8 Things to Know about Vaccine Planning

There is currently no authorized or approved vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) in the United States; however, the U.S. government's Operation Warp Speed program has been working since the pandemic started to make a COVID-19 vaccine available as soon as possible. There may be a limited supply of COVID-19 vaccines before the end of 2020. If there is limited supply, some groups may be recommended to get a COVID-19 vaccine first. Find out the 8 things you need to know about vaccine planning.



COVID-19 and Travel

Test for Current Infection Not everyone needs to be tested for COVID-19. People who have

symptoms of COVID-19, people who have been within 6 feet of someone with confirmed COVID-19 for a total of at least 15 minutes, and people who have been asked or referred by a healthcare provider may need to be tested for COVID-19. If you do get tested, you should stay home until you get your test results and follow the advice of your health care provider or a public health professional. If you test negative for COVID-19, it means you did not have COVID-19 at the time of testing, or that your sample was collected too early in your infection. If you have symptoms later, you may need another test to determine if you are infected with the virus that causes COVID-19. Remember, you can be exposed to COVID-19 after the test and then get infected and spread the virus to others.

COVID-19 Testing

How to Protect Yourself and Others in the Workplace

If you have or think you have symptoms, or have tested positive for COVID-19, stay home and find out what to do if you are sick and when you can be around others. If you are well, but you have a sick family member or recently had close contact with someone with COVID-19, notify your supervisor and follow CDC-recommended precautions. Other steps to protect yourself and others include monitoring your health and being alert for symptoms, and wearing a mask in public settings.



Emergency Management Once Removed By Jim Mullen

A Word to Emergency Managers About 2020 October 28, 2020

Note to Readers: This commentary first appeared in the National Emergency Management Association's (NEMA) October edition of **Ready Nation: People**. Since I had the privilege of serving as both a local and state emergency management director, it has been suggested that my message might be suitable for a wider audience. Dear Colleagues: It might be time to reflect on <u>your</u> emotional or mental health in the wake of COVID-19, wildfires, storms floods and civil unrest. 2020 is different. Those currently in emergency management roles would do well to take stock of how they internally are handling the cascading series of events that are pressing our profession. 2020's disaster issues will not go away naturally, if at all. Emergency managers can react, but alone cannot bring these 2020 crises to conclusion. Here is why:


- The civil unrest seems unrelenting, and intellectually we should know it will not abate until the conditions that provoked the protests are properly dealt with. This means legal consequences for violent behavior by police. The underlying reasons such conduct occurs will take much longer to resolve. Emergency managers cannot resolve those problems.
- Wildfires have many causes, but the frequency and severity in recent years is the product of decades of ignoring warnings about the effect of human behavior on the global climate. The slowness of recognizing this as a threat to humanity will exacerbate conditions even once prudent steps are taken, nationally and worldwide. Emergency managers are at best bit players in the resolution of climate change.
- COVID -19 poses a more subtle threat, because its consequences have not abated with time. No national leadership of a response is certain to occur until (possibly) January 20th, 2021. Emergency personnel can react to logistical requirements, anticipate shortfalls, and minimize problems that are identified, but they cannot prevent the progression of the disease nor meaningfully ease the suffering or anxiety of the public. But still they serve under what must be excruciating pressure.
- Of course, the upcoming national election results, if disputed, will be one more log on the fires emergency managers will have to contend with (see bullet on civil unrest).

The COVID crisis may seem to resemble playing a game in which the best result each day is a tie score (or a "plateau"), only to start the next day behind again. You are good enough to be in the game, and conditions would be far worse without you - but you can neither set the rules nor control the outcome. It is not even clear how to determine when it will be over.

The issues noted above do not lend themselves to an orderly, or even a satisfactory resolution. To emergency managers, accustomed to problem solving and dedicated to providing a foundation for restoration of normalcy, that reality can impose a heavy psychological burden that may be difficult to discern. Emergency management colleagues: talk to somebody. Directors of emergency management personnel: do not fail to take care of yourselves while you are

tending to the psyches and morale of your staff.

The River of Denial has a swift current – do not get swept away.

Dear Edmonds School District families,

We are making great progress on our <u>Edmonds Schools Stages of Re-entry</u> plan. We want to be as transparent as possible with our community on the next steps in the process to get students back into our school buildings. Here are our current goals and timeline:

Goal #1 - Provide in-person learning for the students in Stage 1 by the end of October.

Goal #2 - Provide in-person learning for the students in Stage 2 (kindergarten-2nd grade) starting at the second quarter, Thursday, Nov. 12.

The district is working with our various employee groups to make sure we have everything ready and the staff available to open some of our schools this month, with the hope of opening more schools after that.

REQUIRED STUDENT INTENT FORM

Families will soon receive an email with a link to the Student Intent form where you will indicate in-person learning when it becomes available or remain fully remote for the duration of the 2020-21 school year. If you indicate your student will be participating in in-person learning this year, you will also be asked if your student will need district-provided transportation. The form will take less than one minute per student to fill out. We've asked families these questions a few times since the pandemic hit. We understand it is a hard decision. However, we cannot open our buildings without knowing how many families choose in-person learning.

HOW THE STUDENT INTENT FORM WORKS

You should receive a unique email from information@surveys.edmonds.wednet.edu for each of your students by the end of the week. Only the family member listed as the primary guardian will receive the email for each student(s), as each form is directly connected to them. Please make sure your Skyward Family Access account is updated with the correct primary email. Once you receive the form, please fill it out immediately. If we do not hear back from families by Wednesday, Oct. 14, 2020, you will begin to receive calls to make sure your school receives this critical information.

SCHOOL BUILDING RE-ENTRY PLANS

Each school principal is currently in the process of putting together their detailed building re-entry plan. Principals must complete the plan and get approval from Facilities Operations and Student Health Services prior to re-entry. The plan will include the following:

Facilities audit

- Transportation and student drop off/pick up procedures
- Classrooms procedures, layout
- Spacing, Movement, and access (including entries and exits)
- Food and Nutrition Services (breakfast, lunch) procedures
- Recess
- Health Room(s)
- Restrooms
- Front Office and Other High Traffic Office Spaces
- Safety/Drills

Each of these elements requires specific planning and resources with the number one priority to keep students and staff safe and healthy. These plans will follow the guidelines issued by healthcare and government officials.

HEALTH SCREENING REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS AND STAFF

In accordance with Snohomish Health District and the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, all students and staff must:

- Wear a face covering.
- Follow social distancing and hand hygiene requirements as directed.
- Adhere to other modifications to normal procedures and practices in accordance with school re-entry plans.
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Complete an electronic daily <u>COVID-19 Health Screening form</u> on in-person learning days.

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Preschool - 6th grade students will need a parent/guardian to complete the health screening form.

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7th -12th grade students have the option to fill out the form themselves or have a parent/guardian complete the form for them.

STUDENT HEALTH REQUIREMENTS PRIOR TO IN-PERSON LEARNING

All students must:

- Have their immunization records up-to-date or in compliance with state requirements and documented with the district.
- •

Have paperwork submitted if they have a life-threatening condition(s) and/or who need medications given onsite.

Dear staff,

The Edmonds School District and the Edmonds Education Association (EEA), which includes our certificated teachers, have reached a tentative agreement on Stage 2 of our <u>re-entry plan</u>. Stage 2 offers in-person learning in the <u>A/B hybrid model</u> (students attend in-person either Mondays/Thursdays -OR- Tuesdays/Fridays) for kindergarten, 1st grade, 2nd grade, and additional Special Education and Early Childhood programs.

