 Here are the steps of how single stories can cause us to treat individuals negatively: We assume something is true of all individuals in a group, i.e., we create a stereotype. We show prejudice when we base our opinion about someone on a negative stereotype. We discriminate when we treat a person negatively based on stereotype. People like to believe they aren't judgmental but all humans are. Our brains are wired this way to help us make sense of the world we live in. Being judgmental is neither good nor bad It's just natural. However, placing all people in a category can be misleading and dangerous. For example, all 		
Islamists are not terrorists, all old women are not grandmothers, and all dogs are not friendly.		
 Ask for specific examples from the breakout discussion session that show the confusion/danger of stereotyping in your group? When we stereotype folks, whether it be good or bad, we are telling a single story about that person that can be just part of the story or wrong all together.
