advised him he had fired shots at the suspect and he requested he notify the Command Post. Sergeant Dias advised Officer Rangel to finish his assignment and then come back to the Command Post when relieved. He then

observed Officer Rangel at the Command Post an hour later. He explained Officer Rangel appeared to be acting normally.

On November 12, 2013, I interviewed Officer James Garing in my office. Officer Garing signed the Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation form. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #20

Officer Garing explained he was with Officer Rangel and Detective Kissam at 6th Street and Mayfair Drive. They were behind a Tactical SUV as cover when they heard gunfire. His description of the event differs from Officer Rangel's version as he did not remember being pulled to the ground by Officer Rangel. Officer Garing did not observe Officer Rangel discharge his rifle and he had no further contact with him until he met with him later at the Tactical Command Post. Officer Garing described Officer Rangel as appearing "glazed over" and looking "numb or shocked". He also remembered Officer Rangel quoting a scene from a movie, Heartbreak Ridge, referring to the sound of an AK-47. Officer Garing had no further contact with Officer Rangel.

On November 12, 2013, I interviewed Detective Joseph Davis in my office. Detective Davis signed the Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation form. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #2

Detective Davis did not observe Officer Rangel at the time of the event or after the event. As a he did not have a view of the target location at the time Officer Rangel discharged his rifle.

On November 12, 2013, I reviewed a dictated copy of Officer Rangel's cellular telephone call to dispatch. It was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #9.

On November 13, 2013, I reviewed a copy of Thomas Brothers map page 239. It was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #5.

On November 14, 2013, I interviewed Sergeant Ken Lewis in my office. Sergeant Lewis signed the Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation form. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #22.

Sergeant Lewis first observed Officer Rangel taking cover behind the front left tire of the MRAP as it was parked just north of the target location. Officer Rangel appeared bewildered and depressed. Sergeant Lewis explained he replaced Rangel with Officer Tedford and Rangel was pulled off line and sent to the Tactical Command Post. Sergeant Lewis explained that he told Officer Rangel he was staying at the Tactical Command Post. It is unclear if Officer Rangel understood that as a direct order. Officer Rangel never disclosed to him he was involved in a shooting.

On November 14, 2013, I interviewed Officer Elec Miller in my office. Officer Miller signed the Notice of Internal Affairs Investigation form. The interview was audio

recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as an Exhibit #23.

Officer Miller first contacted Officer Rangel after he parked the MRAP near the target location on 6th Street. He explained Rangel told him he had exchanged gun fire with the suspect and the suspect had shot at them first. Officer Miller noticed that Rangel was a little excited, but not any more excited than others at the scene. Officer Miller provided Rangel with his own personal SWAT gear and he said Officer Rangel made no further comments to him regarding the discharge of his firearm.

On December 5, 2013, I reviewed a copy of the Roseville PD radio traffic. The radio traffic revealed Officer Rangel's transmission taking place at 1717 hours. I also reviewed a copy of Roseville PD report #298-13-11207. The report includes an evidence diagram of the scene. The report was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #1.

The report provided does not include the entire investigative report. Detective Phelps and Lieutenant Doane both confirmed there were no witnesses or officers who reported seeing the suspect exit the of the target location. There were also no witnesses or officers who observed the suspect running south along the target location at the time Officer Rangel discharged his rifle. Immediately prior to Officer Rangel discharging his rifle, Officers and a Sergeant observed the suspect attempting to exit the but the suspect failed to exit and went back into the target location after officers fired on the suspect.

On December 5, 2013, I reviewed a copy of the Video from CHP Air 21. The CD ROM disc contained the video and audio from CHP Air 21 to include RPD radio traffic from 1717 hours and 18 seconds to 1717 hours and 30 seconds. During this time Officer Rangel radioed the following:

"Citrus Heights on the we saw him running south".

Immediately after Officer Rangel's radio transmission, 7S11 transmitted The following:

"Negative, he went back inside".

The aerial video immediately prior to Officer Rangel's radio traffic and during his transmission reveals there was no one in the syard of Hampton Drive. The Roseville PD Investigation also determined officers on the perimeter of the location did not report seeing the suspect in the syards. At the time, immediately after Officer Rangel's radio traffic, perimeter units transmitted the suspect was inside the residence. There were several police vehicles along the sides on 6th Street observed on the video. Officers near those vehicles would have had unobstructed views of the stackyard and syards at the location at the time Officer Rangel fired shots into the swall of the residence.

I reviewed Officer Rangel's Individual Training Activity Report. The report was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #8.

On December 10, 2013, I conducted a second interview with Detective Kane Kissam for clarification. The interview was done in my office. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A dictated copy of the interview was affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #14.

I focused this interview on Detective Kissam's observations and his perceptions of what occurred at the time Officer Rangel discharged his rifle. He confirmed he did not see the suspect and there was nothing to make him perceive he was being shot at. I asked if there was fragmentation hitting the ground around him at the time Officer Rangel fired his rifle and he confirmed there was not. He believed the gunfire, prior to Officer Rangel firing, was occurring at the perimeter positions looking toward the to see if the suspect exited the home.

On December 13, 2013, at 1350 hours, Lieutenant Ford conducted a second Administrative Interview with Officer Rangel at Trellis Hall. Officer Rangel's attorney and I were present. The interview was audio recorded using a digital recorder. A CD-ROM containing the interview has been affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #7.

During the interview, Lieutenant Ford utilized the Citrus Heights Police Department Interview Procedure form and explained the general allegations and scope of the interview were to clarify facts in the officer involved shooting that occurred on October 25, 2013. Lieutenant Ford advised him that the interview would be recorded. Officer Rangel confirmed he understood the nature and scope of the investigation and understood the admonishment that he was ordered to answer all of my questions. Lieutenant Ford signed the Citrus Heights Police Department Interview Procedure form as did Officer Rangel. The signed Interview Procedure form and the dictated copy of the interview have been affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #12.