Please note: Staff and Student Intent Forms will be sent to Stage 2 families and staff around 5 p.m. this evening. All PreK-6th grade certificated staff will need to fill out the form so we can move forward with all the logistics that need to take place prior to this next stage. *The intent form is due by 11 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 23, 2021.*

The information below will be shared with all families in English and Spanish today.

Anticipated start dates

The anticipated start dates for Stage 2 are listed below. It's important to note that all Stage 2 students will begin with their new class on Monday, March 22. That includes the students and staff staying fully remote. The district will do a gradual launch of in-person learning starting with 2nd grade. As some students wait to begin in-person learning in Stage 2, they will still start with their new class remotely on March 22, until their scheduled time to begin in-person learning.

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Elementary self-contained Special Education programs begin in-person

Principals work on new class assignments based on the information provided from the Student and Staff Intent Forms

Families are notified of class assignments, including who their student's teacher will be

Monday, March 8 - Friday, March 19

During these two weeks prior to starting Stage 2, remote learning continues for staff and students. These two weeks are for staff to plan for their new class assignments, as part of an agreement with the Edmonds Education Association.

Monday, March 22

Stage 2 begins

In-person A/B hybrid model

Students who attend in-person learning will be divided into two groups, Group A (last name begins with A through Le) or Group B (last name begins with Lea through Z). Students in Group A will attend school in person on Mondays and Thursdays. Students in Group B will attend school in person on Tuesdays and Fridays. Wednesdays will be the same as they are now with independent learning. On the other two remote days, students will have specialist classes like PE, Library and Music, as well as assignments to complete. For more information on what the hybrid model A/B looks like, <u>please visit our website</u>.

Start times for in-person A/B hybrid model

There will be three different start times for the hybrid in-person schedule, which are based on your school's usual (pre-pandemic) start times.

Early start: 8:10 a.m. to 2:10 p.m.

Middle start: 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Late start: 9:50 a.m. to 3:50 p.m.

Start time for students who remain in fully remote learning

If students remain in the fully remote learning model, their schedule will remain 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Health and safety

Health and safety measures, including wearing masks, social distancing and remaining in cohorts of no more than 15 students, will be followed. Students will be provided with their own desk/table and will not share supplies. Students will remain in their cohort during recess and lunch.

The district has put together a COVID-19 Safety Handbook for families. You can <u>click here</u> to open the digital document. In the handbook you will find health protocols and actions we all need to take daily to ensure safety for students and staff.

Will my student keep their teacher?

Due to logistics, health requirements and other factors for offering in-person learning, the district *cannot guarantee* your student will keep their same teacher, regardless of whether your student or their teacher choose fully remote or in-person learning. Once we have information from our families, schools will begin working on class assignments for those choosing in-person learning and for those remaining fully remote. That information will be communicated to families approximately a week prior to the official launch of Stage 2.

Intent form coming soon for Stage 2 families

Families with students identified as part of Stage 2 will soon receive an email asking them to fill out a form as to whether your student will attend in-person learning or remain fully remote. *The intent form is due by 11 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 23, 2021.* The student intent form will be sent to the primary guardian's email identified in <u>Skyward</u>.

Childcare options

Before and after school childcare will be provided at every elementary school by Right At School, Kids Krew, and the YMCA. In addition, we will also have full day childcare 5 days per week at former Woodway Elementary School by YMCA. Full day childcare will be available on Wednesdays only at former Alderwood Middle School by the Boys and Girls Club. Boys and Girls Club and Kids Krew will provide full day childcare in their own facilities as well. For more information, contact the providers directly.

In-person opportunities for 3rd-12th graders

The district plans to expand in-person opportunities for our 3rd-12th grade students with specific needs. We will continue to provide updates to families as these plans develop.

Dear staff,

Just after 2 p.m. today, Monday, Oct. 12, 2020, we received an update from Snohomish Health District that there has been a sharp increase in COVID-19 cases and we are now at 72 cases per 100,000 people.

What does this mean for the district? We can continue our work towards implementing Stage 1 of the <u>Edmonds Schools Stages of Re-entry</u> plan. We can also continue to plan for Stage 2, but we may need to pause if cases continue to rise.

I want to remind staff that Stage 1 includes approximately 160 students spread out in eight of our school buildings. We need to get these students back into our buildings and provide them with the critical district services they need for learning.

We know a lot of questions are coming in about the required Student Intent Form sent out to families. Many are asking why they need to make this decision now and what if they change their mind. We want to make sure families know the district needs this information so we can move forward with planning. Even if we can't get more students into our buildings anytime soon, we cannot make those plans without the numbers. We understand families may change their minds and we will work with them at that time. However, we need families to make a decision so we can move forward with planning. We've asked the same information of our school-based staff, as that information is critical for planning how we do in-person learning.

At tonight's Community Forum (<u>link to details here</u>), we will share the information I just shared with you to the community. We will also include the following in our presentation:

- Edmonds Schools Stages of Re-entry overview
- Building plan requirements for re-entry

Health requirements for re-entry

Childcare during the different stages

Answer some questions from participants as time allows.

Thank you for your work. We know this is an ever changing situation. Please know that we are making the best decisions we can for our students with the information we have at any given moment.

Stage 2 update

I want to provide you an update on Stage 2 of our <u>Edmonds Schools Stages of Re-entry</u> <u>plan</u>. Before we can share a start date, daily schedules of which students attend on which day and which teachers will be in-person and which will be teaching students remotely - we must come to an agreement with the Edmonds Education Association (our certificated employee union, which includes teachers) on those items.

We are actively bargaining with the union. At this time, we do not know how long it will take to have the terms finalized between the district and the union to launch Stage 2. We will continue to share information with staff and our families as we can.

COVID-19 travel advisory from Washington Department of Health

COVID-19 numbers are increasing within many states and countries. For families considering non-essential traveling or returning to in-person learning after having traveled out of the country or out of state, the Washington Department of Health is advising families to practice self-quarantine for 14 days upon arrival back into Washington state.

We will communicate with families later today that if their student(s) is participating in an inperson program at this time, they need to contact their school building to report their student's absence and the possible need to pick up academic resources to do school work at home.


While performing your duties as a district employee, you may encourage people *to* vote – but please stay far away from any content that would be perceived as advocating for *how* to vote.

Dear staff,

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We want to continue to discuss student wellbeing and the need for ongoing conversations and actions around mental health and resources available through our district and community.

As we are just about into the eleventh month of the COVID-19 pandemic, typical issues that impact students have an even greater effect, as coping reserves are low. When we add the end of a semester and grades coming out in a few weeks, there is even more stress on our students.

The experiences of ongoing stress and trauma affecting our brain, body and functioning can result in the following symptoms:

Anxiety and stress

Depression, fatigue and lack of motivation

- Workplace burnout and lack of purpose
- Memory problems: Difficulty concentrating, organizing, planning and recalling

Heightened emotions and reactions

We know staff are doing all they can to support our students despite the challenges of only seeing or hearing from them on a computer screen. We encourage you to keep it up by checking on students and letting them know to reach out when they are struggling. If a student contacts you and it is more than you feel comfortable dealing with it, please involve support staff at your buildings for additional help.

The more we can build resilience in our students, the better they will be able to cope with daily struggles and the impacts of this long-term pandemic.

