University Makes Self-Screening Technology for COVID-19 Symptoms Available to Nation's Employers as Open Source Code

Chatbot helps managers make sure it is safe for employees to report to work

Friday, June 12, 2020





ROCHESTER, N.Y., June 12, 2020 – Employers across the country can advance reopening efforts with technology developed by the <u>University of Rochester</u> to check employees for potential COVID-19 symptoms before they report to work each day.

Software code at the heart of a "<u>Dr. Chatbot</u>" screening tool, first created for internal use among health care workers at the University of Rochester Medical Center (URMC), is now available free as open source software. Since April 9, about 9,000 URMC employees have been using the chatbot daily to self-check for COVID-19 symptoms before they report to work. The University's chatbot technology also is the foundation of a "<u>ROC COVID</u>" community screening tool recently launched in thirteen counties in the Finger Lakes, N.Y. region to track potential new outbreaks of COVID-19 cases.

Greater Rochester Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Bob Duffy said, "I commend the University of Rochester for making its Dr. Chatbot software available to the public at no charge. Its use in the ROC COVID health screening tool is playing a critical role in tracking and slowing the spread of the virus in the Rochester and Finger Lakes region. The platform is incredibly easy to use. It takes me less than five seconds to submit my information every day. The U of R's generous decision to make Dr. Chatbot technology available to employers can go a long way in helping them foster a healthy workforce."

University of Rochester's open source code includes:

A simple user interface accessible from an employee's smartphone, tablet, PC or other device

Seven avatars representing a range of friendly onscreen health professionals who conduct the daily symptom checks on a rotating basis

A survey with questions determined by individual employers. Examples could include potential COVID-19 symptoms such as a fever, sore throat, cough, body aches or loss of

taste or smell

Depending on survey answers, employees receive a green check mark if they are cleared for work or a red "X" requiring other action. Employers will determine the call to action, which could be to call their manager, check with a health professional or get a COVID-19 test

Daily email or text messages to remind employees to complete the brief survey questions

The technology was developed by the <u>University of Rochester Health Lab</u>, which works to help transform care delivery through the use of smartphone mobile applications, virtual and augmented reality technologies, and the use of artificial intelligence.

"We developed Dr. Chatbot as an efficient way to screen front-line health workers each day and reduce the potential spread of infection inside our medical center," said Stephen Dewhurst, Ph.D., vice dean for research at the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry. "Based on tremendous interest in our technology from other universities and employers of all types, we realize that our tool can be beneficial far beyond our institution in fighting the spread of COVID-19. We are giving away our code for free to all employers who can use it as a way of giving back during this health crisis."

Michael Hasselberg, M.S., Ph.D., co-director of the University of Rochester Health Lab, called the screening tool a great success story for the project team led by senior software developer Daniel Hudy.

"Our chatbot technology gives employers an incredibly simple-to-use and convenient frontend solution to help keep their workplaces safe and healthy," said. "It will be especially beneficial in New York state, where Governor Andrew Cuomo requires employers to have a system in place for checking employees' health before they can reopen."

How to Access

Institutional IT departments or commercial software developers can use, modify or enhance the University of Rochester code to meet the needs of their organizations or customers. The code, which comes with the standard MIT License for unlimited use and a Read Me file, is accessible on the GitHub software development website on a page hosted by <u>UR Ventures</u>, which protects intellectual property developed by University researchers and helps them commercialize their discoveries. What's next? | Phased reopening plan submitted

University plan outlines testing regimen, space guidelines, and other principles for the fall

The big news this week is that the University has formally submitted to the state **its plan to reopen much of the institution** in a phased process later this summer and into the fall.

The final version of the plan aligns with guidelines and recommendations posted last week by New York Governor Andrew Cuomo. That guidance allows regions of the state to reopen <u>higher education and some arts and cultural</u> <u>institutions</u>, provided the organizations have plans in place to open safely.

Rochester's plan covers a lot of territory, from testing to physical distancing to limits on travel to how many square feet is required per person in labs and other settings. It's the result of many weeks of discussion, research, presentations, and modeling exercises undertaken by <u>a team of planning</u> <u>groups</u> and is worth spending some time reviewing.

In particular, the plan includes details about several key topics, including:

- testing and tracking regimens that will be in place outside the Medical Center, including contact tracing and isolation and quarantine procedures;
- spacing parameters across campus to ensure social and physical distancing;
- outlines for the academic calendar as well as guidelines for classes using a mix of in-person and remote learning experiences;
- guidelines on travel and visitor restrictions to limit potential exposure to the virus.

For the time being, <u>employees who are working from home should</u> <u>continue to do so unless approved to return to campus</u>. Some essential staff have been approved to work on campus and they have been notified by their supervisors.

Ramping up | Campus operations

Research labs and campus dining are getting ready for the fall

While more work has to be done, faculty and staff have been planning how to get back into operation.

In May, many research labs were given the OK to slowly ramp up operations after being out of operation for part of the spring. Using the experience of Medical Center labs that remained open to work on coronavirus and using the best practices of their fields, **labs have begun to prepare for the fall**.

Similarly, Dining Services has had a slight head-start in thinking through how to adjust operations for the fall. A team stayed on campus to make sure students living in residence halls had consistent access to meals, an experience that helped staff <u>outline a plan for the fall.</u>


Introducing the CURT committee



Dear University of Oregon community,

As promised, I am writing today to provide you with information about plans for fall operations at the University of Oregon. Let me first hit the headlines and then I will provide more detail.