The interview provided the following information regarding Officer Rangel's description of his training and experience specifically related to SWAT. He explained he has participated in over 30 SWAT call outs. He has attended the Basic 80 hour SWAT Course and a 40 hour SWAT Breacher Course. He has attended two 10 hour SWAT training days each month as ongoing SWAT training. He qualifies with his firearms one day each month during SWAT trainings and also at quarterly department firearm trainings. He noted the SWAT training he attended, prior to this incident, did include active shooter and officer down drills. In addition, he attends monthly department training for 10 hours.

During the interview, he was asked about his interaction with Officer James Garing during the incident. He referred to Officer Garing as a "rookie" and he explained Garing was inexperienced, but capable. During the first round of gunfire he heard, Officer Rangel said he was scared because it appeared to be very close to his location. He said when he looked up, he saw Officer Garing standing in front of a window of the Tactical Suburban. Officer Rangel said, "I reached up and I grabbed him and I jerked him to the ground and I told him to get down". He further described his actions by saying he grabbed Officer Garing by the shirt and belt when he jerked him down. Officer Rangel

appeared surprised when told this was in conflict with Officer Garing recollection of the event. Officer Garing said he was never pulled down by Officer Rangel.



Officer Rangel was asked for additional detail regarding his positioning and communication with Officer Kissam prior to and after he discharged his rifle. He said he heard gunfire coming from the east. He was not sure if it was from what corner of the target location. He believed Roseville PD officers were returning fire. He explained he is and he was in a close enough to Officer Kissam to talk to each other. He was unsure of the exact distance. He did not remember Officer Kissam talking to him about his breathing prior to discharging his rifle. In fact, he believed the conversation occurred after he fired his rifle. He stated, "After shooting, he told me dude control your breathing. I said no, this is killing breathing". He explained that he used combat breathing to steady his rifle and keep from "freaking out".

Officer Rangel described seeing Officer Kissam immediately after he fired his rifle. He said he saw Kissam's head down with one hand out. He also described Kissam's rifle being on its side. He did not remember Officer Kissam making a statement to him regarding his hearing. He explained he was in "auditory exclusion". He said his own ears were not ringing. Officer Rangel was asked if Officer Kissam asked him what he shot at. He said he remembered Officer Kissam ask him where he hit. Officer Rangel explained he said, "Did you see my bullet hole in the wall, there, that's me."

Officer Rangel said he fired his rifle immediately when he saw the suspect's head and shoulder area. He described seeing a flash of skin, curve of a head, and the suspect's upper shoulder. He explained that it was his impression the suspect was backing up toward him. I asked how he was convinced what he believed he saw was not a police officer. His explanation was there were no "cops" there. He saw no helmet, uniform, dark blue, green, tan, or urban camo. He described what he saw entered in from his left, the of the house. To clarify his state of mind, Officer Rangel stated, "I was afraid that he was gonna shoot me in the face and then after start killing other people". When asked if the suspect shot at him, He explained he had no indication the suspect shot at him. He explained he did not recall pulling the trigger six times, but he knew he had six cartridges missing from his magazine. He recalled only pulling the trigger twice.

When asked about his rifle being in the selector mode semi-automatic or automatic, he did not know. He further stated, "There's a ton of ways I could have accidentally knocked it over to full auto". When asked if he saw this as a concern, he said he didn't know. When asked if this has happened to him in training, he said he never had it happen to him in training.

I provided the aerial video, exhibit #7, for Officer Rangel to view. He held his forehead in both hands and his eyes watered as he wiped away tears. He admitted never seeing the suspect on the video. He appeared confused as he stared at the video intently.

Officer Rangel described why he moved positions after firing his rifle. He explained he wanted to get to a safer location and they moved back 100 feet to take cover behind a pickup truck. He then moved to alongside the CHPD MRAP Tactical Vehicle when it came on scene. He explained he followed the vehicle as cover with the intent to get inside it and to obtain armor. When asked if he remembered telling the driver, Officer Miller, the suspect shot at him he stated, "No, I said he's shooting cops." When asked about a conversation he had with Sergeant Evans who was in the front passenger seat of the tactical vehicle, Officer Rangel said, "At one point I was like yeah I, I've been in a shooting, yeah he's shooting at us, and he's like oh he shot at, shot at you guys? Yeah. I don't recall saying that Samuel Duran shot at me personally, No."

During this interview, Officer Rangel denied telling anyone he was shot at by the suspect. He repeatedly tried to convey that any references he made to Officers or Sergeants that he was shot at personally was a reference to officers on scene being shot at by the suspect.

Officer Rangel was questioned about how he made notifications to supervisors after discharging his firearm at what he believed to be the suspect. He explained he made four telephone calls while taking cover behind the MRAP Tactical Vehicle. His first call was to Officer Rangel explained he called dispatch twice with one call being transferred to Sergeant Dias at the Command Post. He said he also called Sergeant Perez. He noted that he notified each person that he was involved in a shooting. He also explained he attempted to contact Lieutenant Turcotte and the scribe, Officer Shannon King, but he was unsuccessful.

After being positioned on the outside of the MRAP for several hours, Officer Rangel said Sergeant Lewis replaced him and brought him to the Tactical Command Post. He said he met with Lieutenant Russo and he asked if he should be sequestered after being involved in a shooting. He explained Lieutenant Russo told him no and he asked if he had shot anyone or hurt anyone. He was then told to rest at the location with his SWAT team.

Officer Rangel explained he did not believe he was given a direct order to remain at the Tactical Command Post, but he admitted that Sergeant Lewis had told him not to leave and to stay there. He understood this to mean he was off line and he would remain with his SWAT team. He did not recall speaking in detail about his involvement in a shooting with Officer Lombardo at the Tactical Command Post. He said he only told Lombardo that he fired rounds. Officer Rangel did not recall telling Lombardo the suspect shot in his direction after poking his head out of a window. He did recall saying the suspect came out a slider, but he was not sure it was made to Lombardo.

When asked why there were multiple discrepancies in his version of the events, and told there were officers and sergeants who said he told them the suspect shot at him. He said he did not know.

He was also told there were many officers, on the perimeter of the target location, not seeing the suspect exit into the backyard of the residence. Officer Rangel was asked to explain these facts and the evidence presented in the aerial video. Officer Rangel only stated, "And I saw the video and I gotta be honest with you, um, I'm sick lookin at the video, I'm upset lookin at the video." Officer Rangel could not provide an explanation and held firm he believed he saw the suspect at the time he fired his rifle.