We want staff to know that we will be distributing a mental health resources flier in English and Spanish in meal kits at our upcoming weekly distribution sites. We are also sending information home with our high school students participating in outdoor athletic conditioning cohorts. The more we can share and talk about the resources and staff help that is available for our students, the better.

Upcoming staff training

The district is planning an afternoon of professional development and continued conversations to support psychological first aid for schools (certificated and most classified) on Wednesday, Feb. 24. We feel it is critical we continue to focus on the psychological needs of our students and staff on this day.

Dear Edmonds School District families,

As we plan for reopening our school buildings in the fall, we want you to know that the health and safety of our students, families, staff, and community members surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic comes first.

This morning, the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) released state guidelines on how schools will reopen this fall. You can read the entire document on the <u>OSPI website</u>. The district is committed to exploring the viability of this reopening plan for in-person instruction.

We want you to know as Dr. Kristine McDuffy steps down from her position at the end of the month, she and our new superintendent, Dr. Gustavo Balderas, are working together with the district leadership to use the new state guidelines to help make specific plans for different school scenarios when we reopen in September.

Our Commitment

We are committed to doing whatever it takes to protect our community's health and ensure that every child can achieve to their highest level. We are committed to working with our schools, educators, families, and community partners to provide equitable support for every student's success, with proven and responsive solutions during this unprecedented time.

How decisions will be made

We have a diverse group of educators who will be working to make the best decisions we

can for our students, families and staff. The School Board will also play a critical role in approving any plans as we move into the 2020-21 school year.

Our COVID-19 Emergency Response team includes representation from the following: Superintendent, Cabinet, Technology, Student Health Services, Human Resources, Student Learning, Student Services, Business & Finance, Communications & Public Relations, Food & Nutrition Services, Facilities Operations, Diversity, Equity & Outreach, and the District Safety Officer. This team has met regularly since March 2020 and will continue to meet and make operational and logistical decisions for the district.

We also have the Continuous Learning Task Force that has been working to provide educational resources and support as we moved to a distance learning model this spring. This group has continued to meet during the closure and will now be working to plan for the different learning scenarios that could be in place for the start of school in the fall.

Back to the classroom

We all want students back in the classroom. In-person relationships with teachers and friends is important for student success, which is why our primary goal is to bring students back to school, but with recommended measures in place to protect the health and safety of our students and staff.

School will look different

School will look different than it did before the pandemic. We will all need to adjust to the way school will work in the fall so that we can protect health and safety, while also providing the best possible environment for teaching and learning. This means that some of the following measures will likely need to be in place:

Adjustments to classrooms and schedules with changes to accommodate social distancing.

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Students and staff will be asked to wear face coverings.

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We will expect students to stay home at the first sign of any symptoms, including cough, fever, or shortness of breath.

Preparing for several different scenarios

Schools operating on split or rotating schedules, along with continuous remote learning.

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Phased-in reopening of schools with continuous remote learning.

Continuous Learning 2.0 (similar to the remote learning in the spring of 2020, but with significant improvements).

While we want students back in the classroom, we need to be prepared in the event that we have to use a distance learning model again if our public health partners find a resurgence of infections. We will work with families and communities to ensure an equitable approach to remote learning and respond to students' needs. We've learned a lot about how to deliver remote learning well, and we'll continue to adjust and improve moving forward.

We know that remote learning raises questions for childcare and food security, and we will have plans in place to address those needs.

Hearing from our community

Earlier this week, the district sent out a Continuous Learning Survey to all 3rd-12th grade students, as well families and teachers. Your voice and input is critical for us and we will use this data in our future planning. For those families who have not yet taken the <u>survey</u>, we ask that you do so by Tuesday, June 16, 2020.

We will continue to update you

We expect that our back-to-school planning efforts will be ongoing throughout the summer and our plans and strategies may need to be adjusted and refined as we approach the start of the new school year. Clear and transparent decision-making is a priority for us, and we will provide regular updates to make sure you have the latest information.

Thank you!

We again want to thank our students, families and staff for working with us to address these challenging times. We are on this journey together.

Dear ESD staff,

During this period of extended school closure, we recognize the continuing difficulty for our students, families, and our ESD staff. We thank you for your incredible flexibility and commitment to our students and families. We understand that the significant wonder that's on everyone's minds is what will school look like in the fall. We have many big questions in front of us that need to be answered very soon. We will work with our staff, families and broader school community to arrive at answers to these questions that will ensure safe, supportive, and accessible learning for all students.

What we know so far is that OPSI has communicated the expectation that schools will provide face-to-face instruction for students with an **understanding that there will be requirements in place from Health Departments which will also dictate** *how* we **reopen**. With this in mind, Cabinet has been meeting daily since OSPI released its guidance document to develop some initial thoughts and recommendations about models for reopening schools. Our plan is to recommend some potential models for reopening that we can share with our School Board.

At a high level, the process for creating our reopening plan will be divided into two working groups. The operational side will focus on logistical considerations such as health services, transportation, food service, and facilities and operations. The instructional side will develop an instructional plan for both reopening for in-person instruction and for pivoting back to fully remote instruction. We will also have an advisory team of representatives from various constituencies providing input and direction for our work. Ultimately our Board of Directors will approve the reopening plan before submission to OSPI. We will update everyone as soon as decisions are made.

For Instructional Staff There are a couple of important instructional items we want on everyone's radar. The first is with regards to the need for consistency in our use of a learning management system. OSPI, in its 6/11/20 guidance, directed districts to "narrow their learning platforms substantially to help families navigate fewer platforms. One platform for an entire school district is ideal" (p. 9). Teachers, families, and our Board of Directors have indicated their expectations for more consistency as well.

So that everyone is clear about this: A **learning management system**, or **LMS**, is a platform that allows teachers to provide students and families with course information and

announcements, to share lessons and instructional/supplemental content, to distribute assignments and receive submitted assignments, and to evaluate assignments and provide students with feedback, among other things.

PreK / Elementary LMS

Currently, we have a handful of different tools being used to share lessons, etc. with families at the elementary level with little consistency across the system. Examples include SeeSaw, Classroom Dojo and Google Classroom.

We are considering the developmental appropriateness of LMS options for our youngest students. We have gathered feedback from the elementary Continuous Learning Task Force teachers, and we are working to evaluate various options based upon that feedback as well as the feedback of families and other teachers.

Through the summer, we will be working closely with members of the task force to make recommendations for the LMS(s) we should utilize, and we will create expectations for their use. Our work will also include plans for training and ongoing support for teachers, students, and families. The implementation of these expectations will be addressed through bargaining with EEA. We intend to update elementary teachers and administrators as soon as decisions are made.

Secondary LMS PEC (Professional Excellence Committee) and the Continuous Learning Task Force voiced support for Student Learning's recommendation that all secondary teachers will use Canvas starting Fall 2020 to provide a consistent LMS experience for students and families.

Based upon teacher, student, and family feedback, and with teachers, we are creating specific minimum requirements for how Canvas will be used. These guidelines are being developed to maximize clarity and access for students and families, taking into account that most families access Canvas content using the Canvas app. We are also developing templates that support the adoption of the guidelines. The implementation of these expectations will be addressed through bargaining with EEA.

Additional staff training opportunities for September, as well as resources for students and families, will be developed. For teachers who would like to learn more over the summer about using Canvas in a way that is accessible to all, Online PD will be available starting on June 26th (PD Portal Course 4001 "Canvas for All").