- We will shift to primarily remote and online instruction for the fall term.
- In limited circumstances, such as with some labs, studio experiences, and other small classes, we will provide in-person instruction, in accordance with health and safety guidelines.
- We will welcome the freshman class to campus this fall by instituting a robust testing, contact tracing, and isolation and quarantine program in our residence halls. First-year students will participate in an enhanced set of safe and responsible in-person and virtual intellectual, recreational, and social experiences.
- All of our students will have access to remote and in-person services, programs, and activities in places such as the libraries, Erb Memorial Union, and Student Rec Center, where strategies are in place to keep our community safe. There are plenty of quiet, supportive study spaces and on-campus wi-fi.
- Faculty and staff will continue to have access to offices, research facilities, and some classrooms, in accordance with appropriate health and safety guidelines.
- We continue to focus on building our testing and contact tracing capacity and further preparing campus throughout the fall with the goal of returning to predominantly in-person instruction in January 2021.

Much has changed in the months since the UO announced our intention to try to offer an in-person curriculum this fall. We have seen the number of COVID-19 cases rapidly increase nationally, although thankfully the prevalence of infections in Eugene and Lane County has been relatively low. We have learned valuable lessons from other states, communities, and institutions of higher education about what works and, more importantly, what does not work as it relates to managing the spread of the coronavirus. We have also listened to you, the members of the UO community, through direct conversations with campus stakeholder groups, informal chats with friends and peers, as well as through more structured surveys of students, prospective students, faculty, and other employee groups. We have heard your hopes and concerns. We have also listened to the best available public health guidance from the Oregon Health Authority and Lane County Public Health, two agencies that we'll continue to closely coordinate with on an on-going basis. The decision to move to a predominantly remote and online form of instruction in the fall was not easy. We know

that the vast majority of our students are itching to get back into the classroom. Many of our faculty and staff members feel exactly the same way. However, due to a confluence of factors we need to pivot.

When COVID-19 began, I stated the health and safety of our students and faculty was my paramount concern and the decision I am announcing today is rooted in that commitment. Our researchers have led an awe-inspiring effort to build our own state-of-the-art testing program. The capacity that they have built will allow us to open our residence halls this fall. Our teams continue working long hours with our public health partners to expand testing capacity over the fall term. In addition to testing, we also need robust contact tracing. To this end, the UO has been working with local public health authorities to increase contact tracing capacity with our <u>Corona Corps</u>, which provides students an opportunity to assist during the global pandemic. Another factor was that many of the local K-12 school districts announced plans to be 100 percent online through the end of the calendar year, which makes it exceedingly difficult for a large portion of our faculty and staff to be on campus. I recognize the stress this puts on families, which makes it necessary to operate the university in a way that supports UO employees and their families as much as possible during these challenging times. Finally, all of us have watched other institutions abruptly shift gears over the last week or so, and I decided that the potential for disruption to our students and our campus community was just too high. It is far more prudent for the UO to take a more phased approach—as we're seeking to do now.

What does this realistically mean for the coming fall? For most students, we will continue to offer predominantly remote and online instruction. For those of you who are disappointed by this change of plans, I want you to know that our faculty has put a huge amount of effort into preparing classes this fall that will provide the high quality education you have come to expect from the UO. In a limited number of circumstances, such as with some labs, studio experiences, and other small classes, we will provide inperson instruction, in accordance with health and safety protocols. This applies to training opportunities for graduate students. Even though we will largely be remote, many of our campus amenities, resources, and support services—academic and career advising, libraries, the Erb Memorial Union, the Student Rec Center, etc.—will be available to all students (operations, obviously, will adhere to all applicable health and safety protocols). Our campus buildings will not be open to the general public, however, to assist in reducing density on campus and to keep our spaces focused on the UO's core missions of instruction and research.

We will communicate with our first-year students in the coming days, but the underlying message is we want as many freshmen as possible to join us here in Eugene for a rich and rewarding in-person experience. I know how important it is for folks new to college to take part in experiences that make their four years incredibly special. That is why I am very excited about the plans that are taking shape. Students will live in our residence halls, eat at our dining facilities, and have access to a wide range of in-person academic seminars and faculty-led discussions, dozens of Academic Residential Communities (ARCs) and First-Year Interest Groups (FIGs), an expanded Faculty Fellows program, a full complement of academic and career advisors (online and in-person), student clubs and affinity groups, the campus recreation center, organized outdoor activities, and much more. Our goal is to help first-year students build community, make lasting connections with friends and faculty, and become engaged in all the facets of campus life that make the UO such an amazing place to live and learn. All students living in our residence halls will be required to be tested for COVID-19 at move-in, again five to seven days later, and periodically throughout the term.

I would like to address tuition and fees, because I know it will be a question that many students and families will ask about. Even as we shift to a predominantly remote experience, the cost of providing a UO education has not changed nor has the value of a UO degree. We still have to pay our faculty; we still provide academic and career advisors; we still maintain our facilities. In fact, we have increased expenses associated with providing the technological infrastructure for remote and online education and made additional investments in testing, health care, risk reduction strategies, and on-campus programs. For those reasons, and to maintain the long-term viability of the institution, we cannot reduce tuition. All of our financial aid and scholarship programs continue to be available for those who qualify, including PathwayOregon, which covers all tuition and fees for qualified Pell Grant-eligible Oregonians. For those students experiencing financial hardships related to COVID-19, a variety of grants are available through the <u>Office of the Dean of Students</u> and our <u>Office of Student Financial Aid and Scholarships</u> that provide direct financial support for qualifying needs. Indeed, in the spring we gave out more than \$6 million in additional assistance. We will do everything we can to support our students during this unprecedented time.

Finally, we will continue to work hard this fall to expand contact tracing, testing, and other infrastructure needs, so that, by the beginning of the winter term, we will be able to return to classes being predominantly in-person. At no time, however, will we sacrifice the health and safety of our faculty, staff, and students. As I stated back in March and repeatedly since then, it remains above all our top priority. If we do this right, then

we can have a successful fall term and lay the foundation for in-person instruction in 2021. It means that face coverings will be required for everyone on campus and physical distancing will be the norm. It means doing a daily symptom self-check and staying home if you are sick. It means keeping your circle of contacts small, avoiding large social gatherings, and refraining from other activities that could spread the virus. We are a community of Ducks, so let's take care of ourselves and each other so that we can beat COVID-19 and return to something akin to normal.