On February 5, 2014, I reviewed the Sacramento County District Attorney Lab results. The evidence examined was Officer Rangel's rifle. It is logged as a Colt, Model M4, .223 Remington caliber select fire rifle, serial The log also contained two magazines, 22 .223 REM caliber cartridges, and 28 .223 REM caliber cartridges. During the tests, the rifle functioned properly exhibiting no apparent malfunctions. The report has been affixed to this investigation as Exhibit #26.

Detective Randy Fernandez: All right, are you good.

Other Speaker:

We're good.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. Let me go ahead and turn the recorder on.

Officer Rangel:

Oh, we're recording this ****?

Other Speaker:

Detective Randy Fernandez: All right? I think everybody ****. It is 1430 hours on Tuesday, October 29. Uh, the parties in the room. I'll go first, uh, Detective Randy Fernandez of the Roseville Police Department.

Officer Joe Rangel: Joe Rangel, officer, Citrus Heights Police.

Detective Randy Fernandez: All right. Basically we're here for further purpose of discussing the incident that occurred on October 25, uh, Officer Rangel's here to give a voluntary statement. Uh, for any reason you don't wanna answer a question or wanna end the interview, just let us know. Uh, we have some maps here. Uh, this is an area of the incident which includes the train tracks, Vernon Street, Riverside, Sixth Street and then all the major, uh residential streets, points are Mayfair, Hampton. We also have an overhead view of Hampton. So if you do, you need this reference for any reason, please do so. You can use a hand to mark where you, what you saw, so on and so forth. Um, before we get started, we'll just do some biographical stuff. We already got your name, male. How old are you?

Officer Rangel:

Rangel:

Detective Randy Fernandez: And you work for what department?

Officer Rangel:

Uh, Citrus Heights P.D.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Citrus Heights. And the agency address?

Officer Rangel:

6315 Fountain Square in Citrus Heights.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. And department telephone number?

Officer Rangel:

727-5500.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. And what's your rank at the police department?

Officer Rangel:

Police officer.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. And your badge number?

Officer Rangel:

259.

Detective Randy Fernandez: 259. And your radio call sign.

Officer Rangel:

Adam 1.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Adam 1. All right. And if you could for us just kinda give us a overview of your law enforcement experience.

Officer Rangel: Sure. Uh, I've done about 15 years on as a cop. Um, I started with um, um, went to um, um, and then came down to Citrus Heights. I was, uh, I, I worked custody and some patrol in I worked, uh, patrol, school resource and investigations in, uh, And then I came down to Citrus Heights and have worked, uh, patrol, investigations and now I'm, uh, patrol and SWAT.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay.

Detective Randy Fernandez: And how long you been in SWAT?

Officer Rangel:

About five years.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Five years. Okay. And your, uh, patrol duties right now, what shift do you work? What are your own hours?

Officer Rangel: Dayshift, um, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday. Um, 6:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. or whenever the reports stop coming in.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Yeah. Uh, so this incident occurred on Friday. Were you on duty that day?

Officer Rangel:

I was.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. All right. Obviously we have a list of questions we wanna get out at the way. Um, so we're just gonna have you do a narrative first. We have a little paragraph prepared and I'll read it.

Officer Rangel:

Okay.

Detective Randy Fernandez: And then, uh, I'll let you get started. And basically it just says based on our investigation we understand you discharged your weapon in the officer-involved shooting incident on October 25, 2013 occurring in the jurisdiction of Placer County, City of Roseville, at or near the residential areas of Windsor Drive, Sixth Street and Hampton Drive. We've prepared general questions to assist our interview today, however, we'd like you to first provide a chronological sequence of events from the time you became involved in the incident to the time you engaged suspect Samuel Duran. Basically, just a narrative from beginning to end.

Officer Rangel: Okay.

Detective Randy Fernandez: So go ahead.

Okay. Um, so, uh, like I said, I was on patrol. I was with, uh, Officer, uh, Officer Rangel: who, uh, was, is the swing shift officer, overlapped time. So it must've been after 1:30. Uh, I don't actually remember the exact time to be honest with you but we were out in Antelope and Daly, uh, right on the edge of our city, um, clearing a crash. And we had just gone to 10-8, back in service and we were, uh, rollin' down Antelope Road back towards the center of our city, so we were eastbound on Antelope when our dispatch got on the air and said, uh, Adam 1, uh, I need you to respond to Roseville Code 3 and she was quiet for a second. And she says I need you to respond to Roseville Code 3. There's, Roseville has an officer involved. And she's quiet for a second. I knew something was just horribly wrong because that's not how she dispatches. Um, and then she finally spits it out. Roseville's had an officer-involved shooting. They have an officer down. The suspect is still outstanding. So now I'm Code 3 to Roseville. Um, I jump on 80 but she doesn't tell me where I'm going. So I just take 80 towards Riverside figuring I'll, I'll end up in Roseville and hopefully more information will present itself. Um, so as I'm getting off on, uh, Riverside, I asked for updates. She gives me directions to, um, what, what I now know to be the incident command center. But I have to be honest with you, I'm not familiar with your city and, um, I was drivin' really fast and I had no fre, no frickin' clue where she wanted me to go. So at this point, I'm on Riverside and I, I remember she said Riverside. I'm following a chain of cop cars and we're, we're, uh, haulin' down Riverside, um, and then a bunch of people stopped at this place that I later learned is called BMX Track. So we get out at BMX Track. So we get out at BMX Track and there's already a ton of cops there from a bunch of different agencies and they're all, uh, they've all got their weapons out and they're all, they're all pointing, um, I'm sorry, uh, I guess it's west. They're all pointing west. I recognize one of the guys there. He's on my SWAT team with me. His name's Joe. Also Joe. He's one of our So I get out, I come up behind him, Joe, I'm behind him, I get up behind him. What's goin' on? And there's another Roseville guy who was right in between the two of them. They kinda fill me in that Roseville was, uh, Roseville and, uh, they said parole. I, I've now learned that it was ICE but, uh, they said a parole agent. They said Roseville and parole were attempting to contact a PAL, um, and that, uh, the suspect shot the parole agent and he ran and then there was another, there was another gunfight somewhere and this guy's still running. And the Roseville cop, and I don't know who it was or what his name was, he shows me, uh, a photo on his phone of the suspect, uh, from Web KPF. Um, excuse me, he shows me a photo on his phone of the suspect from Web KPF, uh, Samuel Duran and, um, he's 5 foot 6, Hispanic male. Uh, in the photo he had a shaved head, uh, mustache, um, slender build and so we were given a description of what he was wearing, um, which I believe was a, a sweater and some pants, uh,

Detective Randy Fernandez: Do you know what route you took to get there?