Using Canvas as the sole secondary LMS will enable students and families to find all learning materials in one place and to see these materials organized in a consistent way across all of their classes. It will also allow families to get set up as an observer only once and then see content/communications for all of their student's courses for all subsequent

years.

iReady Math

The Student Learning Department has presented a recommendation for a district-wide pilot of iReady math that would include all of K-6, middle school math, and a smaller group of high school math (most likely grade 9). The pilot would include both the iReady assessment and the online instruction components.

Over the last two years, we have been in a review and adoption process examining assessment systems for mathematics. Additionally, many teachers have been using iReady with their students during the school closure. 267 teachers, across K-12 and across 33 schools, have been using iReady this school year and providing feedback to inform the recommendation and proposal. The teams participating in this process have recommended iReady be implemented for math.

Our original plans included an expanded pilot for the 20-21 school year with selected schools and/or grade levels participating. As we evaluate teaching and learning needs for next school year and the likelihood of continuing some level of online or remote learning, we see the value in district-wide use of an assessment tool and the availability of an individualized mathematics intervention or enrichment tool for all students.


Details of the recommendation will continue to be processed with the Continuous Learning Task Force in the coming weeks, including training requirements, etc. We will provide updates as decisions are made.

We will keep you informed as our plans take development. Thank you for your work to serve students and families. We hope that everyone is able to find many moments of rest and rejuvenation during the summer months.



Thank you for all you do for our kids. I am excited and very hopeful as we continue to move forward.



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Dear Edmonds School District families,

After weeks of reviewing health and safety data surrounding COVID-19, as well as feedback from families and staff, the district's executive leadership team, School Board, and I believe the best course of action for Reopening Edmonds Schools 2020 is to reopen with all students in the **fully remote learning model of Continuous Learning 2.0**.

Before in-person learning can take place, we must ensure the safety of our students and staff. With the increasing health risks surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, we just do not see a way we can safely reopen our school buildings at this time.

The decision for our district was not made lightly and was based on a number of factors, including:

Snohomish County Health District announced today it recommends schools not reopen in-person at the start of the school year.

Increasing number of COVID-19 cases in Snohomish County, with the latest numbers indicating almost 100 cases per 100,000 people living in our county. This

rate is nearly identical to the rate of cases we saw when schools first closed in March.

This is the sixth consecutive increase in the case rate, which calculates a two-week period.

The current rate of infection is 4.5 times what it was in late May and early June.

20 percent of our staff identify as being in the high risk category for contracting the virus.

•

New research estimates there is a 37 percent chance that at least one person in a gathering of 50 people in Snohomish County is positive with COVID-19.

We realize our decision not to have in-person learning opportunities at this time extends the hardship, uncertainty and equity gaps already imposed on many of our families. Please know we are working to address learning needs, childcare and other impacts of this difficult choice.

TIMELINE FOR WHEN WE COULD RETURN TO IN-PERSON LEARNING

When it is safe for our students and staff, we look forward to offering in-person learning. A fully remote learning option would still be available for families.

We want to be as transparent with our families as possible when it comes to our strategic planning for in-person learning. At this time, we plan to do any switch to in-person learning at the start of each new quarter or semester. We would only allow for in-person learning if we receive guidance from our local and state health departments that it is safe.

Our current timeline is based on the logistics of returning to in-person learning for our teachers, students and families, and other critical operational and staffing processes needed for us to be able to safely reopen our buildings. We are committed to providing ongoing updates as we approach each possible transition date for in-person learning to allow for enough notice for families to plan for any changes.

Below we are providing the approximate dates for a possible return to in-person learning. Please keep in mind, however, that the health authorities and COVID-19 will ultimately make these decisions and we will adjust as needed.

Approximate dates to transition to in-person learning, if it is safe to do so:

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Nov. 12, 2020 Feb. 3, 2021 April 14, 2021

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Other key dates for students and families:

Wednesday, Sept. 9, 2020 - First day of school

Thursday, June 24, 2021 - Last day of school

CONTINUOUS LEARNING 2.0 WILL BE BETTER THAN THE SPRING

We know Continuous Learning in the spring was not perfect, and in fact, left many families frustrated. There was no playbook for what schools had to do when they were told to close their doors and immediately switch to a remote learning model. Never in my life would I have imagined having to close school buildings in such a drastic manner. However, we've learned and we've listened and we are working diligently to make the remote learning experience better.

We are committed to providing a high quality remote learning experience for our students, teachers and families in the following ways:

Streamline digital resources: We plan to offer one digital platform for our 3rd through 12th grade students. Our pre-k through 2nd grade students will have a separate digital platform that we believe is more suitable for younger students. We will share more specifics with families, including how to use these platforms, in the coming weeks.

Provide clear and consistent expectations: We want our students, families and staff to have a clear understanding of expectations for learning. Students in our advisory group for the planning of Reopening Edmonds Schools 2020 told us they want more day-to-day structure. With that in mind, we will continue to be flexible for our families and meet them where they are when it comes to remote learning.

Focus on providing a sense of belonging in a virtual environment: We want to have more opportunities for students to connect with their classmates and their teachers, which could include more virtual small group activities. We also will improve communication between families and teachers.

SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS AND FAMILIES

We recognize that distance learning cannot fully meet the needs of all our students. We have a group doing intentional work right now on the best ways the district can provide additional support when it comes to students receiving Special Education Services, English Learners, students experiencing homelessness and other needs.

COMMUNITY FORUMS

We hosted two virtual community forums in the past week and are grateful for families, students, staff and community members who joined us and shared their questions and concerns. Our next scheduled community forum will focus on students and include our student advisors on the panel. It takes place 6-7 p.m. Wednesday, July 29, 2020. You can find all the details for the community forum on our <u>website</u>.

Clear communication is our top priority and we will continue to hold community forums that will be based on different topics ranging from Special Education, middle school, high school, elementary school, and one specifically for our incoming kindergarten families. We will share those dates and times with you in the coming weeks.

FURTHER QUESTIONS?

We know there are still many more questions, and we may not have all the answers at this moment, however, please know we are working extremely hard and with a deep sense of responsibility to our students. We will continue to add more frequently asked questions with answers to our <u>Reopening Edmonds Schools 2020 FAQ website</u>.

I want to say a sincere thank you to all of our families. This is an extremely difficult time and I want to assure all our families that we are doing everything we can to support the health of our community and provide our students with the education they deserve.

I look forward to a time when we can meet in person and I can go to schools and get to know our incredible students. That day will come.

STUDENT DAILY ATTENDANCE

Students are expected to attend school daily. Teachers will take daily attendance while students are in a fully remote or hybrid learning model, as required by the state.

Daily attendance will be taken and students should expect to access the live (synchronous) Zoom sessions provided by their teachers on Monday-Tuesday-Thursday-Friday and participate in on-demand (asynchronous) activities on Wednesdays.

In instances where a student is unable to attend the live (synchronous) Zoom sessions provided by their teachers, students must demonstrate attendance in an alternate way and communicate that to the teacher. Examples could include email, phone call, video conference, text via Remind application, etc. Communicating with teacher(s) is critical.

Schools will implement their regular procedures for excused and unexcused absences. Schools will continue to use the School Messenger attendance notification system to contact parents/guardians when a student is absent. Contact your school if you have further questions regarding daily required attendance.

GRADING STUDENTS

All transcripts for the 2020-21 school year will have a COVID-19 designation included to

capture the uniqueness of this time. During remote and hybrid learning, the district will grade students in the following ways:

Kindergarten through 6th grade students

Standards-based Grading (1-4)

A-D or No Credit (NC).

