
Also, during the pandemic, I'm surprised that they are requiring customers to wait 3 months to qualify for the lower rate, when we have such a high rate of unemployment.

Day 2 of remote learning! I appreciate your efforts yesterday. It was no small feat to get school up and running again. Now that we have that first day under our belts, I wanted to share some important reminders with you.

1. As we have previously discussed, being on our game with remote learning is paramount and I don't think we can take a wait-and-see approach for how teachers are doing with synchronous learning. Please make a point to check in sooner rather than later with teachers and see what is happening in the "classroom".

2. Attendance and Engagement Teams. Another critical detail is our quick outreach to students and families who are not engaging. The decision for how many staff in your department to have on-site at any given time is your responsibility to manage. The expectation is that you will ensure your staff will be able to meet the outlined COVID 19 safety precautions, and this may require you to consider alternatives:

Hi All,

I had a chance to talk to TJ this afternoon. He was able to share the following updates:

• You/we have not missed any communications about process for accessing the funds since the 8/12 bulletin.

• OSPI has been working through a process to **determine which Internet Service Providers (ISPs) can meet the parameters** of the funding.

• They have an open Request for Qualifications that outlines the specific parameters (see RFQ 2021-02 <u>at this link</u>)

 \circ To date OSPI has received **6 responses from ISPs**. They are in the process of reviewing them and executing individual agreements with each ISP.

• Specifically they are reviewing the coverage area and overlaps in service areas for the providers to assure statewide reach and access.

• Yes, there will be **2 "prongs" to the payment/reimbursement process** intended for the duration of the 2020/21 school year.

1. **Districts that have front-loaded** funding to ISPs for families will have an **opportunity to seek reimbursement** from OSPI. Likely through an iGrants process. OSPI understands some districts have entered into agreements with ISPs for their families already and will be developing a process for them to get reimbursed.

a. Information will be released on this process as soon as it is available. At this point OSPI's priority is securing the process for work with ISP vendors. I believe the plan would be to include this process information in any communication about #2 below.

2. **OSPI payments to ISP providers.** Currently they plan to have ISP vendors sign up families through a process where families will self-certify their FRL eligibility. ISPs will provide a report to OSPI that will be validated in order to

receive their payment. There are no plans for these new funds to flow from directly from districts to ISPs.

a. The OSPI team is working through details of the process as we speak and TJ hopes to issue information on this process by next Friday, 9/11 - likely through a formal bulletin to the field.

b. The role of districts will be to help make families aware of the opportunity and how to connect with the ISPs.

Hopefully this helps at least give you an idea as to where things stand with the process and the anticipated timeline for more info from OSPI.

Funds to Connect 60,000 Students to Online Learning Released

Through the CARES Act, Congress allocated funds to local school districts and to state education agencies to provide support in covering emergency COVID-19 costs.

OLYMPIA — **August 12, 2020** — Last spring when Washington's K–12 schools were closed for in-person learning, school districts across the state pulled together every laptop, tablet, smartphone, and wifi hotspot they could so students were able to continue learning and educators could continue teaching.

This spring, to help with COVID-related costs, Congress allocated \$195 million to Washington's school districts and \$21 million to the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) for statewide coordination and support.

Last week, the Legislature and the Office of Financial Management (OFM) released \$8.8 million of OSPI's share of the funds so OSPI could coordinate and pay for getting students connected to their coursework online.

"With these funds, we will be able to connect up to 60,000 students and their families to online learning," said Chris Reykdal, Superintendent of Public Instruction. "This was my number one priority for CARES Act funding, and I know this will make a huge difference for a lot of students and their families.

OSPI plans to enter into agreements with private partners to provide internet connectivity to students who are low-income. OSPI will cover the costs of internet for these families through the end of the 2020–21 school year.

"Access to internet is an equity issue, and I intend to use this jump start of one-time federal funds to create a push for universal basic education connectivity," Reykdal continued. "I am thankful the Legislature and OFM released these funds to us.

Two weeks ago, OFM and the Legislature released <u>\$2.5 million for professional</u> <u>development for educators</u> to learn to effectively use and streamline online learning platforms. With the remaining roughly \$10 million provided by Congress to OSPI, the agency intends to fund competitive grants for community-based organizations (CBOs) to work in partnership with local school districts to support student learning in the 2020–21 school year.

"We know the pandemic has further exacerbated gaps in access to learning for some of our students," Reykdal said. "Our system has transformed very rapidly to create a more predictable and effective remote learning experience for students and families this fall. Moments of crisis create opportunities, and our investments in training, connectivity, and community-based partners will make us a stronger public education system when we put COVID-19 in the rearview mirror."

Within the next couple of weeks, school districts will provide instructions and details on internet connectivity to students and families who may be eligible.

- Schedule use of conference rooms with direct supervisor and honor capacity restrictions
- Limit restroom capacity to two or less at any given time
- Practice proper hand hygiene

The decision for how many staff in your department to have on-site at any given time is your responsibility to manage. The expectation is that you will ensure your staff will be able to meet the outlined COVID 19 safety precautions, and this may require you to consider alternatives:

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

Supervisors must keep this in mind when making decisions about employees working on-site at the ESC.

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Wear face coverings at all times you are inside except behind closed office doors

Work on-site at the direction of your immediate supervisor

While working on-site we expect staff to use email, Zoom, or phone for communications with others

Work in your own given space and do not cross over into other departments/areas

Do not congregate within workspaces or common areas

Lunchrooms may be utilized to prepare food and store foods but not used for breaks or gatherings

Complete the "Health Attestation Form" upon arriving online daily

- Complete the "Building Access Tracking Form" upon departing online daily
- Adjacent or diagonal cubicles will not have people working in them at the same time
- Physical/social distancing of 6 feet or greater at all times from other humans
- Schedule use of conference rooms with direct supervisor and honor capacity restrictions

Limit restroom capacity to two or less at any given time

Practice proper hand hygiene

One person in an elevator at a time

The decision for how many staff in your department to have on-site at any given time is your responsibility to manage. The expectation is that you will ensure your staff will be able to meet the outlined COVID 19 safety precautions, and this may require you to consider alternatives:

Flexible scheduling of staff (alternating work days or hours)

Assigning staff to alternate workspaces to ensure that social distancing can be maintained



Question for you: Do you have a limit on how many we can buy? They are \$240 each for a 12-month period.

T-mobile needs us to sign a COVID Special contract for these. They said we can have the contract be for much more than we actually submit a purchase order for. So, we could make it for 100, but only order 10 at a time like we have been doing. This will eliminate the need to have Lydia/Chris Cullison sign the same contract over and over again.