There will be much more information in the coming days and weeks. Indeed, incoming first-year students can expect many more details about testing and move-in protocols. NYU RETURNS Looking Ahead to Academic Year 2020- 2021's Health Protocols

Since mid-March, when the University closed the student residence halls at our New York Campus and moved to remote classes, NYU's leadership has been looking ahead and working on plans for a return to in-person, oncampus activity to be accompanied by an effective set of health and safety protocols.

Our decision-making is guided, first and foremost, by the health and safety of the NYU community. University Leadership, in consultation with the Public Health Working Group, has been developing an evidence-informed, multilayered public health strategy to reduce the risks to our community posed by COVID-19.

No single intervention will prevent the spread of COVID-19. Rather, the best strategy is to implement 'layers of safety,' each of which decreases the risk. When combined, these individual strategies are designed to be effective in helping to protect the NYU community.

Our plans also emphasize the importance of individual and collective responsibility. We must recognize that in addition to steps the University takes — testing, the required daily symptom check, contract tracing, restrictions on travel, enhanced cleaning, etc. — each student, faculty, staff member, and administrator makes a significant impact on the well-being of the entire NYU community. We must be in this together to *keep each other safe*.

There will doubtless be challenges in 2020-2021. The NYU community has already shown its steafastness and resiliency in the months since the coronavirus spread; more will be required in the months ahead. By being conscientious and committed to one another, we can make the coming year constructive, satisfying, and memorable.

With that as a backdrop, we want to share with you some of the preliminary core elements of our public health strategy. Among the key initiatives and policies we are putting in place to prevent and reduce transmission of COVID-19 within our community are:

• Face Coverings / Masks: All members of the community are required

to wear face coverings over both the mouth and nose at all times when they are on the University campus, with limited exceptions. The University is working to procure a substantial supply of masks, but we strongly urge that community members obtain and use their own face coverings.

- **Physical Distancing**: All members of the community are expected to maintain a 6 ft (2 m) distance from others.
- **Reducing Density in NYU buildings and rooms**: We are reducing density in NYU facilities by:
 - Setting in place enrollment and space capacity caps, adjusting class schedules, ensuring classroom occupancy remains below 50% of total capacity, reconfiguring classrooms, and only using classrooms in which students and faculty can maintain 6-foot distancing.
 - Prohibiting all non-essential, large, in-person gatherings at the start of the semester. The possibility of safely gathering for purposes such as social events or informal get-togethers will be reassessed regularly throughout the semester.
 - Assigning fewer students to our residence halls and securing additional suitable off-campus accommodations.
 - Changing seating and how meals are served in dining facilities, including expanding take-out options.
 - Having units and schools plan for a reduced in-person administrative presence and continued telework by staff and administrators while ensuring that high priority activities teaching and learning, duties performed by essential employees, research activity, supporting students' return to campus — are fully covered.
- **COVID-19 Testing**: We are working to finalize the details of our testing program, including resolving issues involving testing availability and locations, and alignment with the latest public health guidance. Additional details will be available later in the summer. Our testing strategy will involve multiple components:
 - Asking members of the community to get themselves tested prior to reconvening on campus.
 - A testing protocol for those returning to campus, in line with recommendations of medical experts and established best practices.
 - Testing when a member of the community has COVID-like symptoms or has been exposed to someone infected with COVID-19.
 - An ongoing testing program of representative segments of the

NYU community for the purpose of general disease surveillance.

- **Contact tracing**: The NYU COVID-19 Prevention & Response Team will oversee the University's efforts to identify and isolate members of the NYU community with confirmed cases of COVID-19 and find and quarantine their NYU close contacts. We will coordinate and work in collaboration with New York City's NYC Trace program.
- **Quarantine and Isolation**: We are setting aside space within the student housing system for students in University housing who need to isolate or quarantine.
- Symptom Screening the COVID-19 Symptom Check: Those authorized to be on site — a number that will grow as we get closer to the start of classes — will be required to regularly complete a brief questionnaire, accessible on computer and NYU's smartphone app (NYU Mobile) that screens for COVID-19 exposure and symptoms (e.g. elevated temperature, coughing etc). Those who do not have recent COVID-19 exposure or symptoms will receive permission to enter NYU buildings. Those who report a recent exposure or symptoms will be instructed to stay home until they are cleared by the NYU Prevention & Response Team. Members of the NYU community will receive further instruction when they are authorized to be onsite.
- Enhanced Cleaning: Plans for enhanced cleaning, particularly more frequent disinfectant cleaning of high touch surfaces and areas and the placement of additional sanitizing stations, are being formulated.
- Education and Awareness: Working with members of the NYU community, we will implement an expansive public education campaign KEEP each other SAFE to remind members of the community of what they need to do in order to prevent the spread of COVID-19, including:
 - Wearing face coverings over nose and mouth routinely, and *always* when indoors with others
 - Regular, frequent hand-washing and hand-sanitizing
 - Practicing physical distancing of 6 ft (2m) at all times
 - Avoiding attending or arranging large gatherings
- **Compliance**: We expect students and other members of the NYU community to follow the health guidelines we are setting for the good of everyone in the community. However, the campus code of conduct is being modified to permit the Office of Student Conduct to be able to ensure compliance with campus public health rules.
- **Travel Prohibition**: The University currently prohibits all nonessential University-related international travel until further notice. We also encourage members of the University community to keep domestic

air travel to a minimum and to pay close attention to conditions in areas within the US prior to travel.