Including the NC (which is to be treated like the Incomplete (I) designation used in the spring) in place of an F grade allows for consideration of the COVID-19 pandemic and remote learning factors that may limit some students' access and ability to engage.

•

Students given an NC for a course will be given opportunities to re-engage in learning and complete the course. A plan for course completion and earning credit will be developed between the teacher, student, parents/guardians, counselor, and administrators as appropriate.

What if my student received an Incomplete (I) grade in the spring of 2020?

The district is following the state's recommendations and will provide students with multiple pathways to convert Incompletes (I) into passing grades. Schools principals and counselors will work closely with students and families to develop plans for converting any Incompletes. Some of those pathways could include the following:

Working with the teacher who assigned the Incomplete to finish coursework needed to earn a passing grade is preferred.

- Backfilling credit by taking and passing the next course in the sequence.
- Independent Study developed in consultation with the teacher.
- Taking and completing online courses through Edmonds eLearning Academy.
- Earning competency-based credits through assessments or High School and Beyond Plan Pathways.

Students with an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) that specifies Pass/Fail (P/F)

If your student has modified grading as part of their IEP, the student may only earn a P or NC, not an F.

Your student's Learning Management System (LMS) will serve as the homebase for schedules, lessons, assignments, feedback from teachers, links to Zoom meetings and teacher/student messaging.

Contact tracing is taking place and those who were in close contact with the infected person will be notified and given further instructions.





Dear ESC staff,

As we continue to navigate through the COVID-19 pandemic, the district will continue to do everything possible to keep employees safe and healthy.

Today we are providing all staff who typically work out of the Educational Services Center (ESC) with an update regarding building access. Similar information will be going out to all staff regarding access to school buildings and other facilities soon.

FIRST, CONTINUE TO WORK REMOTELY IF POSSIBLE

Our preference is that all employees who can do their work remotely continue to do so. The fewer people in the building the better from a health and safety perspective.

IF YOU MUST BE IN THE BUILDING, WORK WITH YOUR SUPERVISOR

Employees who cannot do their work remotely, or who are essential workers, must continue to work with their supervisor to approve their access to the building. Supervisors, we ask you to please do what you can to limit the number of people working in a shared space. This could include staggering work hours or work days for employees who need to work out of the ESC.

EMPLOYEE ACCESS INTO BUILDINGS MUST BE DOCUMENTED

All employees must fill out the district's **Building Access Tracking** form for each day they enter a district building. Please save the shared document and use it as needed. Each site has its own tab at the top of the document. This information is critical for the custodial team so that they can thoroughly clean areas of the building that were accessed by staff.

ATTESTATION REQUIREMENT - BEGINS MONDAY, AUG. 10, 2020

Beginning Monday, Aug. 10, 2020, all staff who come into the ESC *must* complete an attestation process. This process will require each employee to answer questions to confirm they are healthy and have not been exposed to COVID-19. All staff who come into the ESC must complete this <u>Attestation Form</u> before entering the building.

VISITORS IN THE BUILDING

We understand some visitors, primarily new employees, will need to come into the ESC. Those visitors must have an appointment and be escorted by an employee. They must also sign in and out on the sheet at the front desk AND fill out the required <u>Attestation Form</u>. You can email your visitor the link to the form prior to them entering the building or they can fill out a hardcopy at the front desk. DO NOT LET ANY VISITORS INTO THE BUILDING UNLESS THEY HAVE AN APPOINTMENT WITH YOU.

FACE COVERING REQUIREMENTS

Starting June 28, 2020 every Washingtonian must wear a facial covering when in a public space. This includes both indoor and outdoor public spaces. Face coverings continue to be required for anyone entering and navigating all public spaces in a district building. If you are working at the ESC, it is an expectation that you wear a face covering at all times and you maintain social distancing requirements when you interact with others. This includes those instances when you are walking about the building.

Employees must also wear face coverings when interacting with others while they are behind a Plexiglas barrier and are socially distanced. While the use of barriers is encouraged, it does not remove the requirement that workers have to wear a face covering.

As a reminder, your cloth face coverings can and should be routinely laundered at home.

WORKING ALONE

You do not need to wear a mask when working alone. You are considered to be working alone when you are isolated from interaction with other people and have little or no expectation of in-person interruption.

Examples of working alone include:

By yourself inside an office with four walls and a door.

•

By yourself inside of a cubicle with 4 walls (one with an opening for an entryway) that are high enough to block the breathing zone of anyone walking by, and whose work activity will not require anyone to come inside of the cubicle.

LIMIT IN-PERSON SOCIAL INTERACTIONS

When working on site, please limit your interactions with colleagues to less than 15 minutes and be sure to wear a face covering at all times.

CONFERENCE ROOMS - LIMITED ACCESS

Due to the cleaning required each time a person enters and exits a conference room, we are asking employees to avoid using the conference rooms. If you do need to access a conference room, please contact <u>Matt Finch, Director of Facilities and Operations</u> so his team can properly clean the space.

BREAK ROOM ETIQUETTE

Employees on site may use a break room to access vending machines, microwaves, other cooking equipment and the refrigerator. Please DO NOT congregate in the break room or eat your food in these spaces. We ask all employees to eat at their workstation or find space outside.

Face coverings may be removed during lunch, but social distancing needs to be maintained.

ELEVATORS

Only one person should take the elevator at a time, unless assistance is needed.

STUDENTS ACCESSING THE BUILDING

In promoting health and safety in our district buildings, we are not allowing students to access any of our buildings at this time. We understand there may be some urgent needs for students to come to our buildings, but until we have developed a more formal protocol for this, please do not schedule any student access. Please complete all work remotely with students and families.

Dear staff,

All Edmonds School District staff are now part of Phase 1B2 of <u>Washington's COVID-</u> <u>19 Phases</u>, which includes Pre-K through 12th grade educators and staff. The state's plan was updated yesterday with new qualifiers for the phases and the estimated timeline for vaccination distribution.

We do not know exactly when there will be enough vaccines available to move to Phase 1B2, but it will likely be when about 50 percent of those in Phase 1B1 have received their first dose of the vaccine. We will continue to update you. The current state timeline anticipates spring/summer, but we are hopeful that timeline will move up as we have seen it do so already. We ask you to stay patient and know your time is coming very soon.

Staff 65 years or older

For staff 65 or older, Snohomish Health District has moved into Phase 1B1 for administering the vaccine in our county. The Phase 1B1 Tier includes:

- All people 65 years or older
- •

People 50 years or older who live in multigenerational households (2 or more generations)

Example: An older adult who cannot live alone and is being cared for by a relative or in-home caregiver, or an older adult who shares the home with a grandchild.

Also, please know that the district is working to get an Edmonds School District staff only vaccination clinic set up. We will update staff as soon as we have more information. In the meantime, we encourage you to use the resources below to get vaccinated.

EXPANDED VACCINE ELIGIBILITY AND ACCESS

President Biden announced efforts to provide all K-12 workforce and child care providers with one dose of vaccine by the end of March. This was followed by <u>a</u> <u>directive issued by Health and Human Services (HHS)</u>. In response, Governor Inslee expanded Phase 1b1 to include teachers and child care workers effective immediately.

Vaccine supply for teachers and child care workers will come in part from the Federal Retail Pharmacy Program, but all enrolled providers are directed to vaccinate these workers, as well. The current participating pharmacies in Washington are <u>Safeway/Albertsons</u>, <u>Costco</u>, <u>Rite Aid</u>, <u>Health Mart Independent</u>. <u>Pharmacies</u>, Kroger (Fred Meyer and QFC), and <u>Walmart</u>.