However, if you had a limit, then we would want to know about this so we don't exceed this.

We are buying a SERVICE (internet access) not GOODS. We get the device free as a bonus for subscribing to 12-months of service. So, we can spend up to \$250,000 before needing a formal bid process. This is over 1,000 T-mobile hotspot service.

We are also getting ready to submit an order for more student mobile hotspots. We ordered 400 last Spring and I think we need at least that many now since the majority of the families have multiple students who are trying to Zoom at the same time and 1 mobile hotspot will not work. It is less expensive to buy more of the standard mobile hotspots than to buy stronger ones that can support more concurrent users.

- Free 100GB per year

Chromebooks - Sarah and Chris are working with our school administrators to establish a schedule for when students who don't currently have a Chromebook to be able to pick them up, and for students to get replacement Chromebooks for older models. We are very fortunate that we got approval to order 7,000 Chromebooks in April 2020 because many school districts who waited until the summer to place their orders are finding that they will not receive these until after school starts. When we are done replacing the Chromebooks, we will be shuffling them around so we can ensure that all students will have touch screen Chromebooks, and that we have enough to provide each PreK to Grade 1 students with their own Chromebook. Our original model was 1 Chromebook for each Grade 3-12 student, including Running Start and EDCAP, and 1 Chromebook for every 2 Kindergarten-Grade 1 students. We did not provide Chromebooks to our Pre-K students.

Internet Access - Annette and Cynthia are working on many options to ensure that all of our students can access remote learning.

- Comcast Internet Essentials Sponsorship We have received 500 promo codes and are working closely with Sally and the Family Advocates, and Megan in Food & Nutrition Services to get information to our families who qualify for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP). We have not yet issued a promo code, but anticipate that during this next week we will. We are developing instructions on how to help the families get their accounts set-up and connected.
 - OSPI has just started the work to provide something like this to 60,000 families in the State of Washington. We did not wait for this program because it would have resulted in families not having the Internet connections until after school started.
- Mobile Hotspots Last Spring we deployed about 315 Kajeet mobile hotspots. Not all of them
 were used. We are working on making sure that students who have graduated or left the school
 district have returned them. We are also going to be reaching out to these families to see if
 Comcast connection will work better for their housing situation. We are planning to buy some
 additional hotspots that are supported by other cellular providers.
- District WiFi from outside of our facilities We are installing outside wireless access points at our 4 comprehensive high schools. We did this at the ESC back parking lot and have found that you can be in a car with a Chromebook and connect to a Zoom meeting. We have also visited all of our other schools to identify covered areas where students could go and connect to our district WiFi network.
- Community WiFi We are reaching out to cities in our district to see if they have any plans to provide Internet connections. Both the City of Edmonds and City of Lynnwood Parks & Recreation Dept are working on this.
- WiFi-equipped Buses We just started research on using our school buses to provide Internet access for our students.

Attendance - Based on OSPI's recent guidance on attendance, we are developing ways to track student logins to our learning management systems (Canvas, SeeSaw, Edgenuity), and ways that teachers can let us know if they had not had any interactions with a student nor an evidence of participation in a task or assignment.

The very mention of VDI is triggering my 'IT PTSD' from a past Horizon deployment that consumed a massive amount of time and money to stand up and maintain. ;) I think we're looking at leveraging cloud VDI resources through AWS and Azure for this remote-learning use case. It's likely not as flexible as an on-prem VDI environment but if you don't have a pile of high speed servers and storage sitting around this may be a good option.

I seem to recall someone on the list mentioned making their existing CTE workstations available via a protocol like RDP for those students that would likely use them. For students with their own hardware (BYOD) you may also be able to publish the binaries for the required apps and provide guidance on installation and configuration.

There will likely be licensing challenges regardless of the route you choose.

Gustavo,

This sounds a lot like the "sponsored Internet Essentials" program, which we are pursuing. In conversations with Lydia, it is our hope to use Cares Act funding for this initiative, so we've been assuming we'll need to apply with Federal (versus less stringent state) procurement guidelines.

My understanding of this funding source is limited, but I believe Edmonds is going to have access to over \$2 million - is that accurate? I am sure there will be other needs for these funds, but our estimate is that the impact will be up to several hundred thousand dollars, at most.

If you hear more about leveraging other Cares Act funding (e.g. at the state level) to provide this service, we'd love to leverage that. For now, I think we should march forward with the assumption that we'll be taking on this expense and leveraging our Cares Act dollars for it. Does that make sense?

Good Morning Building Leaders:

We are a week into the world of remote learning and we know very well that there continue to be questions about many aspects of the model. We wanted to try and clarify a couple of them in this email knowing that this may generate additional questions and also knowing that there are other issues that this email may not address--we'll keep working on this.

1. Office Hours- one of the things that we have heard about the implementation of Office Hours is that there is inconsistency with how teachers are using them. As an example, some teachers are asking students to email if they need to speak with their teacher during Office Hours. We want to help you in communicating the expectation to teachers and this understanding is shared by EEA--teachers are expected to be available to students on Zoom for Office Hours. Teachers may have other activities going during Office Hours such as science demonstrations, small group workshops with students, etc. but the practice of asking students to email if they need to see a teacher during Office Hours is not supported. Teachers should plan to open up a Zoom meeting, communicate to students that this is where they can go for help, and be available to students as needed during Office Hours.

2. Canvas/Seesaw- One of the key tasks in front of you this year is supporting your teachers in meeting the expectations for remote learning. It has come to our attention that a handful of teachers have not set courses in Canvas or Seesaw that meet the expectations defined in the EEA MOU. It is critical that teachers get support if needed to make sure they have their LMS in the prescribed format now. We are asking you to create a quick Google Form that requests your teachers provide a link to their LMS homepage(s). For example, with secondary Canvas, you could request the teacher name, course title, & link to the course Canvas homepage via Google Form. This would provide you with a spreadsheet with a link to all of your teachers' pages. Building administrators have administrator access to the LMS, so the links will take you right into the LMS, and you won't need permissions, etc. The LMS expectations are included in the attached MOU summary document for your reference and to use in supporting your teachers.