In the coming year, our dedication to our academic mission will go hand-inhand with our commitment to safety — a commitment that must be shared individually and collectively. Fall 2020 will be an unprecedented semester marked by an unusual degree of uncertainty; for that reason, we will remain flexible in our planning, keenly attentive to changing conditions and the guidance of public health authorities, careful to provide accommodations to those with particular needs, and ready to respond with necessary steps.

Throughout the summer, we will continue to send updates on our public health strategy and on other aspects of academic and campus life; we appreciate your patience. You should consult the University's COVID-related web hub frequently; updates will be posted there as well. We look forward to recovening with the NYU community in fall 2020. In the meantime, we hope you and yours stay healthy and safe.

New York Forward - New York City In

Phase 1

As of today, June 8, New York City is in Phase 1 of the State's reopening plan, called <u>New York Forward</u>.

What does that mean for NYU academic and administrative operations?

The Research Enterprise

The gradual <u>ramp-up of research activity</u> begins today (for health- and defenserelated research), with attendant new safety protocols in the 16 facilities where the increased research activity is occurring. These safety protocols will be features of NYU's later, broader reopening:

- A required <u>Daily COVID-19 Symptom Check</u> to determine whether members of the community can proceed
- Required face coverings in NYU buildings
- Required social distancing

Activities for the Rest of the University Will Be Largely Unchanged

As before, summer courses will be held remotely; administrative personnel should expect to work remotely for most of the summer, at least until some are required for the return of students and other in-person campus activity; essential employees are to continue to report to work.

Looking Ahead

Accommodations Relating to the Resumption of In-Person Activity in the Fall

In planning for the resumption of in-person activity for the fall, schools and units have begun the process of determining who will be working in person and who will be working remotely.

Guidance from the State about Higher Education

Specific guidance for institutions of higher learning is expected from New York State in the near future, perhaps as early as this week. The University will follow with more detailed planning for the fall later in June.

Academics

Research

The gradual ramp-up of in-person research is continuing.

Global: For fall 2020, "Go Local" is a "go", Study Away is a "no" (mostly)

Owing to ongoing international travel restrictions and related health complexities, the University has notified students enrolled in Study Away for fall 2020 that it is limiting participation to students who do not require issuance of a student visa or who are already present in the host country or region where they were intending to study.

In concert with that decision, we are planning to proceed with our "<u>Go</u> <u>Local</u>" option, which will permit students who cannot travel to their intended NYU destination to instead be enrolled in a campus or site to which they *can* get. Approximately 4,000 students have expressed interest in "Go Local," and we will be working between now and July 1 to finalize student assignments to particular campuses and sites and throughout the summer to modify curricula at the Global sites for what will be a very different group of students than originally expected.

Health and Community

New York State Guidelines

Over the weekend, the State released its <u>guidelines</u> for higher educational institutions to reopen. We are reviewing our own ongoing planning work to ensure it is in alignment.

New York City Enters "Phase 2"

On Monday, New York City entered Phase 2 of the State's four-phase reopening plan, easing restrictions on a number of sectors. For NYU, however, operations will continue to carry on as they have for the last few weeks, other than the continued gradual ramp-up of research activity.

During this period when many NYU facilities remain closed, some faculty and administrators may nevertheless need to gain access to their office to prepare for fall classes or students' return to campus. While we are not planning on wide reopening of NYU buildings over the summer, those who need to gain access to their office from time-to-time should contact their dean's office who will in turn make arrangements with Public Safety for limited visits over the course of the summer.

The College of Dentistry Resumes Providing Urgent Care

The College of Dentistry's clinics, which provide lower-cost dental care to thousands of New Yorkers per year, have been closed due to COVID-19. The College is now beginning to resume providing urgent care services.

Student Life

Undergraduate Move-In

Typically Move-In Day for first-year undergraduate students is a single day. For fall 2020, Move-In Day will be extended over several days, and students will be given specific times and dates to move into their residence halls. More information will be forthcoming later in the summer.

PURPOSE: In short, collaboration. But, why?

- For many institutions, COVID-19 is their first "major disaster" experience and they lack the institutional knowledge and experience on financial recovery strategies.
- Many institutions are more disaster-prone and have extensive experience with managing financial recovery from natural disasters (hurricanes, floods, wildfires, etc).
- We are ALL new at managing a pandemic. There is little-to-no precedent in this area, including

for insurance companies, FEMA, and other agencies.

- There's a lot of "making it up as we go along" on all sides. Everyone is building plane midflight.
- Consultants and contractors are expensive! They don't always have the answers either. Who likes paying top dollar for someone to read you something that you could have read yourself for free?
- Those who have dealt with insurance and FEMA claims in the past know that everything is a constantly moving target. For every 10 insurance or FEMA representatives you talk to, you get 15 different answers. Consistency is their Achille's Heel. If we have a place to "compare notes", we can use their own responses against them.

In light of the Travel Advisories enacted by NY, NJ and CT, and the resulting 14-day quarantine required upon arrival from one of the now 16 identified states, I developed the attached Tracking Document for my administration. I figured I would share with you.

The University of Rochester is fully complying with the quarantine requirements for its students, faculty and staff, as indicated here: <u>LINK</u>

Furthermore, the Travel Advisory also restricts University-related travel, and places significant limitations on benefits who travel to these states for personal puposes. Any employee who travels to a listed state and becomes ill will be INELIGBLE to use sick leave; they would have to take leave without pay (as per NY executive order). Official university guidance on this topic has not been published yet. However, based upon a previous international travel policy <u>HERE</u>, it is also possible that if an employee travels to a listed state on personal business, if they are not approved to work from home, they may have to use vacation time for the 14-day quarantine period.

As expected, and fully justified by the numbers, the NY/NJ/CT Collective has **added** the states of **MN**, **NM**, **OH**, **and WI** to the Travel Advisory which requires 14-days of quarantine upon arrival to one of our three states.

Delaware has been rightfully removed from the list.