Yeah, I shot all the way up Riverside to what I believe is Vernon, um, and Officer Rangel: then there was a Roseville cop there with traffic shut down and he just, all he said was go this way about four blocks, it'll be on your right side. You can't miss it. So I went that way, about four blocks and didn't miss it. I get out the car. Um, and the command staff from various different agencies are there, the popup tents are goin' up, they're starting an incident command. Um, I get out, I sling my rifle and I find my, uh, command staff. The, the guy I found was Lieutenant Alex Turcotte. He's my former team leader on the SWAT team and since promoted up to lieutenant. Um, so he's, he's phasing outa the SWAT team. So I go find him and I tell him hey, I'm here, lookin' for work, what can I do to help? And he says okay, you and, um, he grabs another guy named Nate, uh, who's not SWAT. He was but he's not anymore, he's a narcotics guy now for our SIU, and another guy named James Garing who, uh, is a junior officer, uh, junior SWAT member, junior, junior cop. He's only be a cop for a couple years, um, and he's on the SWAT team. Um, he said you guys go, uh, secure, provide security for tactical operations command. That meant to me, and I don't know if that's Roseville jargon or, or PCDA jargon, but what that means to me is is that there's, um,

So, so we go, uh, he points us down Sixth Street, we jump in our cars. We drive as far down Sixth Street as we can, which is not far. Um, the road is just log jammed with cops. So we get out and jog the rest of the way and I come across, uh, Dan Blair from, Placer County. I knew him as, uh, as a deputy and as a detective. I guess he's a sergeant now. Um, and I say Dan, where, where do you need us, whatta ya want us to do. Um, he eventually says, uh, you guys head down to 6 Mayfair, um, get down there and, um, help secure the tactical command post. And he points at this house, uh, which is 6 Mayfair, I believe. He says that's the last house, place anybody saw the guy so he's somewhere in here. We're pretty sure we got him contained in this block. I had no concept of, I've seen maps now but at the time I had no concept of how big this block was, where it went, that, that it was U-shaped street. None, none of that. But, so we run down to 6 Mayfair and, uh, which I've now learned may be Windsor. I guess the street changes names a couple times and —

Detective Randy Fernandez: Right.

Part of the confusion as we didn't know where we were at. They kept Officer Rangel: saying Mayfair and Windsor and so we got to the house that said 6 on it and we stopped and we met up with some, um, Sac guys and some Roseville guys. We said okay, we're here to help secure your TOC, whatta ya need us to do? Roseville SWAT was a couple houses away from us. They were gettin' all kitted out. They had their Bearcat out. They were gettin' ready to do their thing. Um, they said hey, just, you know, provide us some security here while we get all set up and hold this perimeter point. Perfect. So that's what we did. Um, I got a helmet and rifle. James has a helmet and rifle. Ferguson has a pistol. You know, uh, no rifle. So we're sittin' there for a few minutes tryin' to get stuff organized and then, uh, I think somebody called 911. Yeah, the dispatcher came over the air, Roseville dispatch came over the air and said hey, we're getting a report that he's in somebody's backyard. And so obviously the Roseville guys knew where that was 'cause they all jumped on their Bearcat and took off towards wherever that was. So, uh, we held where we were, you know, did our job and stayed on perimeter. And we were pretty much at, uh, this street that cuts through to Hampton. It cuts through, so we were pretty much at the intersection of Hampton and Mayfair and Windsor apparently. We were just right there.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Mm hmm.

And, uh, so Roseville takes off in their Bearcat and they, uh, they go to Officer Rangel: where the, the suspect allegedly is and Falcon 30 is overhead, the helicopters overhead and he's puttin' out, um, you know, he's, he's runnin' east, you know, he's eastbound. He's over fences and so I hear somebody give the command to Roseville to break down the fence with the Bearcat so Roseville, I assuming, breaks down the fence with the Bearcat. We hear this foot pursuit developing. We have no, I have no real concept of where anybody is or where they're actually at. We just hear, you know, he's east towards Hampton or he's south, somewhere over at Hampton. So we know he's comin' towards the street we're on but don't really know where he's at. So the foot pursuit kinda dies out and they think they have him cornered in some sheds or something like that. In some, some outbuildings in the back of the house. So we're sittin' there and I can't speak for the other guys, but for me I was pretty sure okay, this is pretty much over. You know, parolee with a pistol, took a pop shot at a cop, he's probably thrown the pistol and now he's cowering in a, uh, in a shed and they gotta go get him out with the K-9 or SWAT and this is, we're gonna be done here. And my phone goes off. It's one of the girls back at the command post, the main command post. She says we need you and Garing back here now to get on your SWAT gear. I say well, I can't because we're guarding the tactical operations command. I can't leave Ferguson by himself, he's only got a pistol and I can't leave him by himself anyway. So, um, figure something out. She says I and some other people will come and relieve you but we need you back her to get your SWAT gear on. Okay. I see some Sac PD guys not too far away, um, so I take Ferguson and I give him to them and I say you, you know, he's your's now so stay with him. And then Garing and I run back to our cars and then get back to the, uh, incident command where I assumed our, our truck had showed up with our gear and we were gonna put on our and go to deploy as, as SWAT or something. When we got there, Lieutenant Turcotte was talking with a Roseville lieutenant. I don't know the guy's