Good Morning All:

As we have reopened our offices to support staff coming into buildings and also to meet the needs of our community who may require to access someone at their schools, we have been working to identify what the minimum staffing levels are for our school offices. With that in mind, we have developed the following expectations for staffing on-site in offices at each level. Please keep in mind that as teachers access their classrooms for remote learning and as you work to develop your individual school's office staffing plans in alignment with the staffing levels we have identified, you **must** ensure that all staff who are on-site are following all of the following health protocols:

Wear face coverings at all times you are inside except behind closed office doors

Work on-site at the direction of your immediate supervisor

While working on-site we expect staff to use email, Zoom, or phone for communications with others

•

Work in your own given space and do not cross over into other departments/areas

•

Do not congregate within workspaces or common areas

•

Lunchrooms may be utilized to prepare food and store foods but not used for breaks or gatherings

Complete the "Health Attestation Form" upon arriving online daily

•

Complete the "Building Access Tracking Form" upon departing online daily

٠

Adjacent or diagonal cubicles will not have people working in them at the same time

Physical/social distancing of 6 feet or greater at all times from other humans

Schedule use of conference rooms with direct supervisor and honor capacity restrictions

Limit restroom capacity to two or less at any given time

Practice proper hand hygiene

• One person in an elevator at a time

Good Afternoon:

I wanted to share some really good thinking that the team at EWHS did last year regarding student discipline in a remote setting. As you deal with specific situations, this list of behavior interventions can be really helpful and I would encourage you to use these tools as they are appropriate.

The behavior intervention tools that are useful in a remote learning environment:

- Parent Contact (Phone or Email)
- Student/Parent Meeting (Phone or Zoom)
- Written apology to teacher and/or class for disrupting the learning of the class.
- Behavior Contract outlining behavior expectations
- Intervention assignments topics could be research appropriate online behavior, the impacts of poor online behavior.
- Class Exclusions a teacher can decide to exclude a student when disruptive, should contact the parent. If the exclusion is more than 10 minutes, the teacher should report it to admin to be tracked in Skyward or for further disciplinary action. A teacher exclusion should be no longer than one class meeting.
- Short Term Suspension from participating in large class meetings An administrator can determine that the behavior is severe or ongoing to merit excluding a student for multiple class meetings. Other interventions would have to be attempted first. The student would then need to be in contact with the teacher by email and using Canvas to access their education.
- Long Term Suspension It is determined by an administrator that the student's behavior is so severe (other students feel unsafe, behavior is preventing learning for other students on a continuous basis, other actions have been attempted). The student would be suspended from participating in class meetings and continue to be suspended if/when school opens. The student would access learning through emailing the teacher and Canvas or the student would be moved to eLearning.

As I begin my tenure in Edmonds SD, I will work with you to ensure that we continue to focus our equity work for ALL students to succeed, we will complete our strategic planning process that will be used to develop our budget and create a multiyear road map for the district, and we will communicate with you often and in different formats.


Despite the many challenges we are all dealing with due to the pandemic, I know we will come out better because of it as a school district. And I do believe that education will be different moving forward and that excites me.

Cheer

OSPI and DOH released guidelines to WIAA for starting school sponsored summer athletics as well as fall sports. Below is today's release from WSRMP regarding restarting athletics as well as links to WIAA guidelines. The WIAA link has start-up guidelines for all fall sports as well as cheer and dance/drill. The bottom of the WSRMP email has sample Covid waivers for athletes, facility use and visitors as well as a sample screening tool. Do we need a waiver for coaches as well? Manny, I'm assuming all of these will need to be transferred to our district letterhead paper and edited for our district. The link to WIAA also has a sample screening document that coaches will need to complete daily.

Here are the sports coaches from our high schools generally hold through July 31st (there is the possibility that some of our spring coaches who missed out on their season may want to do something this summer, which would be baseball, softball, golf & soccer - these sports generally don't hold summer activities). Cross Country Football Volleyball Tennis Basketball Wrestling Track (some schools) Dance

None of our cheer and dance teams had held tryouts for their 20-21 squads and are very eager to hold tryouts ASAP.

Here are some of the questions being asked:

1. Will our district even allow for coaches to meet with athletes between now and July 31st (that's the open window for sport specific "open field/gyms").

2. If so, what will our start date be? Will it be when we hit phase 3? Phase 4? or a specific window like July 6-31, or July 13-31 regardless of what phase we're in?

3. Which sports will we allow? FB & WRE are considered high risk, but football could be less risk if it takes on a 7-on-7 passing format and wrestling could do conditioning.

4. What facilities will we allow to be used? Weight rooms? locker rooms? Mat rooms?

5. Will we allow indoor activities to accommodate volleyball and basketball? If so, what are the sizes of each of our gyms as each individual requires 35 square feet to maintain required physical distancing. Gym size will determine if 50 people can attend, or if it needs to be less. LH, MDH and TH all have Aux gyms which will allow for greater numbers as separate gyms can hold more than 50 combined. EWH could lower their curtains to help with distancing.

6. When can cheer and dance hold tryouts and can they be held indoors? (in the past we have had less than 50 kids turn out for all of our cheer and dance teams)

7. Do we allow outdoor use only and ask the focus to be on conditioning only to minimize equipment, but still get kids out and get them back in shape to minimize injuries when fall sports begin in August (8/19 for football) and (8/24 for XC, GSO, GSW, BTE & VB). Still would need to have a plan for cheer and dance tryouts, which could be held outdoors only with no stunting allowed.

8. Do we need to provide masks for athletes?

Here are some ideas on what we will need before we can allow practices to begin:

1. Release form for all participants & coaches

2. We will need at least 6 thermometers per high school for coaches to take daily temperatures of athletes. We have not ordered any, so we will need these ordered ASAP. Not sure if another order can be placed from the same place Mara ordered from earlier this month.

3. All athletes will be required to bring their own water bottle. Drinking fountains (unless they are touchless) would not be allowed. Outdoor water troughs that FB sometimes uses would not be allowed.

4. Athletes would all be required to come to turnouts with a mask on and bring a ziploc bag, with their name on it, to put their mask on while participating in an activity that doesn't lend a mask to be worn.

5. All coaches will wear masks at all times.

6. Those teams using the gym will require all participants to carry the shoes they'll wear on the court and change into them on the sidelines when they arrive. They will bring their own bag for their belongings and set them 6 feet away from one another on the sidelines and not use the locker room.

7. Determine which restroom at each school will be used for those allowed to practice indoors. 8. Have a porta potty, or porta potties, located for outdoor practices so those teams do not enter the building for any reason, or in the case of EWH use any part of the stadium locker rooms or restrooms.

Please take a look at the document below as well as the guidelines embedded and maybe we can meet soon to develop a plan.