Washington Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) <u>previously</u> <u>announced a partnership with Kaiser Permanente</u> on a large-scale school vaccination plan to equitably and safely vaccinate Washington educators and school staff. The VA's Puget Sound Health Care System also announced this week that they are now vaccinating veterans of all ages. Eligible veterans can call 206-716-5716 to schedule, or contact their primary care team within the VA.

Governor Inslee also announced <u>modifications to Phases 1b2-1b4</u>, as well as timelines to begin each group. While tentative and subject to change based on vaccine supply and demand, they are as follows:

Phase 1b2 will become eligible on March 22. This group includes all critical workers in certain congregate settings, people age 16 or older who are pregnant, and those 16 or older who have a disability that puts them at higher risk.

Phase 1b3 will open April 12 for those age 50 or older with two or more comorbidities, and April 26 for 16 or older with two or more comorbidities.

Phase 1b4 will start April 26 for people who live in congregate housing, as well staff and volunteers who work in congregate settings not covered in Phase 1b2.

Snohomish County residents are encouraged to visit the Phase Finder tool at <u>findyourphasewa.org</u> prior to making an appointment for vaccination. The Phase Finder tool is designed to help people in Washington find out if they are eligible for a COVID vaccine now or if not, sign up to be notified when they become eligible.

It's important to note that where people currently land in the prioritization and phases is not a reflection on their value in this community. If we had unlimited vaccine supply and clinical capacity to administer the vaccine, prioritization would not be necessary. But neither of those are the case.

This is why, until vaccines start flowing into Washington and Snohomish County at a higher and more predictable pace, there is a need to prioritize the limited capacity not necessarily toward those at higher risk of acquiring COVID, but rather for those most likely to become severely ill, require hospitalization, and/or die if they get infected.

Even after being vaccinated, people should wear a mask in shared spaces, avoid large gatherings, stay home if they feel ill, wash their hands, and clean and sanitize surfaces. It is important to keep up with preventive measures while work continues to vaccinate more people.

MESSAGE FROM YMCA:

Hello Chase Lake Families,

You are receiving this email because your child may have been exposed to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) while attending our Y program at Chase Lake. If you or your child has COVID-19 symptoms, please contact your medical provider. We ask that you contact us immediately after a diagnosis has been made. Attached is a fact sheet about COVID-19 and below are the instructions about isolating and the return to program.

Your child was exposed on Tuesday 1/26. CDC currently recommends testing 5 days

after exposure for most accurate results, which means getting a test on Saturday (tomorrow 1/30) at the earliest is best.

The CDC currently recommends a quarantine period of 14 days. However, based on local circumstances and resources, the following options to shorten quarantine are acceptable alternatives:

Quarantine can end after day 10 without testing and if no symptoms have been reported during daily monitoring.

When diagnostic testing resources are sufficient and available, then quarantine can end after day 7 if a diagnostic specimen tests negative and if no symptoms were reported during daily monitoring. The specimen may be collected and tested within 48 hours before the time of planned quarantine discontinuation (day 5 or day 6), but quarantine cannot be discontinued earlier than day 7. Testing for the purpose of earlier discontinuation of quarantine should be considered only if it will have no impact on community diagnostic testing. Testing of persons seeking evaluation for infection must be prioritized. This means if your child tests negative over the weekend, they may return to program on Tuesday 2/2/21

With both options, the person should meet additional criteria of continued symptom monitoring and adherence to non-pharmaceutical interventions (current and consistent mask use, social distancing, hand and cough hygiene, environmental cleaning and disinfection, avoiding crowds, ensuring adequate indoor ventilation).

CONTACT TRACING

Health officials complete contact tracing with information provided by the person(s) who tested positive. The person(s) in any positive COVID-19 case shares when they developed symptoms, what their activity was in a building and if they were following social distancing guidelines, wearing a mask, and practicing hand hygiene. Health officials then determine who had close contact with this person(s).

WHAT IS THE DEFINITION OF A CLOSE CONTACT?

Close contact is defined as being within six feet of a person for more than 15 minutes. Those people are considered primary contacts. Health officials reach out to them and direct them to contact their healthcare provider, recommend they be tested, and to self-isolate. If any of those contacts test positive, then the process is repeated for their close contacts.

CONFIDENTIALITY OF STUDENTS AND STAFF

In all cases, the source patient's identity and close contacts will be kept confidential to protect their privacy.

DAILY HEALTH SCREENING

We want all staff and students to monitor for symptoms daily. We also want all staff and students to socially distance, wear masks, and practice hand hygiene.

REMOTE LEARNING DURING A BUILDING CLOSURE

In the event that a building is closed due to a case of COVID, all remote learning activities will continue as scheduled.

We understand getting vaccinated is an important step on the path to fight the COVID-19 pandemic and get more students and staff back into our school buildings.

We are working closely with the Snohomish Health District to provide the latest information on vaccine distribution and when Edmonds School District employees are eligible to receive them.

PreK-12th grade teachers and school staff are not currently eligible for the vaccine until Phase 2, however I joined with the Mukilteo and Everett school districts to send a letter to Gov. Jay Inslee today requesting the timeline for staff to be moved up. You can view <u>that letter on our website</u>.

We do not have a specific timeline for when Phase 2 will launch. Some staff may fall under the earlier categories to get vaccinated and we encourage you to do so.

Current vaccination status

Please be sure to follow all the state and county guidelines for the COVID-19 vaccination process.

As of Wednesday, Jan. 13, 2021, the state is in Phase 1A of the vaccination distribution plan. This phase includes the following people:

Workers in sites where direct patient care is being frequently delivered to confirmed or suspected COVID-19 patients, including screening and testing sites.

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High-risk first responders and workers frequently performing high-risk procedures with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 patients.

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Residents and staff of nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and other communitybased, congregate living settings where most individuals over 65 years of age are receiving care, supervision, or assistance.

Workers administering vaccines.

If you fall within Phase 1A, you can learn more and register for a vaccination appointment <u>here</u>.

You will be required to attest that you are in the 1A category upon registration and provide identification to verify that you fall within the Phase 1A eligibility, which could include one of the following:

- Workplace badge
- Paystub
- Business card
- DOH voucher

Vaccine sites

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Once you become eligible, you can find information on <u>the Snohomish Health District</u> <u>website</u>, including how to register for an appointment and where the vaccinate sites are located.

We are working with local healthcare providers to use one or more of our campuses in the near future for vaccine distribution sites. These sites would not be operated by the ESD. Employees would still need to register for a vaccination appointment through the Snohomish Health District once they are eligible.

There are several resources available to track progress of the vaccine rollout on the <u>Snohomish Health District's website</u>.

Continue with preventative measures

We understand vaccines are just one tool in our toolkit until most of us are vaccinated. It is still very important to continue with preventative measures, such as washing your hands, wearing a mask, staying six feet apart and limiting gatherings.

Celebrating Thanksgiving

Traditional Thanksgiving gatherings with family and friends are fun but can increase the chances of getting or spreading COVID-19 or the flu. COVID-19 and Animals

We do not know the exact source of the current outbreak of COVID-19, but we know that it originally came from an animal, likely a bat. We are still learning about this virus, but it appears that it can spread from people to animals in some situations. However, there is currently no evidence that animals play a significant role in spreading COVID-19. Research on COVID-19 in animals is limited. Studies are underway to learn more about how this virus can affect different animals.