This brings the current total to **22 states**. An additional 5 states are on the verge of being added as well if current trends continue. (See attached document for details)

I will further note, for those who may have missed the headlines, that NYS is, effective today, actively enforcing this quarantine at airports throughout the state (including Rochester). P.S. Antibody test among UR employees, mostly in the medical enterprise (myself included), is coming back at 3% positive. If accurate and representative of the community at large (last published value 2.7% in late April), this means that our cases to date have barely scratched the surface and we are still highly vulnerable. No where near "heard immunity" in our area. New York City is reportedly about 25%, with some specific neighborhoods in Queens upward of 68%.

P.S.S. I tested negative for antibodies. So, no, you car-load of Uber passengers hacking your brains out in my car on Friday, January, 17, 2020 at 5:39 p.m, you did not give me COVID. And no, my illness February 7-17 wasn't COVID either. I can't decide. Is this good or bad news? And no, I haven't driven Uber since the end of January and likely never will again.

(NOTE: I share this for situational awareness purposes only. Please do not misread any commentary on my part.)

New York Sets 100 active COVID+ cases as threshold for a minimum 2-week PAUSE; One institution already hits it.

Last week, New York State issued guidance that any institute of higher education in New York which reaches 100 active student COVID+ cases and or 5% of the student population, whichever is lower, is to automatically enter a 2-week PAUSE period, whereby all classes go online and movement on campus is limited.

SUNY Oneonta is the first school to trigger this threshold following a series of unauthorized parties on and off campus. NYSDOH has deployed a "SWAT Team" to campus and the surrounding community. The "SWAT Team" includes 71 Contact Tracers, 8 Case Investigators, and 3 Free Rapid Testing sites with results in 15 minutes.

- Employee/student reports someone they have been in close contact with has suspected COVID-19? Do we do any notifications/cleaning at this point? Likely not a direct exposure for anyone. Or Wait for test results
- Employee/student reports someone they have been in close contact with has confirmed COVID-19? Do we do any notifications/cleaning at this point? Likely still not a direct exposure for anyone.
- 3. Employee/student reports they have COVID-19 symptoms? Refer to testing, isolate and wait for results. Do we do notifications/cleaning at this point?
- 4. Employee/student reports they have tested and confirmed COVID-19? This is likely notification/cleaning for any areas of direct exposure and work with health department on contact tracing?
- 5. Others

As we start to return some people to work these are the pressing questions and I know each jurisdiction may be different with local health departments but what is the overall IHE process?

There's no escaping or explaining away the facts... COVID-19 now has the entire nation fully in its grasp and only worsening by the day, far beyond any impacts it had in the Spring.

By now, we've all learned that how we respond largely depends on where we live. The lack of consistent, central, federal guidance from the CDC, HHS, White House, has yielded us a very diverse hodge-podge of state-level guidance which varies widely from state to state, primarily along political and ideological veins.

Yet, here we are, 11 months into this (+/-), and we still don't know for certain what works and what doesn't. Have the stringent edicts of New York State set the standard for a nation to follow? Maybe for a while, but we're definitely into our second wave now. Has the laissez-faire attitude of other states like Florida and Texas yielded vastly different results? It sure didn't look like it during the summer and early fall. I honestly don't know and I'm not out to start a debate.

The point is that we, as a network of IHE emergency management professionals, have been robbed of one of our most useful assets: each other. The disparities between states have rendered the DRU listserv and Virtual Coordination Center effectively silent. We have been reduced to collaborating with our peers down the street and across our state; which is not a bad thing, by the way. However, institutions like mine really like to know "What is Duke or Virginia doing?" "How about Emory or John Hopkins?" ... In times like these, our usual analogs are tainted by the inconsistent operating environments we each face. So we look to our friends and neighbors instead: Cornell, Buffalo, Syracuse, Binghamton, NYU. (If I didn't list your institution, please don't be mad that I'm leaving you out, I'm just making an example).

The one thing WE ALL have in common... we're exhausted. You, your teams, your administrators... we're all ready for this to end. Yet, by most accounts, this just may be the 2nd quarter, or at best, the beginning of the second half.

This is the week of Thanksgiving. Find it in yourself, dig deep, to sincerely and empathically offer gratitude to everyone around you who is keeping your institution open, vibrant, and as healthy as possible. It sounds so cliché, but there are TONS of unsung heroes in this pandemic: your environmental services/janitorial folks who are wiping, spraying, and cleaning over-and-over again; your transportation drivers taking students into and out of quarantine and isolation; your counseling center and student affairs teams dealing with students with unprecedented levels of stress, anxiety, depression, and worse. A tangent for a moment, MENTAL HEALTH has always been a crisis on our campuses and in our communities. COVID-19 has only made things exponentially worse. DON'T OVERLOOK the mental health and wellness of your students, faculty, staff, and team members!

Lastly, it's hard, really hard, for a true professional emergency manager with a servant's heart to step away from the job. No matter what the position description says, we consider ourselves available 24/7/365. Most of us are salaried-exempt; which means no matter how many hours we work, we get paid exactly the same. Some may have even seen pay cuts or furloughs. Yet, we still get up every morning, put our game face on, and face the day's challenges. For the planners among us, this required a fundamental paradigm on my part just to stay sane. I literally can only focus on one day at a time; and some days, one hour at a time. I have personally resorted to compartmentalization (link), a subconscious psychological defense mechanism used to avoid cognitive dissonance or the mental discomfort and anxiety caused by a person's conflicts within themselves. No. It's not a good thing.

As we all try to be heroes to our institutions (not just the EM's, your whole teams), we have to remind ourselves that there are OTHERS who still need us too: spouses, partners, children, parents, other family members; pets; friends; faith communities; and all those millions of people in the world who needed our help even before COVID arrived. Yes, you have to prioritize. No, you shouldn't cut anyone out.