SCHOOL ADMINISTERED ATHLETICS

With Summer officially underway, many districts would like to restart school sports. Today WIAA, released the <u>Guidance for Opening Up High School Athletics & Activities</u>. The document provides guidance for school athletics for each of the four phases of the Safe Start Washington plan. WIAA additionally released <u>sport specific guidelines</u> for cheerleading, cross country, dance/drill, football, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, and volleyball.

WSRMP is not advising a specific start date for school athletics, however we recommend that school athletics do not commence until the district has prepared a written athletic plan, which meets the guidance from the WIAA and is prepared to implement it.

MESSAGE FROM OMBUDSMAN TIM YEOMANS: WHAT WILL IT COST TO REOPEN SCHOOLS?

As superintendents and school boards plan for all the various aspects of reopening schools, there are one time and ongoing costs to be estimated and considered. While there is a general acknowledgement that reopening schools, while complying with COVID 19 requirements, will bring about additional expenses, the extent to which such costs can be effectively estimated has been of very real concern.

This <u>AASA sponsored infographic</u> which depicts and explains the costs for a district of just

under 3,700 students, does an excellent job of identifying the major categories which require financial examination and consideration. The added costs for a district of 20,000 students can be reasonably assumed to be more than 5 times this amount.

Some of these costs may be particular to the time period directly associated with the pandemic. The costs that apply to specific responses, labor and program costs may become an ongoing financial consideration depending on bargained agreements and MOUs as districts move forward into the future.

Taking the time to plan thoughtfully regarding decisions that relate to COVID related responses, labor and program costs is an essential step. It is our hope that you and your district find this resource helpful.

A long time ago I was a member of the 'block all unknown outbound traffic from client networks' club. There was an era when this practice was absolutely appropriate. Like many things in IT, that era has passed now and the advice is largely irrelevant. Continuing this practice at this time will only cause you more grief than the protection you think you're receiving.

K-12 IT is a dynamic environment, with new applications and platforms coming our way every week. The pandemic is no exception. Putting arbitrary outbound firewall rules in the way isn't helping your students, your staff, or your mission. To put it bluntly, being overly controlling with outbound ports / protocols is essentially a form of a denial of service attack against your users.

The hackers of the world gave up on using obscure ports and protocols a long, long time ago. Malware's coming at you through ports you simply can't block (80/443). Yes, you still need to block SMTP outbound to prevent your network from being a source of SPAM. ;)

If you're still in 'the club' and are struggling to make this change, feel free to reach out to me for a private conversation. If a late-adopter like me was able to 'let IT go', I'm willing to bet you can too.

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Hi Garren,

We would be interested in others experiences as well.

We are using Canvas and purchased the premium tier of the video meetings (Big Blue Button). We have been struggling since spring with the webcam connections either not connecting or dropping. We did have a conference call with the BBB team at the beginning of the summer and they assured us they were increasing their resources to support the fall remote learning. So far, it has been a disappointing experience. The entire conference is web based and very resource intensive. The webcam piece seems to be the main hang up from their side. We just learned today that they are cutting the number of visible webcams in a conference to 6. We have seen documentation on BBB support site that the conferences can support 100+ participants, which may be true but it is 100+ without webcams. It was recommended to us by their CEO to limit webcam connections to under 25. We also have had a struggle getting firewall policies in place to allow for their connections to work as expected. They gave us a list of 1,000+ address to add to the allow list. The features and usability just don't compare to Zoom or Teams, but the full integration into Canvas is enticing.

I would guess that of the new year anxiety our staff are having going into this year, 90% of it is regarding the Big Blue Buttons through Canvas. We are currently re-thinking the approach.

Sean,

Our district created a committee to determine a standardized CORE 4 and our live (synchronous) video will be Google Meet and this will integrate with Google Classroom, which is now standard for our district (was a mix of MS, Google and Zoom). If we start or shift to remote learning there is an expectation that teachers will hold virtual office hours with their students and that these hours should be consistent from week to week at mutually convenient times. The final grade level or department expectations of how many days, hours, etc. have not been finalized.

We are distributing more laptops for our teachers to better support them because we had a percentage of teachers that Chromebook just didn't work for them. Much of the complaints revolved around Zoom so I hope Meets works as well in production as our test environments. We are also purchasing additional webcams in the event we are in a hybrid situation or if a teacher would rather use our devices and infrastructure. Lastly, we have purchased Google Enterprise Licensing for multiple reasons, some of which are the increased Google Meet features.

We have a ways to go as far as video policies and procedures but I am hoping we can get that squared away in the near future.



- Your grade level science lead will show you how to utilize the Amplify remote learning resources through Seesaw and Canvas. We will review how students will submit work and complete assessments on these platforms.
- The science teacher leads have worked incredibly hard to make sure that you are prepared to teach science in this new way!

If you are attending one of the options on September 30th or October 1st. **Please register using course code 4054**. The PD course will not ask you which session you wish to attend. We will be providing zoom links for all of the grade level specific sessions. Feel free to join whichever session makes sense for you.

If you are unable to attend the two options above, other make-up training opportunities will be available. However, they will not include a live experience with your grade level science teacher lead.

General Updates:

- Teachers will be following the same grade level Amplify Unit rotation schedule (see slides for rotation schedule). If you are a combo class teacher, please review the Year at a Glance documents as your rotation schedules have been updated.
- Amplify has reduced the units to about 50% to ensure students are able to

access science during these times. Amplify calls these units @home units.

Amplify remote learning resources are found in the program hub (<u>see slides</u> <u>for instructions on how to access</u>). Grades K-6 students will not have access to these materials. Teachers will be pushing out the remote resources through Seesaw or Canvas.

Resources include student friendly google slides and editable google docs (see slides for sample resources). These resources are also available for grades 6-8th. 6th grade students will not be navigating through the Amplify portal, rather, they will be accessing Amplify resources through Canvas.

No physical materials are required to teach these units, Amplify embedded videos of the hands-on activities that are included in the @home units slides.

The schedule for science mirrors that of a flipped classroom model. For grades K-6, there are three, 45 min asynchronous blocks throughout the week, with an option for teachers to assign science on Wednesday. There will be one synchronous opportunity per week. Teachers may teach an additional lesson or reserve certain activities that make sense in a whole group setting, such as student discussions (see slides for sample weekly schedule).

Dear Edmonds School District families,

As we plan for reopening our school buildings in the fall, we want you to know that the health and safety of our students, families, staff, and community members surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic comes first.

This morning, the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) released state guidelines on how schools will reopen this fall. You can read the entire document on the <u>OSPI website</u>. The district is committed to exploring the viability of this reopening plan for in-person instruction.