name. And they're having some discussion about needing more SWAT guys out there right now. Um, so Turcotte sees me, he looks at me and he goes good. He goes get a rifle team together, get back out there and do whatever they need you to do. Okay. So I looked around and I got Garing and, uh, Joe Davis is there, a swat guy. I got him and then there's guy Kane Kissam And everyone's got who's not SWAT rifles, everyone's got helmets. So I'm like okay, well, here's our rifle team. And Turcotte gets on the radio and asks, uh, Roseville's L3, um, asks L3, you know, I've got a, I've got a four-man rifle team. Is that gonna be good enough. They say yes, get 'em down here. So, so these guys are all junior to me on the SWAT team, you know, the tactical thing, um, so, so I'm leading them down there and we got back towards, uh, in the intersection of Sixth and Mayfair where we run into Blair, Dan Blair again and a Roseville guy, whose name I should know and is totally escapin' my mind right now. Um, say hi, here we are, um, we don't have our kits with us but, uh, we're here, what can we do? And he says great. Sac County is right here, uh, their SED team or part of it's right here. You'll link up with them. You guys are gonna go watch Mayfair. Um, we got the guy locked down into one of this cluster of houses. You guys are gonna watch (Mayfair, make sure he doesn't pop out the front. Perfect. So they pull their Suburban and it's just a Suburban with, you know, side rails. So they pull their Suburban out and kinda pretty much right in front of the house and we stack on the, on the, uh, offside and we're just kinda sittin' there waitin'. And, excuse me, keepin' an eye on the house. Some radio chatter, to be honest with you I couldn't tell you what it was. Um, and we were discussing over there on our side, you know, just confirming everyone knows what the suspect looks like, everyone knows he's armed with a pistol, everyone's just kinda goin' over the details again just in case he comes out and what we're gonna do if he runs, what we're gonna do if he fights. Who's gonna - just, just forming our own little plan there. Um, and then I, I couldn't tell you how long it was. The, the air just exploded. Um, there was, uh, there was, uh, a lot of automatic gunfire that just kind of, uh, exploded and I hit the deck. I don't know what the guys behind me were doing. It was, it was pretty apparent that it was a gunfight, not just, you know, there, there, there was some exchange going on because there was, uh, there was more than, than a couple quick bursts. And it startled me but what my assumption was at this point, and it was absolutely correct I've now learned, but my assumption was at this point that it was, um, SWAT, some SWAT team, Roseville probably, had located him and he had given some resistance, made a furtive movement or still holdin' the pistol and they were using lethal force. Still, whether the bullets are from our guys or not, they're still dangerous so, um, I got down and James Garing, he was still standing straight up. He didn't really, he's never been in a situation before. So I, I actually reaching up and grabbing him and saying get down, idiot. And I pulled him down on the ground. Um, and, uh, after the exchange of gunfire I had anticipated hearing, you know, suspect's down, start medics. Um, what I heard was a lotta stepping on each other, a lot of screaming, um, people screaming officer down, get that ARV up here right now. Where's the damn ARV. We've got two officers down. Um, we think he's been shot in the face. Um, and then get back, suspect has an automatic weapon. And then I, uh, I was like holy fuck, I thought he had a pistol. Um, I don't where he picked up the, um, machine from or even what kind he had or anything. It didn't sound like a, like Roseville's 9-millimeter MP5s or our .223s. So, uh, still tryin' to be in charge of these guys. So I keep Garing down, I look at Joe Davis and I say you got your gun? His, his gun. He says yeah, it's in the car around the corner which is away from the hot area. I say go get it, get on one of those roofs and get some bead on the house if you can. So he takes off, that's the last time I see him. The next I heard from him on the

radio, he's calling himself Um, I, I'd gone over this a couple times in my head, I can't remember if I heard it on the radio or somebody said it or, or what, but I became aware I am still next to the Suburban that, um, there was a woman and a baby and a guy in the house with the suspect and they had barricaded themselves. And so I'm goin' down the checklist in my mind. I've got, uh, I've got shots fired, I've got officers down, he's heavily armed, he's barricaded and now I've got a hostage situation. And I don't have my armor and I don't have my team and I have a junior guy in front of me that, and I know this is not my job, but, but I, I don't want him to get killed. So, um, some of, some of the resources started movin' around towards 6 I don't know what street it is. I don't, this is the house where all the gunfire happened. They start movin' around towards 6 um, I, uh, there was a, uh, some I started towards it to start seein' what I could see. Since I think the of, of the target house, the list not where the gunfire is happening. Stay here with Sac County on this side, stay here, because this is not where the gunfire is happening. Stay here with Sac County and they will protect you. I didn't tell him that but, then we get around to the other side and, um, I hear a lotta screaming and this woman comes out the side and she's holding a baby. And we're all yelling at here come on, come on, come on and she's just standin' there. Um, some of the SWAT cops tried to go up and guide her a little bit but she's just standin' there. And, uh, I broke cover and I ran up and I grabbed her and I ran her back to Dan Blair and her husband followed and then I went back to join Kane. Um, and then Sac County guy asked us to get, to try and get a of the house, of the target house.

Officer Rangel: Detective Randy Fernandez: So this is Sixth Street. Officer Rangel: Okay. Detective Randy Fernandez: So this is the apartments and this is the target house, this is Hampton. Officer Rangel: Okay. Detective Randy Fernandez: This is Sixth Street. Okay. So I can't, because of the tree cover here there's, there's some Officer Rangel: differences, uh, I can't really see what it, exactly where stuff is but, but the car we were using for cover was somewhere right here. Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. And Sac County had asked us to try and get Officer Rangel: house. So there's a fence line right here. So there's, there's two fences here. This fence, the one closest to us, was pretty much, it had a couple boards missing. And so, um, I go up and I rip out, uh, as many fence boards as I can, um, to, to open up our field of fire. And then looking through the, this been, even though there's still a fence there, a big section of that fence has been torn down. So that house. Kane, I guess, thought we were going in to there, we can see into the 'cause he said you go first. And I looked at him and I said what the fuck do ya mean? He said you're better at this. I said no, nobody's going in, get down. And we got _____on this side looking through the two fence lines to the target house. So you kinda have the Um -Detective Randy Fernandez: So are you in the backyard of the house? We did not go in the backyard. We're on the side yard of this house. Officer Rangel: Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. Because had we gone in the backyard, nobody would have visual on us. Officer Rangel: We'd be open to crossfire from everybody and there's zero for cover back there. Actually