COVID-19 in Animals

Travel During the COVID-19 Pandemic

Travel increases your chance of getting and spreading COVID-19. Staying home is the best way to protect yourself and others from COVID-19. You

can get COVID-19 during your travels. You may feel well and not have any symptoms, but you and your travel companions (including children) may spread COVID-19 to other people including your family, friends, and community for 14 days after you were exposed to the virus. Don't travel if you are sick or if you have been around someone with COVID-19 in the past 14 days, and don't travel with someone who is sick.

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Cleaning and Disinfecting Your Home

When cleaning and disinfecting, always read and follow the directions on the product label to ensure safe and effective use. Wear skin protection and consider eye protection for potential splash hazards, ensure adequate ventilation, avoid mixing chemical products, label diluted cleaning solutions, and store and use chemicals out of the reach of children and pets. When cleaning soft surfaces, such as carpeted floors, rugs, and drapes, clean the surface with soap and water and launder items (if possible) according to the manufacturer's instructions.



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



If having guests to your home, limit the number of guests, have conversations with guests ahead of time to set expectations for celebrating together, and clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces and items between use. If celebrating indoors, bring in fresh air by opening windows and doors, if possible. Have guests bring their own








- Diversify participation in the resilience and emergency management economy.


	Leaders Helping Veterans to Successful Civilian Employment Transitions: An Interview with Center's Advisory Board Member, Steve Vincent, PMP

	There is an increased demand in all sectors of the community for professionals, who understand the complex nature of Public Safety, Security and emergency Management. Combined with an aging workforce at or near retirement, the demand has dramatically increased the need to prepare students to enter these fields.

Washington State companies and organization are seeking now more than ever employees in the security industry, law enforcement, emergency communications, and public health care professionals with emergency and disaster management experience. Our military population is a key source of talent to meet these demands. However, the current approach to transitioning military to these professions fails to fully leverage their experience and education

and lacks consistency.

The Center, with leadership from its Advisory Board Members such as Steve Vincent, got actively involved in helping educate employers and Veterans to facilitate successful transitions to civilian jobs. The Center produced a guide that provides a crosswalk based on the skill level and experience of the veteran to determine what certification, licenses and credentials would be utilized by civilian employers.



Volunteer Resource Guidebook

The Center will be creating a Washington State Volunteer Resource Guidebook, which will include organizations where citizens can volunteer. Many young people finish college successfully only to find that their resume doesn't have everything they need to land a job in their field. New graduates are advised to remember that their volunteer experience is a great thing to include when building their resume. People who volunteer and/or intern should remember that unpaid work is a valid and helpful thing to exhibit as part of their work experience history. Volunteers are advised to think about what specific list of qualities applies to their history of experience and then gear it towards the field that they are hoping to go into. Someone who is volunteering in their career pathway to gain experience can document their volunteer hours both in long-term weekly volunteer commitments which count more like a part-time job as well as projects over a period of time which could be counted more as an internship.



The ultimate goal has always been, and will always be, to provide great experiences to volunteers and affect the community in an organized and efficient way. Organizations that have successful advantage trends, utilize technology and adjust to changes have the best chance of recruiting volunteers, retraining them, making a bigger impact and positively touching the bottom line.

But people's fear about COVID-19 will remain and that, along with information you've learned about each other, will likely impact your decisionmaking.


Unfortunately, some people will engage in behaviors that negatively impact others under the guise of "health and safety." This will be an additional level of misconduct you may encounter. You will see and hear what's going on. You will feel like you should do something or say something, but you don't know what to say or do. You may fear that if you intervene, you could be the next target. We make decisions daily about whether to act based upon our morals and values or surrender them based on fear, bias, indifference or some other factor. But everyone, including faculty, staff, students, safety directors, law enforcement, and administrators, have a responsibility to speak up.

As we transition, this is the perfect time to explore our decisionmaking process and learn practical strategies for transforming bystanders into allies and advocates.

Dear staff,

We want to clarify that all Edmonds School District staff are part of **Phase 1B2-4** of <u>Washington's COVID-19 Phases</u>. Earlier we communicated that all staff were part of Phase 1B2, but staff under 50 years old are currently in tier 4. This is complex and we apologize for any confusion.

Here's the bottom line, the state is telling us that all school employees will have the opportunity to receive a COVID-19 vaccination in **Phase 1B**. Our district will work with Snohomish Health District and do what we can to get all staff, no matter your tier in Phase 1B, vaccinated at the same time. We are hopeful we will be able to host vaccination clinics for all staff, again, no matter what tier you fall under in Phase 1B.

Thank you for your understanding as we deal with new information daily. We will keep you updated.

Dear staff,

All Edmonds School District staff are now part of Phase 1B2-4 of <u>Washington's</u> <u>COVID-19 Phases</u>, which includes Pre-K through 12th grade educators and staff. The state's plan was updated yesterday with new qualifiers for the phases and the estimated timeline for vaccination distribution.

We do not know exactly when there will be enough vaccines available to move to Phase 1B2-4, but it will likely be when about 50 percent of those in Phase 1B1 have received their first dose of the vaccine. We will continue to update you. The current state timeline anticipates spring/summer, but we are hopeful that timeline will move up as we have seen it do so already. We ask you to stay patient and know your time is coming very soon.

Staff 65 years or older

For staff 65 or older, Snohomish Health District has moved into Phase 1B1 for administering the vaccine in our county. The Phase 1B1 Tier includes:

All people 65 years or older

People 50 years or older who live in multigenerational households (2 or more generations)

Example: An older adult who cannot live alone and is being cared for by a relative or in-home caregiver, or an older adult who shares the home with a grandchild.

While we wait for Phase 1B2-4, we urge you to continue doing your part to keep yourself and others safe by wearing your mask, washing your hands frequently and avoiding social gatherings. We are getting close, but we must stay the course.


Some colleges, including Ivy League schools, have canceled fall sports altogether, while others plan to limit stand capacity by 50%.



Wearing Masks to Control the Spread of COVID-19


People age 2 and older should wear masks in public settings and when around people who don't live in their household. Masks offer some protection to you and are also meant to protect those around you, in case you have COVID-19, but don't know it. A mask is NOT a substitute for social distancing and should still be worn in addition to staying at least 6 feet apart from others. However, masks may not be necessary when you are outside by yourself away from others, or with other people who live in your household.



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before you go. Check with the person hosting the gathering on whether steps are in place to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Be prepared to bring supplies to help you and others stay healthy at the gathering. You should bring masks (bring extra), hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol, and drinking water. While at the gathering, stay at least 6 feet apart from people who don't live in your household; avoid self-serve food or drink options, such as buffets, salad bars, and condiment or drink stations; and wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use hand sanitizer immediately before eating food or after touching any common surfaces like hand railings, door handles, and toilets. Stay home if you have been diagnosed with COVID-19, if you are waiting for COVID-19 test results or may have been exposed to someone with COVID-19.

Dining at a Restaurant

Before dining at a restaurant, call and ask if all staff are wearing masks while at work, and if options for self-parking are available. Wear masks when within 6 feet from other people or indoors; maintain a distance of 6 feet or more in any entryway, hallway, or waiting area; sit outside when possible, and choose food and drink options that are not self-serve. Wash your hands for at least 20 seconds when entering and exiting the restaurant or use a hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.