We want you to know as Dr. Kristine McDuffy steps down from her position at the end of the month, she and our new superintendent, Dr. Gustavo Balderas, are working together with the district leadership to use the new state guidelines to help make specific plans for different school scenarios when we reopen in September.

Our Commitment

We are committed to doing whatever it takes to protect our community's health and ensure that every child can achieve to their highest level. We are committed to working with our schools, educators, families, and community partners to provide equitable support for every student's success, with proven and responsive solutions during this unprecedented time.

How decisions will be made

We have a diverse group of educators who will be working to make the best decisions we can for our students, families and staff. The School Board will also play a critical role in approving any plans as we move into the 2020-21 school year.

Our COVID-19 Emergency Response team includes representation from the following: Superintendent, Cabinet, Technology, Student Health Services, Human Resources, Student Learning, Student Services, Business & Finance, Communications & Public Relations, Food & Nutrition Services, Facilities Operations, Diversity, Equity & Outreach, and the District Safety Officer. This team has met regularly since March 2020 and will continue to meet and make operational and logistical decisions for the district.

We also have the Continuous Learning Task Force that has been working to provide educational resources and support as we moved to a distance learning model this spring. This group has continued to meet during the closure and will now be working to plan for the different learning scenarios that could be in place for the start of school in the fall.

Back to the classroom

We all want students back in the classroom. In-person relationships with teachers and friends is important for student success, which is why our primary goal is to bring students back to school, but with recommended measures in place to protect the health and safety of our students and staff.

School will look different

School will look different than it did before the pandemic. We will all need to adjust to the way school will work in the fall so that we can protect health and safety, while also providing the best possible environment for teaching and learning. This means that some of the following measures will likely need to be in place:

Adjustments to classrooms and schedules with changes to accommodate social distancing.

Students and staff will be asked to wear face coverings.

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We will expect students to stay home at the first sign of any symptoms, including cough, fever, or shortness of breath.

Preparing for several different scenarios

Schools operating on split or rotating schedules, along with continuous remote learning.

Phased-in reopening of schools with continuous remote learning.

Continuous Learning 2.0 (similar to the remote learning in the spring of 2020, but with significant improvements).

While we want students back in the classroom, we need to be prepared in the event that we have to use a distance learning model again if our public health partners find a resurgence of infections. We will work with families and communities to ensure an equitable approach to remote learning and respond to students' needs. We've learned a lot about how to deliver remote learning well, and we'll continue to adjust and improve moving forward.

We know that remote learning raises questions for childcare and food security, and we will have plans in place to address those needs.

Hearing from our community

Earlier this week, the district sent out a Continuous Learning Survey to all 3rd-12th grade students, as well families and teachers. Your voice and input is critical for us and we will use this data in our future planning. For those families who have not yet taken the <u>survey</u>, we ask that you do so by Tuesday, June 16, 2020.

We will continue to update you

We expect that our back-to-school planning efforts will be ongoing throughout the summer and our plans and strategies may need to be adjusted and refined as we approach the start of the new school year. Clear and transparent decision-making is a priority for us, and we will provide regular updates to make sure you have the latest information.

Thank you!

We again want to thank our students, families and staff for working with us to address these challenging times. We are on this journey together.

The Fundamental Course of Study consists of 28 hours of training, seven of which are required to be provided in person. Paraeducators in our school district need 1 more hour of in-person training (FCS11) to complete the Fundamental Course of Study.

To meet this requirement, Principals will provide a 1 hour in-person training for their paraeducators on September 8, 2020. The objectives, guidelines, deadlines, and goals for this training can be found below.

FCS11: Communication Basics (1 hour of In-Person Training)

Training Objectives

•

Identify the communication skills required for working with team members

Explain the importance of decision making as it applies to schoolbased teams

•

Explain the four stages of developing effective teams

- Describe questioning strategies which improve performance, productivity and clarify misunderstandings
- , Identify strategies used to initiate and receive feedback regarding student learning and/or personal performance
- Describe ways to apply conflict resolution strategies

Knowledge Competencies

(A) Knowledge of how multiple communication methods contribute to collaborative teamwork

(B) Knowledge of the need to respect individual differences among all students, families, and staff

(C) Knowledge of the importance of giving and receiving feedback regarding

student learning and/or personal performance

Skill Competencies

(A) Demonstrate the ability to initiate and provide relevant feedback regarding

job duties, performance tasks, and student learning outcomes

(B) Demonstrate ability to apply feedback regarding student learning outcomes and/or personal performance

- What is the deadline for providing this training?

Principals must provide the training <u>on</u> or <u>before</u> September 8, 2020. September 8, 2020 is the first scheduled work day for most paraeducators.

- Do I have to provide training on FCS11? Or can I provide training on another topic/course?

Principals must provide training on the objectives and competency goals for FCS11 (see above). Per PESB, "all training provided to paraeducators must meet the learning objectives and standards as written in the course outline."

- Do I need to create my own training coursework? Do I need to use the attached training document?

Building cultures and protocols differ from building to building, for that reason Principals must create their own training based on the objectives, knowledge competencies, and skill competencies of FCS11. Principals can tailor the FCS11 training to their specific program/building. For example, you may want to train your paraeducator about a special reporting structure or communication strategy for your program/building. The attached OSPI training materials can be used as a guide or a reference for creating your own training (especially pages 18-21).

- Were the in-person training requirements modified, due to COVID-19? (updated July 1, 2020)

To support districts as they navigate traditional and virtual classroom options, the Paraeducator Board has issued an emergency rule providing greater flexibility to meet training requirements for paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study. The new emergency rule allows districts to meet the in-person requirement if they provide training to paraeducators through a virtual format with an instructor that uses synchronous learning.

- What are the requirements for providing training (traditional or virtual format)?

1) The training must be a synchronous learning experience (real-time or live); and

2) Attendance or "roll call" must be taken before or after the training; and

3) Principals must provide 1 hour of training (in a classroom, in a building, via Zoom, or with a similar application of their choice).

- How do paraeducators claim credit for the training?

I (Jared Rodriguez) will be working with PD Portal Staff to ensure that paraeducators are given credit for attending this training.

1) Please send the attached attendance document to me (Jared Rodriguez) via email and/or district mail. This document will then be forwarded to PD Portal staff. Without it, paraeducators cannot be given credit by PD Portal staff. The attendance document does <u>not</u> need to be signed by each paraeducator, however, it <u>must</u> have the principal's signature. Principals can assign the attendance task to Office Managers. However, principals must conduct/direct the training themselves.

