Introduce Discussion with this statement: Adichie (pronounced "uh-DEE-chee") says "stories matter because they have the power to break or create dignity." Let's talk about how "single stories" impact our own identities, how we view others, and the choices we make. Here are some questions that may help start our discussion: (NOTE: This is a long list of questions provided as potential seeds to keep the conversation going. There is no need for group leaders to feel pressured to cover the entire list. Group leaders may choose from this list to cover the topics that interest them the most. Michael will facilitate the conversation afterward to tease out these many different facets of "single story" dynamics.)</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Has a single story ever been told about you? How did you know? How did it make you feel? 2) Have you ever told a single story? What did you do? How did you come to realize it was a single story? 3) Describe a "single story" that you feel is wrongly impacting others. 4) Do we create single stereotypical stories about countries, religions and races that are unfair? Give some examples. 5) What makes individuals uncomfortable about not having a single story for other people? 6) Have you ever connected with someone with whom you were sure you had nothing in common? How did that help your personal development? 7) Have you learned anything recently that you weren't aware of, and it helped change your perspective about other people? 8) America is more segregated today than it was in 1996. Dayton is one of the most segregated cities in America. Do these facts lead to the likelihood of a single story? Why/why not? 9) Interacting with people different than oneself helps avoid creating single stories. What can you commit to do to erase some of your single-story blind spots? <p>D. Our brains are wired this way to help us make sense of the world we live in. Being judgmental is neither good nor bad.... It's just natural. However, placing all people in a category can be misleading and dangerous. For example, all Islamists are not terrorists, all old women are not grandmothers, and all dogs are not friendly.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ask for specific examples from the breakout discussion session that show the confusion/danger of stereotyping in your group? • When we stereotype folks, whether it be good or bad, we are telling a single story about that person that can be just part of the story or wrong all together. • Thank you for sharing your experiences tonight with us as we all learn more about how we can be more inclusive and accepting of people in our community. 	<p>Michael Carter</p>	<p>8:00 pm (20-25 min)</p>

Hello Members of Oakwood City Council,

I am very disappointed that all safety orders will be lifted in the Gardner Pool, given that kids under 12 who are not yet able to be vaccinated are the ones who primarily use it. I understand that this has been approved by Governor DeWine, but just because you CAN do something, doesn't mean that you SHOULD. You are encouraging "personal responsibility" for families who might shoulder more risk- but what kind of personal responsibility can high-risk kids under 12 take when they aren't able to get the vaccine or control whether others who come to the pool are vaccinated or ill with covid?

The only personal responsibility we can take is not coming to the pool.

I am not sure what we will do yet.

I was really looking forward to letting my kids have the pleasures of a semi-normal summer after a hellish year. An unmasked, crowded pool is not what we were hoping for.

You could still have SOME safety measures in place that make using the pool more convenient for those who aren't at all worried about the risk and more comfortable for those who still are worried.

You could have certain low-capacity hours on certain days of the week for high risk families, you could still limit the daily capacity without requiring reservations, and lastly, you COULD require proof of vaccination. Honestly, I would be happy to see any concession that shows concern or affirms the reality we still live in.

It's possible, but not probable that cases will be so low by June 2 that we will all feel wonderful and safe. But we can't bank on that. Other facilities (like TEJAS K-12 downtown) that have many children under 12 using them, are still leaving a lot of the orders in place precisely because of the reasons I mentioned.

Telling Oakwood families that "if you're not comfortable, that's your problem" is not kind, not inclusive, not community-minded.