Use this week of Thanksgiving as a pulse check. Are you taking care of YOURSELF? Are you neglecting anyone in your life that really needs you? Who is taking care of you? As you pour yourself out to others, who are filling you back up? Do you have a backup? Who can do YOU? REST.

As your team members those same questions. Make sure you're not losing anyone.

In my life, my priorities SHOULD be: 1.) God. 2.) Wife. 3.) Self. 4.) Children. 5.) Church. 6.) Work. 7.) Extended Family. 8.) Serving Others. 9.) Hobbies, Etc. Unfortunately, I have failed to maintain those priorities and those who need me the most have suffered. Re-evaluate your priorities. Are they in the right order for you? Are there any unintended consequences as a result? It's not too late to make adjustments.

BLESS YOU, ALL, and your team members for all that you've been doing, and will continue to do. On behalf of everyone around you, THANK YOU. You are appreciated. TAKE CARE OF YOURSELF and your priorities.

What was my original point? Oh yeah, we're still here for each other. Yes, we're all going through this crisis in our own ways. That should not mean that you can't drop an e-mail or make a call to a peer, if for no other reason than to say: You are valued. You are doing

an amazing job. Here's a virtual hug, handshake, or toast to you.

No question is too simple. No vent is too burdensome. Continue to use the DRU and the DRU Virtual Collaboration Center (see Andre's email attached for details. Yes it's old, I deleted the more recent ones). You're not alone.





Move-in days

Students begin moving into University housing this weekend

Students will begin moving into their fall campus housing assignments as early as this weekend. The first to move in are students who began required quarantines on August 1. Instructions for the move will be forthcoming by email.

On Monday, August 17, other students—first-year members of the Class of 2024 and returning students—will move in.

The process for moving into campus housing is outlined here.

Have you quarantined? if you're arriving from <u>one of the states designated</u> <u>by New York as restricted</u>, you're required to complete a 14-day quarantine before checking into campus housing.

The state asks incoming travelers to fill out a form documenting their arrival.

Quarantine requirements

Living off-campus? What you need to know

New York's 14-day quarantine restriction applies to students living off campus as well as to those who are moving into University housing.

Whether you're an undergraduate or a graduate student, if you're arriving from **<u>one of New York's restricted travel states</u>**, you're expected to quarantine in your residence.

You're also expected to complete the state's traveler health form.

All **<u>students living off campus must complete their quarantine</u> before coming on campus for any reason.**

How to quarantine

How does quarantine work? Support and updates

While we're on the subject of quarantine, we all recognize that it demands more commitment than simply hanging out at your residence.

But the University has several resources and support systems available. In a message to students, Molly Jolliff, the director of International Student Engagement and the associate director for the Center for Advising Services, **shares a list of resources**.

"Remember, we are in this together and you are not alone," Jolliff writes. "Whether you live on campus or off-campus, each school has a Quarantine/Isolation Support Coordinator . . . who can further assist you in obtaining the necessary services to support you in getting through these challenging times."

<u>The basic guidelines for quarantine are that you have to stay inside your</u> <u>residence</u>—no shopping trips, dinners out, friends stopping by, or morning runs—for the duration of the quarantine.

Also, last week the CDC revised some of the guidelines for students coming from international locations. As of August 6, <u>those students don't have to</u> <u>quarantine</u>.

Classroom assignments, athletics, staff fund, biobank, and other updates

Classroom assignments: for students in Arts, Sciences & Engineering, <u>the</u> <u>College is maintaining a running list</u> of courses being taught this fall. The guide is expected to move soon to UR Student, the new student information system.

Update on athletics: the <u>Department of Athletics and Recreation doesn't</u> <u>anticipate there will be games for varsity teams</u> this fall. That follows decisions by Rochester's competitive leagues to suspend competitions and by the NCAA Division III to sponsor no fall championships.

Staff emergency assistance fund established: University staff, including Medical Center staff, who need short-term, temporary financial assistance due to the pandemic <u>can apply for assistance through a new University-created</u> <u>fund</u>.

The biobank is open: for Rochester researchers interested in working with COVID-19-positive and -negative blood specimens and other clinical data can **make a request through a new biobank**.

100,000 mark: UR Medicine Labs, the campus facility that has been a key part of testing protocols this summer, has processed more than 100,000 test results for the Finger Lakes Region. More than 120 specialists are working around the clock to analyze the tests, processing more than 1,500 each day, and providing results within 24 hours.

As you will likely see in the headlines, the states of New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut have collectively issued a "Travel Advisory" which implements a 14-day quarantine for individuals arriving from one of the following states, effective midnight tonight: AL, AR, AR, FL, NC, SC, TX, UT, WA

As was explained by Governor Cuomo (NY) during his press-release, this is a legally-binding public health quarantine order. New York **does not** plan to establish any form of checkpoints at its borders or points of entry (unsure about NJ or CT). "It's an honor system, until you get caught. Then when you get caught, you're put into mandatory quarantined and fined thousands of dollars." \$2,000 first offense. \$5,000 second. \$10,000 third. There are a multitude of ways to "get caught" including, but not limited to, law enforcement, hotel management, tip lines, etc.

I know there is a plethora of tracking websites and data sources out there. I want to call attention to two which I find particularly useful at this point and strong data defense for this action:

1.) New York Times: <u>https://www.nytimes.com/interactive/2020/us/coronavirus-us-cases.html</u> (identifies "hot spots" among other data)

2.) John Hopkins: <u>https://coronavirus.jhu.edu/testing/tracker/overview</u> (further analysis into cases per capita, weekly changes in new cases, percent positive tests (positivity), weekly changes in positivity, testing rates, changes in testing rates)

In a complete 180-degree twist, New York in particular has gone from THE worst hotspot in the country (primarily NYC / Long Island metro, but I digress) to one of the lowest. New York is #1 in terms of daily tests administered, yet resulting in only about 1% positivity (3rd lowest).