2) After the training has been completed, paraeducators must be given a few minutes to login to PD Portal to self-register and submit evaluations for **Course# 4048**. The last day for submitting evaluations is September 30, 2020.





Substitute FAQ for Principals and OMS

How will subs pick up assignments?

• All assignments will be posted in Frontline like they normally would.

What subs are able to work?

• All Cert subs in Frontline have been trained to work in the remote learning environment.

 $\,\circ\,$ All classified subs that are active in Frontline.

How do subs sign in and out?

 $\circ~$ The OM should email the PDF of the sign in sheet to the employee who is out and the sub. Then the employee and sub would need to return the signed sheet via mail or drop off to the OM.

• Obviously, if anyone is reporting to the school they can sign in and out in person.

Where do subs report?

• Cert subs – They can report to the school to work if they need a workstation or they can work from home if they have adequate technology. We are working on identifying laptops for subs as well. This is still being arranged and I will update everyone of that process when it is established.

• Para subs will report to the school.

• Office subs are at the schools discretion. If you need them in the building please review all safety expectations. If they are able to work from home, please call and confirm they have the technology needed to complete the tasks for the assignment.

What do subs need when they arrive?

- o Subs need to fill out the visitor attestation google doc.
- o Subs need to sign in.
- o Review of any additional safety protocols in your building.
- o Given a workspace for working online.
- Any additional instructions from the employee (materials, plans etc)

When can subs work?

 $\,\circ\,$ Subs can be assigned Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. There are no cert or para subs on Wednesdays.

What do teachers need to do to prepare for an absence?

- Enter their absence in Frontline.
- Attach plans to their absence or email the sub their plans.

 $\,\circ\,$ The night before the assignment, the teacher needs to add the sub as a cohost of their Zoom classroom.

- o Have all assignments and materials in Canvas.
- o The sub WILL NOT have access to the Canvas.

How do subs get access to the teachers Canvas?

• Subs do not have a canvas account. The sub will not access the teachers Canvas/Seesaw directly. Teachers wanting subs to have access to their LMS course, will need to create a screencast showing them and send the screencast to the sub along with their lesson plans, Zoom links, etc.

How do subs get access to the teachers Zoom?

o Teachers will need to make the sub a cohost of their Zoom.

What do we need to know about Para Subs?

- o Para subs will report to the school.
- The school is responsible for reviewing safety protocols.

• If the para is expected to work online (for example, attend a zoom classroom), they will need access to a workspace at the school.

• We recommend that all para employees have a detailed daily schedule and plan for a substitute. The employee can attach this to their absence in Frontline to easy access.

What do we need to know about Cert Subs?

• I have attached the Cert FAQ for your reference.

The Fundamental Course of Study consists of 28 hours of training, seven of which are required to be provided in person. Paraeducators in our school district need 1 more hour of in-person training (FCS11) to complete the Fundamental Course of Study.

To meet this requirement, Principals will provide a 1 hour in-person training for their paraeducators on September 8, 2020. The objectives, guidelines, deadlines, and goals for this training can be found below.

FCS11: Communication Basics (1 hour of In-Person Training)

Training Objectives

Identify the communication skills required for working with team members

- Explain the importance of decision making as it applies to schoolbased teams
- Explain the four stages of developing effective teams

Describe questioning strategies which improve performance, productivity and clarify misunderstandings

Identify strategies used to initiate and receive feedback regarding student learning and/or personal performance

Describe ways to apply conflict resolution strategies

Knowledge Competencies

(A) Knowledge of how multiple communication methods contribute to collaborative teamwork

(B) Knowledge of the need to respect individual differences among all students, families, and staff

(C) Knowledge of the importance of giving and receiving feedback regarding student learning and/or personal performance

Skill Competencies

(A) Demonstrate the ability to initiate and provide relevant feedback regarding

job duties, performance tasks, and student learning outcomes

(B) Demonstrate ability to apply feedback regarding student learning outcomes and/or personal performance

- What is the deadline for providing this training?

Principals must provide the training <u>on</u> or <u>before</u> September 8, 2020. September 8, 2020 is the first scheduled work day for most paraeducators.

- Do I have to provide training on FCS11? Or can I provide training on another topic/course?

Principals must provide training on the objectives and competency goals for FCS11 (see above). Per PESB, "all training provided to paraeducators must meet the learning objectives and standards as written in the course outline."

- Do I need to create my own training coursework? Do I need to use the attached training document?

Building cultures and protocols differ from building to building, for that reason Principals must create their own training based on the objectives, knowledge competencies, and skill competencies of FCS11. Principals can tailor the FCS11 training to their specific program/building. For example, you may want to train your paraeducator about a special reporting structure or communication strategy for your program/building. The attached OSPI training materials can be used as a guide or a reference for creating your own

training (especially pages 18-21).

- Were the in-person training requirements modified, due to COVID-19? (updated July 1, 2020)

To support districts as they navigate traditional and virtual classroom options, the Paraeducator Board has issued an emergency rule providing greater flexibility to meet training requirements for paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study. The new emergency rule allows districts to meet the in-person requirement if they provide training to paraeducators through a virtual format with an instructor that uses synchronous learning.

- What are the requirements for providing training (traditional or virtual format)?

1) The training must be a synchronous learning experience (real-time or live); <u>and</u>

2) Attendance or "roll call" must be taken before or after the training; and

3) Principals must provide 1 hour of training (in a classroom, in a building, via Zoom, or with a similar application of their choice).

- How do paraeducators claim credit for the training?

I (Jared Rodriguez) will be working with PD Portal Staff to ensure that paraeducators are given credit for attending this training.

1) Please send the attached attendance document to me (Jared Rodriguez) via email and/or district mail. This document will then be forwarded to PD Portal staff. Without it, paraeducators cannot be given credit by PD Portal staff. The attendance document does <u>not</u> need to be signed by each paraeducator, however, it <u>must</u> have the principal's signature. Principals can assign the attendance task to Office Managers. However, principals must conduct/direct the training themselves.

2) After the training has been completed, paraeducators must be given a few minutes to login to PD Portal to self-register and submit evaluations for **Course# 4048**. The last day for submitting evaluations is September 30, 2020.

Greetings,

This broadcast is to share with you information that EDFacts has received.