there's zero for cover where we were too, to be honest, to be honest with you. But, um, you know, if I had a crystal ball. So, so we get prone where we're at and we're on rifle and, um, if I can, if I can draw somethin' for ya here real quick. So this is our view looking, looking towards the target house. This, this chunk of fence has been torn down. And so there's this V-shaped gap and this other V-shaped gap into the target house. And I hear people, uh, yelling something about he's comin' out the slider, he's comin' outa the carport, he's doing these things and I could see on the target house, this is the carport, what appears to be a carport here on least that's what I think it is. I know that it's some type of overhang thing. So we're laying there and I'm, uh, I'm pretty freaked out because I, it appears to me that we have no cover. Um, and then somebody gets on the radio, uh, somebody from, from Roseville command gets on the radio and announces to all SWAT units, uh, that, that there's now a he clarified that on plain text to say, um, if, if you see the suspect next opportunity take him out. copy and all the copy that and everyone around And make sure that the copy that. And what, what I understood that to mean was that the decision had been made that the person was, uh, such a threat and displayed such intent to, uh, to harm that we weren't gonna try and apprehend him. That we needed to neutralize him immediately. Um, so we were there for, uh, a short period of time and, uh, I, I became, you know, I started to get some better sense of our surroundings and I realized that, um, these little fence boards aren't gonna stop his rounds and that, uh, if he sees us he's gonna shoot us. which means I don't have a lotta which means if he sees me I'm not gonna be able to me. So if I see him, it's gonna be, uh, it's gonna be a race to see who's gonna, you know neutralize who first. And I'm really not liking this, this position that we're in at all. Um, so I'm, I'm lookin' around and kind of lookin' around behind me to see who's got my cover right now. What, what units are behind me 'cause I wanna move Kane and I out of here. I don't like where we're at. I wanna try and find a better way to cover this backyard. I even, I think I even asked some SSD guy, can you guys knock out this fence and take out the fence. And they said no, um, and I, I don't really know why. Um, so I go back on gun and I'm tryin' to think of something, something to do that will help take this backyard. And then I hear another exchange of gunfire, much briefer than the first one. Um, more screaming on the radio. And then I see his head and his upper shoulder pop into my line of view right here. And so I open fire. Um, I have no idea if I hit him or not. I believed when I did that that he took off running south. I got on the radio and I said he's running south. Somebody got on the radio and said neg, said negative, he went back in the slider. So, um, I don't, I, I don't know. Um, but right after that, after I engaged, I looked over at Kane and he's got his face down and his hands out to the side and he's let go of his gun and I think he's been hit. So I look at him and I scream at him dude, are you okay? And he looks up at me and he goes I'm fine. And, um, I, I just kinda made the decision that this probably wasn't the best place for him to be and I asked Sac County to cover him and I told him to get the fuck outa there. And he took off. And then, uh, I, uh, they covered me and I moved around towards where Sac County – I, I, I, I just surrendered that, it was a horrible position to be in and I had given up my - the only think I had was surprise and I gave it up by firing and so I, I was no longer valuable there and I don't, uh, so I just gave up that position and moved back over here with Sac County. Right about that time the Citrus Heights MRAP showed up and I ended up, uh, they just parked right in front of and that's where I stayed for about three hours. Um, couple other exchanges of gunfire, uh, from the MRAP and then I don't know where else and I just kinda took cover behind the tire and stayed there until I was relieved well after dark.

Detective Randy Fernandez: You didn't go inside the vehicle? You stayed -I tried, uh, I don't know why I, I, 'cause I had no armor on when they Officer Rangel: showed up. As it turns out it wasn't my team in the MRAP, it was West Sac. Um, my team was driving it, but I have no clue how that happened. But, uh, when they, when they drove up, the drivers door was on the from the house and I opened it up and, uh, a guy I know named EJ was there and I said dude, let me in and he said I'm sorry, there's no room, all the seats are taken and he, it's true. And I'm like well, do you have some armor for me, or something, did you bring my gear? And he, uh, he gave me his armor. Um, he's about your size so his armor did not fit me very well but it was better than not having armor. Detective Randy Fernandez: Right. So I put it on and I, then that's what I wore. Um, and then about, uh, in Officer Rangel: my mind it seems like 2 1/2, 3 hours later that, uh, they came and got me off the line. Detective Randy Fernandez: So you were relieved before the suspect surrendered? Yes. I was, I had already gone through my public safety statement and Officer Rangel: was back at my station, uh, tearing my stuff down. Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. Uh, and just, I knew you drew a picture here but I want, so just kinda orient this for me like is it, like are you, what are you seeing here? Is this -So, so I'm laying on the ground -Officer Rangel: No, no, no, no. No, no. This way. So I'm laying on the ground, um, Officer Rangel: looking through here. This chunk of fence board is broken out and leaning forward right here, which has created a gap here and a gap here -Detective Randy Fernandez: Yeah. - to the fence. And I'm looking through this one and Kane is looking Officer Rangel: through this one. Detective Randy Fernandez: And where is - can you kinda draw the house of what you're seeing? Like a -Um, uh, I just, just remember a wall right there. I'm shaking. Officer Rangel: Detective Randy Fernandez: That's fine. wall. That was the target house. I just remember a Officer Rangel:

Detective Randy Fernandez: So you saw the like a shoulder or something?

Officer Rangel: I saw, yeah, I saw the, the round part of the head and then like the upper part of the shoulder come out there. What, what my thought and I have no idea if this is accurate, I don't know, but what I was feeling at the time was how, whoever he had engaged, he was tryin' to move out either around. 'Cause I, I later learned that there's, there's solid fence on this side. And he was either tryin' to use concealment to get away or he was still engaging or, or whatnot.

Detective Randy Fernandez: So this is the back of the house and you thought maybe he was crossin' the back of the house to go maybe to the other side of the yard.

Officer Rangel:

To go south.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. So when you saw this head and shoulder you fired in that direction?