"On May 12, 2020 the World Health Organization (WHO) advised governments that before reopening, rates of positivity in testing (ie, out of all tests conducted, how many came back positive for COVID-19) of should remain at 5% or lower for at least 14 days." As of today, 21 states and territories are above 5% **and rising**, of which seven are above 10% (in decreasing order): PR, AZ, SC, FL, UT, MS, TX. (PR appears to have very limited testing capacity and testing the most ill. UT has high positivity, but relatively low new case counts.)

All,

Sharing back out information received related to UV Wanding equipment for disinfecting surfaces. Hope this helps. Thank you all for the great feedback. We will not be purchasing wanding equipment at this time.

Good afternoon,

I have completed research on UV wanding equipment. Through several sources identified below (and several others) is what I've found.

Therefore, at this time, the IRT is not recommending pursuing UV Wands. The standard guidelines for cleaning and disinfection is what is recommended. Thanks for helping us explore this mitigation strategy.

1. Source: Local Health Department

"There's not a lot of confidence out there around UV light to disinfect surfaces (some processes to disinfect N95 masks with UV light are being used, but that's a little different). According to the CDC's website:

The efficacy of these (ultrasonic waves, high intensity UV radiation, and LED blue light) disinfection methods against the virus that causes COVID-19 is not known. EPA only recommends use of the <u>surface disinfectants identified on List N</u> against the virus that causes COVID-19. EPA does not routinely review the safety or efficacy of pesticidal devices, such as UV lights, LED lights, or ultrasonic devices. Therefore, EPA cannot confirm whether, or under what circumstances, such products might be effective against the spread of COVID-19.

This blurb, coupled with the knowledge that there are a lot of companies out there trying to sell their products makes me skeptical. Our recommendation is to stick to EPA-approved disinfecting methods."

2)

"To address a couple of items in your research. The UV light needs to be the right wave length and with enough intensity to be effective. The light needs to be held close enough, long enough to adequately disinfect. As the UV light is used it's intensity will decrease in time causing performance problems. Also the frequency of the UV light often used has the potential to cause retina damage." 3)

"We aren't using them in academic or research settings. UV-C light can be dangerous to human tissue, so efficacy and use of single use wands is questionable in most cases. Does the user have adequate PPE, what's the duration needed for SARS-2 COVID, and what type of surface are you needing to cover. Too many risks outweigh the simple use of "spray and wipe."

Our researchers conduct COVID-19 studies and there is not adequate information to justify using single use wands for disinfecting. WHO warns against using UV-C light because of risk to users (harmful to skin and eyes). "What I am learning about the UV is that it is not the best choice for the only type of disinfection, but, rather, is a complement to traditional disinfectant. Also, it seems each unit only treats a 10ft x 10ft area – which seems like this would be a huge number of units needed. I would expect, given the recent articles about NYC transit use, sourcing may be a challenge. " 5)

"XXXX simply gets back to the CDC recommendations. Additionally, we have a requirement for daily health screening, which is likely more efficacious than COVID-19 sentinel testing (testing is too precarious and only gives you a snapshot of viral load for the time of testing)."

"Currently, there is no vaccine to prevent COVID-19 infection. The best way to prevent infection is to avoid being exposed to this virus. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends everyday preventive actions to help prevent the spread of respiratory viruses."

- Wash your hands often with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcoholbased hand sanitizer that contains at least 60 percent alcohol if soap and water are not available.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Stay home and do not travel or go to work or school when you are sick.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze then throw the tissue in the trash. Then wash your hands with soap and water.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.
- Practice physical distancing by staying at least 6 feet away from other people, especially if COVID-19 is currently spreading in your community.
- Wear a cloth face covering in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., grocery stores and pharmacies).

As was posted in a hurry yesterday, the tri-state consortium of NY/NJ/CT added 10 new states and dropped 1 to the "Travel Advisory" which requires anyone arriving in NY, NJ or CT, having been in any one of those now 31 states in the past 14 days, must quarantine for up to 14 more.

This is making the attempted start of the fall semester extremely difficult for those institutions within the tri-state region which attract students from throughout the US and Internationally, like ourselves. With yesterday's announcement, we now have <u>713 undergrads</u> who are scheduled to stay in on-campus housing, which have to quarantine for up to 14 days upon arrival to New York. That's only the U.S. residents. We are still enforcing a 14-day quarantine for what few international arrivals may still make it in. Most international students who were here in the Spring never left the U.S. A small handful are somehow managing to get visas and flights to come.

So, who's responsible for that quarantine? The University (they haven't checked into housing yet, so technically they're not ours just yet)? The student and their family? Do we accommodate that using our pre-identified quarantine space? I can guarantee you that we don't have enough for 713!

Our administration is feverishly working on several different options, including ongoing attempts to lobby Albany to allow a negative COVID test to negate the need for a quarantine. We're booking up hotel rooms. We're negotiating discounts. We're encouraging students to be creative ("If you have friends of family in Massachusetts, go visit them for a couple of weeks" Let's just hope MA doesn't get added before then). Maybe even start classes online and wait for your state to fall off the "naughty list".

Also, the states have upped the enforcement game, with mandatory completion of forms at airports, snitch lines, and increased fines in the thousands of dollars if caught.

Attached is a daily tracker tool which I generate for my University. I do post this daily to the DRU Virtual Coordination Center (VCC).

Personal Observations and Predictions:

• General Comments: I am still trying to wrap my head around NY's inconsistent

application of their metrics when adding / removing states from the travel advisory. Alaska was borderline. Montana?? No idea where that one came from. It also seemed really premature, in my opinion, to drop Minnesota just yet. Poor poor Delaware; as Mark Seifert at U Delaware put it, "back in the penalty box again".