The FBI is providing situational awareness to stakeholders in the K-12 educational system during the COVID-19 pandemic regarding the ransomware threat. Cyber actors are likely to increase targeting of K12 schools during the COVID-19 pandemic

because they represent an opportunistic target as more of these institutions transition to distance learning. K-12 schools have increased their reliance on technology for different school operations, such as teaching, learning, or administrative functions. This shift has created greater risks for schools, as they now must depend on remote tools. In general, however, K-12 institutions have limited resources to dedicate to network defense, leaving them vulnerable to cyber-attacks. Furthermore, public pressure and the threat of releasing victim data may create an elevated urgency for schools to pay ransoms.

The FBI does not encourage paying a ransom to cyber actors. Paying a ransom may embolden adversaries to target additional organizations, encourage other criminal actors to engage in the distribution of ransomware, and/or may fund illicit activities. Paying the ransom also does not guarantee that a victim's files will be recovered. However, the FBI understands that when schools are faced with an inability to function, administrators will evaluate all options to protect their communities. Regardless of whether you or your organization have decided to pay the ransom, the FBI urges you to report ransomware incidents to your local field office. Doing so provides investigators with the critical information they need to track ransomware attackers, hold them accountable under US law, and prevent future attacks. In addition to the above recommendations, the following actions are also suggested:

- Retain multiple uninfected backups of critical data and applications. These backups should be air-gapped and password protected.
- Develop an approved white list of applications and processes allowed to run in your environment.
- Use File Integrity Monitoring to detect changes of critical OS files and processes.
- Follow the principle of Least Privilege for Access Control. Each user should have the least privileges needed for their job.
- Have penetration testing conducted by experts to ensure your organization is maintaining an acceptable security posture.
- Monitor or block IP addresses from known malicious actors.
- Educate your workforce on current and emerging cybersecurity risks and vulnerabilities.
- Implement endpoint protection solutions such as antivirus and antimalware.
- Enact multifactor authentication wherever possible.
- Ensure network segmentation.
- Disable RDP and other remoting options except when necessary.
- Keep software updated. Install software patches so that attackers can't take advantage of known problems or vulnerabilities.
- Conduct regular internet searches for student, faculty, and staff information to monitor its possible exposure and spread on the internet.

Christiane,

Thanks for your email; you raise important points. There is a lot of merit in your suggestions about working with our university partners to see if there are ways to work together to meet some of the childcare and educational needs of students. I am including Dr. Helen Joung on this reply; she is on point for developing options for childcare and will appreciate these recommendations.

As for your questions, we recognize the limitations of a survey without more information about what a "100% online option" actually means. Our thinking at this stage is to get information from each family about their plans at this point in time. In other words, based on the information families have today, what would they choose -- in-person or fully remote learning? This will allow us to understand the demand more fully and then be able to develop, what we hope is, the optimal remote learning option. I agree that if we said today that our remote learning option for high school students is to enroll in the eLearning Academy, then you would have more information on which to base your decision. We are just not far enough in the development process to give more definitive information--I fully understand the challenge this presents.

We are anticipating that things will continue to change over the next several weeks as well that will impact families' decision making--infection rates, more clarity about our instructional models, state guidance, etc.. With this, we intend to survey at additional points in time prior to the start of school to see if there are changes in families' plans. As we finalize our reopening plans, we will communicate these and will certainly allow families to change their plans--- we

are not asking for a firm commitment from families at this time. We would absolutely allow for you to change your option as you know more.

You ask a great question about IB. At this time, I can't give you a firm answer. We recognize this presents the same challenge for students intending to take Advance Placement or College in the High School courses as well. It will really come down to scale--how many of our IB students request a fully remote option? This will dictate our options in terms of possible programs. As an example, if a significant number of IB students choose the remote option, we could possibly reallocate current staffing in the program and run a remote IB option. However if the number is small, we have less ability to reallocate staffing, and our ability to provide an IB program remotely becomes more difficult. I think this illustrates a bit of the complexity.

Thank you for your thoughtful considerations and work in preparation of the upcoming 2020/21 school year. It seems like an almost insurmountable task and I truly appreciate your circumspection in the manner you approach this problem.

As I was following the school board meeting last night I had a few questions that you might answer in the FAQs you talked about posting alongside the survey about full online schooling vs hybrid schooling. Also a comment/idea I would like to propose (see 3 & 4).

1. You mentioned the **survey** to gauge how many families are deciding to have their students go completely online. I don't think it is fully clear what that option really entails. I heard you say that the teachers teaching fully online would be different from the ones teaching in person. While that makes complete sense simply because there is no way teachers can support both models simultaneously, I would need some more information on which teachers exactly would be teaching in the fully online model. Also: I have one student in HS who is now starting his *IB program* (11th Gr). If he were to choose the fully online model, would the teachers teaching it be fully trained IB teachers?

2. How binding are the selections we make in the survey? If we say we are choosing fully online, will there still be a chance to commit to hybrid later in August, and vice versa?

3. While I am lucky and do not require childcare for my own kids anymore, I am concerned about others. Question: There are a lot of people studying to become teachers. What if the school district and the colleges could work something out where student teachers had to help out in the child care centers

for those children who were attending 2 days in school and 3 days online. Student teachers could help the kids at the day cares with their online learning, answer questions, motivate them to actually do the online assignments, so that then the parents who picked up their children at night would not have to add that to their schedule. Student teachers would not get paid but they could do this for 3 months as a requirement for graduation. They would be supplemental staff at the day care centers, specifically targeting learning. Available for 3 hours every day.

I understand that this would require coordination and most likely be opposed by the colleges as graduation requirements are not easily/quickly changed. However, desperate times require creativity.

4. Similarly, student teachers could be used to help other kids who are working on their online assignments from home and have questions. Since teachers will not be available to answer questions as they will be teaching the other cohort, student teachers could be a "help line," they are assigned to a specific school or even class. Again, maybe they could earn a credit.

All principals and department heads will begin to receive health attestation emails from their staff ***ONLY IF*** an employee's attestation form indicates one of the following:

They have tested positive for COVID-19.

NEXT STEPS

When you receive one of these emails here are the steps you need to take:

1.

Contact your employee to confirm their attestation is correct and make sure they do not enter a district building.

If the information on the attestation is not correct or was entered in error, verify if the staff member is in fact a risk to be in the building. If they are not a

risk, provide training on how to complete the attestation process and encourage the staff member to read the questions thoroughly.

If they are a risk, the staff member is to be sent home and steps 2 and 3 will need to be completed.

2.

Contact the HR representative for the staff member's employee group.

3.

HR will contact Student Health Services and Facilities Operations to decide next steps for your department/building.

MORE INFORMATION

Currently, only one administrator per school or department will receive these messages. Additional administrators can be added to these groups. See this <u>Google Help Article</u> for instructions.