Officer Rangel:

Correct.

Detective Randy Fernandez: And then that moved back that way? I have no****.

Officer Rangel:

I – very hard to say. We're talkin' about a split second here.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Mm hmm.

Officer Rangel: But I believe he was actually goin' this way. So this would be south. Um, but I got checked on the radio, like I said, 'cause I got on the radio, I said it twice. Suspect is running south.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Mm hmm.

Officer Rangel: I didn't get a response and I said it again, suspect is running south. And then, uh, somebody said negative, he went back in the slider. So I don't know if he ran around and went back in the slider or, or what.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. I'm just gonna put an arrow on this so I know how to orient this so that when we, when we look at it, that's gonna be ****.

Officer Rangel:

**** want me draw like a –

Detective Randy Fernandez: No, that's fine.

Officer Rangel: -****

Detective Randy Fernandez: ****. Uh, okay. So I'm just gonna back up a little bit. Here's – the is right here. Obviously labeled by So this is where you first responded.

Officer Rangel:

Correct. I was in this open field part next ta -

Detective Randy Fernandez: And that's where you met the Roseville officer and he actually showed you a picture of Sammy Duran.

Officer Rangel:

Correct.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. And did – how much history did you get on Sammy Duran. Did you, it sounded like, how did you get any more history on him?

Officer Rangel: Yeah, I got, uh, I got Samuel Duran, I got, uh, I got, uh, I got, uh, I got PAL and I got his clothing description. And then later I got a updated clothing description, no shirt and all that stuff so, but as far as like his rap or anything we didn't, I mean.

Detective Randy Fernandez: And then they told you he'd shot a, you thought a parole, they said initially parole but you found out later it was ICE.

Officer Rangel: I, I heard on the radio that it was a, uh, a parole agent who had been – not on the radio, I heard word of mouth parole agent had been shot and then I heard, uh, a Paul unit had been in a gunfight with him. And I didn't know if a Paul unit, our Paul units are CSOs, I don't know what Roseville's.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Patrol.

Officer Rangel:

Okay. So.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. Um, and then you drove up Riverside to Vernon Street, it's gonna be up here, 'cause Vernon wraps all the way around. You can't see it on the map.

Officer Rangel: You guys, it's where the big three signs are, where Douglas, Vernon and Riverside converge. Okay.

Detective Randy Fernandez: There was a question I just had, it slipped my mind, so I'm tryin' to go back to remember what it was. Uh, if I remember I'll come back to it. Oh, at the radio traffic, were you, were you able to listen, I don't know how you guys' radios work, were you able to listen to the Roseville main channel or were you getting your stuff.

Officer Rangel: I was on your main. I was on the Roseville main.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Or you were. Perfect. That's the question I had. I just didn't know if you guys were able to listen to our channel or not. And it sounds like you're not familiar. Had you ever been in this area of Roseville before?

Officer Rangel:

No.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay.

Officer Rangel:

No, no. I, I go to the gallery and that's it.

Detective Randy Fernandez: All right. As far as, uh, the weapon you were carrying, it's, it was

the SWAT rifle that you were -

Officer Rangel:

Correct.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay, what kinda weapon is that?

Officer Rangel:

It's a M4, uh, assault rifle.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay.

Officer Rangel:

It's, uh, it's got the Eotech, uh, holographic sight as well as iron sights.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay.

Um, it's, uh, it has, uh, a 30-round magazine loaded with 28. I had that Officer Rangel: magazine coupled with a second magazine, um, which did not get used in this event. Um, and I also had my duty pistol, my patrol pistol and may backup gun on.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. And what kinda rounds to the M4 shoot?

Officer Rangel:

Uh, it's esthetically a 556 but it's a 223 system. It's the same round –

Detective Randy Fernandez: Right.

Officer Rangel:

So we have our loaded with 223.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay.

Officer Rangel:

if you care, for a lack of penetration.

Detective Randy Fernandez: And your range-qualified with that weapon?

Officer Rangel:

I am.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay.

Officer Rangel:

Just, uh, a couple weeks ago actually.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. And then you mentioned it has the iron sights and then Eotech sight.

Officer Rangel: Correct.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Were you using one or other or both?

Officer Rangel: I was using the Eotech holographic sight.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. Now after you, after you see the figure pop out and then presumably run one direction or the other, what, what transpired immediately after that? Just, was it the radio traffic only, uh, being put out?

Officer Rangel: So, so I see the baldhead and, uh, and the shoulder pop out. I fire, um, and then take a breath and I'm aware of the movement going south and, um, I saw Kane. I asked him if he was okay. Um, he was okay and then I became aware that I should probably let somebody know that, what I just seen. I'm, I'm not gonna lie, I was a little rattled. Um, so I jumped on the radio and I said suspect's running south. I don't know if I stepped on somebody or, or everybody was tryin' to figure out what I was sayin' or not, or if I just didn't come across because I was freaked out, but I repeated myself, took a breath and repeated myself. And that's when somebody told me no, he went back in the slider.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay.

Officer Rangel: So.

Detective Randy Fernandez: And then, as far as your weapon goes, I don't know if it has the capability to go semi-auto, full-auto when you shot, how many rounds did you shoot and what kinda mode was it in.

Officer Rangel: It has full auto, it has semi auto and it has safe. Um, I've done the round count. Um, I only remember pulling the trigger, squeezing the trigger twice. I believed myself to be on semi auto. I don't know if in my haste I cranked it all the way with a full and fired two three-round bursts. I don't know feel like I fired two three-round bursts but I also don't feel like I squeezed the trigger six times. So, I, I don't know. While I was hittin' the deck I, I, I flipped the safety over, I mean yeah I flipped the safety over or not.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay.

Officer Rangel: We're trained to fire on full auto in situations where it's appropriate but I, I personally prefer to fire on semi.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. Now it sounds like you had gone, you mentioned this checklist that you had gone through so it sounds like you had taken a lot of things into consideration. One of the questions we've been asking is had you thought about what would happen if, um, Samuel Duran wasn't captured or did not give up?