- Next Logical Candidates to be Added: KY, MN
- Wouldn't be Surprised to See Added: CO, PA, SD, WA, WY
- Candidates for Removal: MT

First of all, there is the more "tangible" method: shaking and tapping.

- To do this, you first **turn the keyboard around**. Wired models should ideally be **disconnected** from the computer beforehand. It is recommended to **remove the batteries** for wireless versions.
- Then the **keyboard is moved back and forth** with the keypad **face down with circular movements**.
- In this way, the **first crumbs and all kinds of loose dirt fall out** of the keyboard and **often provide a significant aha effect**.
- Then, by shaking it a little bit harder and tapping it gently, even the coarser particles of dirt are removed.
- Then, deeper layers of dirt in the spaces between the individual keys are best removed with cotton swabs and soft brushes.


The more **elegant method**, which can also be used as **a useful supplement to "shaking therapy,"** is to **use cleaning solutions from the outset**.

Most CHERRY keyboards can be cleaned with it.

- To do so, gently wipe the keyboard with a slightly dampened cloth using soap and warm water these components should be found in every household.
- Solutions based on isopropyl and ethyl alcohol are also suitable. However, the cleaning solution should never be sprayed or poured directly onto the keyboard.
- The slightly dampened cloth used should be fiber-free so that new fluff is not caught between the keys during the cleaning process.
- It goes without saying that one should not use the keyboard again until it is completely dry.

At some point, however, even the most thorough cleaning is no longer effective.



2. COVID-19 Mitigation Program I have the staff COVID-19 handbook, the Edmonds School District Re-Opening Plan, School Building COVID-19 Case Response Toolkit. What documents should be shared with L&I in response to this request?

3. Documented Hazard Assessment for PPE

With respect to the disinfectant about which the employee is concerned, we determined PPE requirements based on the documentation associated with the disinfectant. Does that constitute a documented hazard assessment?

4. Voluntary or Involuntary Respiratory Protection Programs (If Applicable) Is a respiratory protection program applicable here? The documentation associated with the disinfectant states respiratory protection should be used. Our understanding was that is a mask, and we required drivers to use them.

(3) Name of person certifying that a workplace hazard assessment was done.

(4) Date(s) the workplace hazard assessment was done.

(5) Statement identifying the document as the certification of hazard assessment for PPE for the workplace.

Regarding your employee Safety Board, I did note a couple easy fixes during my site walk: The 'Notice To Employees' form regarding Reporting an Injury was blank in the field for who to report an injury to and how to contact them. Previously included is the link to the videotaped training with school bus drivers for the use of ZEP Triton. Attached to this email is the driver sign-in to the training. School bus drivers are not generally exposed to hazardous materials and do not generally require PPE. School bus drivers all have current first aid training and the associated PPE is covered in that training. Do you need first aid training records for all of our school bus drivers? I do not believe there are additional records available related to this request.

Documented Hazard Assessment for PPE (related to Zep Triton use)

When determining what PPE to use with ZEP Triton, we reviewed the SDS. The SDS for the concentrated product indicates a need for gloves, eye protection, and respiratory protection. The SDS covers the concentrated product, to which school bus drivers do not use or dispense. While school bus drivers only have access to Triton after being diluted 1 part concentrate to 64 parts water, we still required gloves, masks, and eye protection. There is not an SDS available for the diluted product that we are aware of, so out of an abundance of caution we followed the requirements for the concentrate. We did not complete additional documentation beyond the assessment related to the SDS and the subsequent training.

I haven't thoroughly gone through everything you've sent me yet, but at a first quick glance of your HazCom written program and the training power point, I didn't see much from the GHS requirements. I attached a brochure regarding the current HazCom rules for employers for reference.

With the Hazard Assessment, I was looking for documentation in accordance with WAC 296-800-16010, pasted below:

Document your hazard assessment for PPE.

You must verify that a hazard assessment for PPE has been done at your workplace and complete a written certification (paper or electronic format) that includes the:

(1) Name of the workplace.

- (2) Address of the workplace you inspected for hazards.
- (3) Name of person certifying that a workplace hazard assessment was done.
- (4) Date(s) the workplace hazard assessment was done.
- (5) Statement identifying the document as the certification of hazard assessment for PPE for the workplace.

Regarding your employee Safety Board, I did note a couple easy fixes during my site walk: The 'Notice To Employees' form regarding Reporting an Injury was blank in the field for who to report an injury to and how to contact them. You can replace some of the Worker Rights forms with the current versions which can be found on L&I's website. https://lni.wa.gov/safety-health/safety-training-materials/safety-posters-publications

Accident Prevention Program

Layne Erdman has sent you information on the District's accident prevention program.

Employee safety/health training records for current employees related to Hazcom and PPE. Please include employee initial training as well as related training from when you started using the Zep Triton product until now.

Previously included is the link to the videotaped training with school bus drivers for the use of ZEP Triton. Attached to this email is the driver sign-in to the training. School bus drivers are not generally exposed to hazardous materials and do not generally require PPE. School bus drivers all have current first aid training and the associated PPE is covered in that training. Do you need first aid training records for all of our school bus drivers? I do not believe there are additional records available related to this request.

Documented Hazard Assessment for PPE (related to Zep Triton use)

When determining what PPE to use with ZEP Triton, we reviewed the SDS. The SDS for the concentrated product indicates a need for gloves, eye protection, and respiratory protection. The SDS covers the concentrated product, to which school bus drivers do not use or dispense. While school bus drivers only have access to Triton after being diluted 1 part concentrate of 64 parts water, we still required gloves, masks, and eye protection. There is not an SDS available for the diluted product that we are aware of, so out of an abundance of caution we followed the requirements for the concentrate. We did not complete additional documentation beyond the assessment related to the SDS and the subsequent training.

Chemical Hazard Communication Program.