The Health Attestation Form for our employees is being operated through the company Qualtrics. Dashboard training for the platform will be available to you by the end of the month. By using the dashboard, principals and department heads will be able to see a daily report of your employees who did or did not fill out the health attestation form. This part of the product is still being built at this time.

In addition, in a hybrid learning model, this dashboard will give school principals and designees access to real-time attestation data for their student body.

This message was created to highlight SMS 2.0 system tools a district may use to comply with return to school requirements issued by Washington State Department of Health (DOH) and Washington State Department of Labor & Industries (L&I). General Guidance states not to allow students, staff, vendors, parents, guardians or guest onsite if they are showing symptoms of COVID-19 and/or have been in close contact with someone who has a confirmed or suspected COVID-19 in the last 14 days. For further information please refer to K -12 Schools- Fall 2020-21 Guidance and Considerations for K-12 Schools: Readiness and Planning Tool. The content in this Informational Message is intended to provide general guidance and can be implemented or revised according to each district's needs.

This document provides configuration options to obtain Health Attestation information using the following modules:

- Custom Forms
- Online Forms

Custom Forms

Skyward Custom Forms are created to collect Human Resources and employee-related data. A user can also import data from files, adjust security to control access and easily view and print entered data. This tool can be used for Health Screening required for all staff and students at entry each day. For further details please refer to the *WSIPC Guide to Custom Forms* which can be found on the NWRDC website.

Note Please consider HIPAA requirement to safeguard protected health information. Should your district determine that HIPA regulations apply to this type of data be sure to restrict security accordingly.

When creating your Custom Forms, consider whether your district will require a single updatable

form and ask the employee to update only if health conditions changed. Alternatively, the district may require a new record for every workday. Based on these decisions the configurations will need to be set accordingly. To allow employees to complete the forms the use of Employee Access is required.

Requesting Update Only




Figure 1-Form Type Configuration

District can choose to have an employee submit an initial Health Screening form and expect the employee to submit a new form only if health conditions have changed. For this method it will be important to configure the Custom Form Type as "Multiple forms per employee" to allow for retention of historical data (Figure 1).

New Entry per Workday

The district may require a new entry be completed for every workday. The same Custom Form can be used to accommodate this approach by configuring the Custom Form Type as "Multiple forms per employee" (Figure 1). Consider adding the date as a Custom Form field for historical reference. With the suggested Form Type configuration, every time the employee completes the Custom Form a new record is created.

Custom Form Fields

For ease of layout consider using the Advanced Custom Forms screen to display the data fields. In the example below we decided to use the content provided by the DOH listed under "<u>Health</u> <u>Screening at Entry</u>" to be answered in yes/no format (Figure 3).

The data gathered through Custom Forms can be viewed and reported on through Data Mining, Custom Form Browse Screen and Employee Profile. Consider what fields/values you'd like to view for analysis of employee health data. In our example, YES/NO values help easily identify current employee health and exposure to COVID (Figure 4). The responses should all be equal to "No" otherwise the district would need to take immediate action. These fields will remain available until the district decides otherwise. If the district decides to no longer keep such data, the deletion of the Custom Forms will also remove the data contained in the Custom Form.

Online Forms

The Online Forms module allows the creation of a customizable step by step procedure for employees to complete when logged into Employee Access. This tool tracks completion and provides the ability to mass email notifications related to the process. The district can include various elements within each step of the Online Form. One of the steps can be to complete the Custom Form, providing visibility to the request. Additional steps can be added to the Online Form and updated to include training materials, website links and more. Please refer to the NWRDC *Online forms documentation* that can be found on the NWRDC website.

In this example, the district has decided to use Online Forms for multiple purposes broken out into three steps:

- Step 1: Provides educational material via a link.
- Step 2: Requesting completion of the attestation of employee health via the Custom Form.

• Step 3: Provides a reminder to the employee to request PPE supplies if needed in their work environment. Also includes an attachment with information provided by the <u>CDC</u> (Figure 5).

Once the Online Form is complete, the next step would be to activate the form so it is available to the employee via Employee Access. Notifications upon logging into Employee Access only appear if an Online Form is incomplete. For the notification to appear each day, the date range will need to be restricted for the specific day and a new Online Form will need to be activated daily. The daily Online Form can be cloned from day to day and include a future activation date (Figure 6).

Although Custom Forms can be used in conjunction with an Online Form, it <u>does not</u> monitor or track the Custom Form data fields. To view what has been completed in the attached Custom Form the user must use Data Mining, Custom Form Browse or Employee Profile.

The issue is that while the workshops are offered through "Lifewire", payment seems to be facilitated through PayPal on the host website, Eventbrite.com. Starting tomorrow, Wednesday, Sept. 16, 2020, all principals and department heads will begin to receive health attestation emails from their staff ***ONLY IF*** an employee's attestation form indicates one of the following:

They have tested positive for COVID-19.

- They have symptoms.
- ٠

They have been exposed to someone who has tested positive for COVID-19.

NEXT STEPS

When you receive one of these emails here are the steps you need to take:

1.

Contact your employee to confirm their attestation is correct and make sure they do not enter a district building.

a.

If the information on the attestation is not correct or was entered in error, verify if the staff member is in fact a risk to be in the building. If they are not a risk, provide training on how to complete the attestation process and encourage the staff member to read the questions thoroughly.

b.

If they are a risk, the staff member is to be sent home and steps 2-3 will need to be completed.

2.

Contact the HR representative for the staff member's employee group.

3.

HR will contact Student Health Services and Facilities Operations to decide next steps for your department/building.

MORE INFORMATION

Currently, only one administrator per school or department will receive these messages. Additional administrators can be added to these groups. See this <u>Google Help Article</u> for instructions.

The Health Attestation Form for our employees is being operated through the company Qualtrics. Dashboard training for the platform will be available to you by the end of the month. By using the dashboard, principals and department heads will be able to see a daily report of your employees who did or did not fill out the health attestation form. This part of the product is still being built at this time, in the interim, please respond to all non-certified to-be at work emails with staff.

In addition, in a hybrid learning model, this dashboard will give school principals and designees access to real-time attestation data for their student body.


Hi there,

Back in March, we made <u>promises</u> to the computer science community to keep the learning going as schools closed around the world. We began this work by supporting our amazing network of administrators, teachers, students, and parents with a variety of new resources for <u>at-home learning</u>.

No one could have predicted how much COVID-19 would disrupt the K-12 school system in the U.S. and it's clear that many classrooms won't look like they did last year. Modifications to help educators