Officer Rangel: Yeah. So Roseville had put a on the guy. I am aware from being a SWAT officer and going to regional trainings and working with lots of cops over 15

years what a second is. I know what that means. However that's not terminology my team uses. Um, you know and I gotta account for every bullet that comes out a my gun so when the comes out I, I'm starting to go through the list of things why, why there would be a on him and why, you know what, what situation would necessitate me using lethal force and yeah, I mean I came to a decision where he made it very, Samuel Duran had made it very, very clear that he was shooting a cop when he saw a cop and, um, that he was shooting cops in the face and my belief was that if he saw me and Kane that he was gonna shoot us in the face and that he was an eminent threat to every single person in that neighborhood and myself. So.

Detective Randy Fernandez: So is it fair to say like the state of mind you mentioned you were rattled and.

Officer Rangel:

I was terrified.

Detective Randy Fernandez:

Terrified.

Officer Rangel: Yeah. I was terrified. I'm, I'm, I, the first thing that happened once they got me off the line and I got away from it. Once I sat down and walked around and I cried. Um, right now, uh, loud noises freak me out right now. I'm, uh, I was terrified. I was afraid I wasn't gonna see my anymore. Um, I wasn't gonna let him kill me.

Detective Randy Fernandez: We're almost done so.

Officer Rangel:

No, that's fine.

Detective Randy Fernandez: I just have a couple more. Um.

Officer Rangel:

Do you what you have to do man.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Now, um, uh, as far as, uh, you said you weren't in a very good spot, you didn't have a lot of, uh, cover, uh, was there anything environmental wise, weather, lighting, anything like that that was affecting you or the suspect or anything like that?

Officer Rangel: It wasn't dark yet. Um, and it wasn't cold yet. Uh, the, the only environmental factors that came into play was you know that fence and the very limited amount of time that you know the judgment could be made because, uh, uh, there was just, just had a very small window to, uh, very small window of time to operate through based upon the visual obstruction.

Detective Randy Fernandez: And a lot of people refer to it as sight picture. Is that kinda what you mean?

Officer Rangel:

Yeah. I mean my sight picture was very narrow.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay.

Officer Rangel: Um, you know I had a, it, it's like looking through a, a very small tunnel, a very narrow tunnel and realizing that when a threat appears in this tunnel you take action or he's gonna take action and do it before he does and there's not a lotta lead time. You know your not going to see him running up or yell drop the gun or do any of that good stuff because you know it's just you know my, my fear was that what he was going to do was come out of the house and use that gap to come into that open field, well backyard and attempt to facilitate his escape and while doing that look out and see the two cops who were lying prone there and use them for sitting ducks so.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. So you mentioned, you just kinda mentioned like not enough time to say stop police. I mean do, the basically the reason for not saying that is hey I, I don't want him to know I'm here. I don't wanna get shot in the face.

Officer Rangel: Oh exactly. We were, we, we, I was hiding. We, we were hiding and that's the reason why I moved after I fire 'cause my hide, I had no idea if I'd hit him or not, um, but I knew he wasn't stopped 'cause he ran back in the slider and my hide was over. I had no, I had no secrecy there anymore and so my position was totally compromised. I needed to get somewhere else.

Other Speaker: ****.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. Were you injured at all from anything that occurred during that incident?

Officer Rangel: Mm, no. I got some scrapes from diving on the ground and stuff but nothing, nothing.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. Nothing you needed medical attention for? Okay. Um, anything that you did at the crime scene, either deliberately or accidentally that you think may have altered or changed it?

Officer Rangel: No.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay.

Other Speaker: Pretty much all that I have.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Just that, uh, it, it sounds like you pretty much covered everything but I just had the one, um, might not have caught it uh, distance that you fired. When he, when you saw him through that fence what was the distance that you fired from?

Officer Rangel: Um, I would.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Approximately.

Officer Rangel: I would guess about 15 yards. That would be where I, where I'd put it.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. So about 15 yards away.

Officer Rangel: About.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. And then, uh, just to clarify the rounds, you figured that, uh, you fired six rounds? Is that correct?

Officer Rangel: Yes.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. And then possibly two, three round bursts is what we're figuring on.

Officer Rangel: That's possible.

Detective Randy Fernandez: **** but you weren't sure.

Officer Rangel: I, I truly don't know.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. Um, and you said it wasn't dark but, uh, do you have a general idea? Was it getting, uh, dark or, or was it?

Officer Rangel: It was, it was just late in the day. Um, it hadn't, it hadn't gotten on towards, uh, dusk yet. The, uh, the Roseville guys hadn't started calling for lights 'cause the, they start calling for lights pretty early 'cause, uh, but that wasn't until the MRAP showed up so and I know this is a horrible frame to reference for time but that's, that's what I got you know. It was, it was dimming. It, it certainly wasn't noon but it wasn't, uh, it wasn't like nighttime.

Other Speaker: Right. Okay. I think that's all the questions that I had that I wanted to clarify.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Do you have anything else that you wanted to offer up to us or any questions you had?

Officer Rangel: No, I'm good.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Okay. Um, ****.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Yeah.

Other Speader: I just have two quick clarifiers real quick.

Detective Randy Fernandez: Sure.

SWAT has an operational philosophy as follows:

Recognizing that, by their nature, tactical operations are hazardous situations, the successful management and resolution of an incident often involves the need for decisions that might affect the safety of persons involved. Due to this, all operational/tactical decision-making will be made based on the priority of life known as the "Safety Priorities".

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When possible, the safety of suspects will be a consideration, however, the life of a suspect will not take precedence over the life of hostages, innocent persons/citizens, or police officers, regardless of the state of negotiations or any other activity designed to take the suspect into custody.

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1906 hours: Citrus Height Police Department SWAT and West Sacramento SWAT were positioned on the north side of the residence in the CHPD armored vehicle. They reported Duran moving in the house and he threw something out the window. Officers in the armored vehicle engaged Duran with a firearm.

1907 hours: I advised the following order: "All units on the perimeter, we are off on the green light, he's talking to HNT, hold on the green light, you are not clear". CHPD responded that when they fired, they had observed Duran holding a firearm. I replied, "Rules of engagement are if he is armed, you are clear, if he is not armed, stand down".