In the aftermath of 9/11, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) developed standards for planning, responding to, and recovering from similar terrorist attacks. Through Homeland Security Presidential Directive 8 (HSPD-8) the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and the Incident Management System (ICS) was adopted. The intent was to create an ability to respond to an incident and to be able to communicate and work under one standard system. With 85% of first responders being trained in Community and Technical Colleges, the Center of Excellence for HSEM was established in September 2004.

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

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
Building Cultures of Preparedness With Tribes – An Overview



There are a lot of obstacles in the way of progress in the state/tribal relationship. This agreement provided an action plan based on a foundation of historical understanding and common objectives. The discussion centered on these main areas: defining the state/tribal relationship, economic development, natural resource management, and social/cultural/education/law enforcement. A state/tribal workgroup was established and developed a process, structure, and protocols to implement the Centennial Accord and the New Millennium Agreement into a day-to-day working relationship.

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Interview with Elyzabeth Estrada



For this month's Confluence, we wanted to highlight tribal emergency managers. Our Education & Outreach Coordinator, Brandi Hunter, recommended we highlight Elyzabeth Estrada. Brandi said, "I met Elyzabeth on LinkedIn. She had joined Aspiring Emergency Managers Online and introduced herself to me and said she would like to help the community any way she could. From there I asked her if she would like to do one of AEMO's video series called '3-Minute Informational Videos' which features professional emergency managers and provides a snapshot of their experience as an

emergency manager in their field/expertise and how aspiring emergency managers can get their foot in the door of an all-hazards field. She also participated in AEMO's first webinar called 'Insider Series' which is a follow up to the video series for a live Q&A with participating aspiring emergency managers.

Elyzabeth is a Training & Exercise Emergency Management Coordinator at the University of

Miami Health System & Miller School of Medicine in Miami, FL. She currently serves as the Planning Section Chief (PSC) for the Health System's Medical Coordination Center (MCC) and currently during the Public Health Emergency: COVID-19 response.

In 2014, Elyzabeth began as an intern at the Miami-Dade County Office of Emergency Management. She was then hired as an Emergency Management Specialist where she supported the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in the Evacuation Support Unit aiding in the coordination efforts for the County's vulnerable population community and assisted the Recovery Manager during an activation of the Recovery Operations Center.

Brandi talked with Elyzabeth in an interview about her experience from 2016 to 2018 working with Seminole Tribe of Florida, a federally recognized Tribe as an Emergency Management Coordinator where she routinely executed tabletop exercises for executive leadership in the Gaming Enterprise: Hard Rock International. During an Emergency Operations Center (EOC) activation, she served as the Human Services Branch Director. In this role, Elyzabeth supported the six Seminole Tribe of Florida reservations during the Hurricane Irma response.

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Crisis, Risk, Emergency, and Disaster (CRED) Communications (Fundamentals)

Crisis, Risk, Emergency, and Disaster (CRED) Communications are distinct yet intrinsically related fields. This course will introduce all of this and examine them as distinct areas that should be viewed and handled differently. It is the aim of this course to explore them as different fields and build appropriate skillsets. The course will provide, not just theoretical arguments, but practical solutions for practitioners charged with public communications in emergencies and disasters.

The Fundamentals Course is targeted at non-communications professionals who may be responsible for emergency communications on behalf of an agency or organization. Typically, these people may be responsible for warnings and updates for a situation their agency has no operational responsibility for, such as a fire at a school where the school needs to reach students and families but has no responsibility to provide commentary on the fire.

Topics include:

- Introduction
- Crisis, Risk, Emergency and Disaster Communications Fundamentals
- Public Communications Fundamentals
- Audiences and Reactions
- Messaging
- Short Messages

Outcomes:

- Build knowledge and understanding of the fields of crisis, risk, emergency, and disaster communication.
- Understand emotional, cultural, and community context in a disaster that affects disaster communication.
- Understanding of the need for strategy and how to develop and deliver a strategic plan in a disaster situation.

Become more prepared for emergencies with our training opportunities, grant programs and preparedness tips.

Training for Tribal Representatives

Training courses by FEMA's Emergency Management Institute (EMI). Specific courses are tailored to tribal audiences, including tribal emergency managers, tribal community response personnel, and tribal leaders.

Training: Center for Domestic Preparedness

The Center for Domestic Preparedness (CDP) trains emergency responders in ten different disciplines, such as law enforcement, healthcare and hazardous materials. Training for local, state and tribal responders is fully funded by DHS to include travel, lodging and meals.

<u>Getting Ready in Indian Country: Emergency Preparedness and Response for Native</u> <u>American Cultural Resources</u>

The Seminole Tribe of Florida's Ah-Tah-Thi-Ki Museum lives with the threat of hurricanes, wildfires, and mold. After Hurricane Wilma damaged the museum's roof in 2005, the staff realized that a functional emergency plan was needed. The museum is now part of a tribal-wide plan that includes annual updates, Incident Command System training, and regular drills. Museum Director Anne McCudden says proudly, "because of this work, we know we can safely evacuate our collections to a secure vault in 24 hours."

Tribal Curriculum

The Tribal Curriculum courses are delivered by a team of instructors who are carefully selected for their extensive experience working for a tribal government in emergency management and the majority of the instructors are Native. Feedback from participants unanimously supports the cultural appropriateness and credibility of the Tribal Curriculum instructor team.

Tribal Homeland Security Emergency Management Certificate

Created by Pierce College faculty, this map outlines the initial coursework for this career field. It provides you a clear path to complete your certificate by listing a specific set of courses relevant to your program and career. 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
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Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. - Happy Birthday

Women in Emergency Management Profile – Brandi Hunter



Brandi Hunter knows that when you're young, an impatience for too much talk and a preference for taking action can get you into more trouble than you expected. It certainly can make the people around you wonder, as you do yourself, where you'll end up.

But take those traits and add a husband and father who support your dreams and have faith in your abilities, mentors who offer wise counsel about your chosen field, and children who remind you daily

what it is all for. Weave in an educational program preparing you to work as an Emergency Manager.

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The Mental and Emotional Toll COVID-19 Has Impacted Our Frontline Health Care Workers

COVID-19 cases have not gone down, unfortunately, and continues to rise across the nation. Hospitals are continuing to be overwhelmed with patients. Our frontline health care workers are continuing to experience multiple stressors with little relief during the COVID-19 pandemic. There is a constant fear amongst health care workers and facilities of running out of ventilators and necessary supplies. It is not only physical risks of COVID-19 that health care workers have to worry about but mental ones. With COVID-19 patients deteriorating, families could not be by loved one's bedside, and it fell upon nurses and nursing assistants to help provide emotional support. Often forgoing breaks to stay by the patient's side and hold their hand as they took their last breath. That is a significant toll for anyone to take on.

When stress is left untreated, it can lead to mental health conditions such as anxiety, depression,

psychosis, and thoughts of suicide can arise or self-harm. Health care workers and caregivers are vital to the global response to the pandemic. However, they are often overlooked as a highly vulnerable population when it comes to getting infected with the virus.

To help combat stress:

• Know that it is okay to communicate with your supervisors and coworkers about the stress you are feeling.

• Talk about how the pandemic is affecting you and your work, which can help identify the factors that are causing the stress and begin identifying solutions.

• Ask if your workplace has any mental health resources.

• Understand that you will not always have control over certain things and begin to accept that notion.

• Keep reminding yourself that your role is essential and crucial in fighting this pandemic. Know that you are doing a good job and doing your best with the resources available for patients and staff. • Keep a daily routine notably similar to the schedule you had before the pandemic.

- · Get adequate sleep
- Be sure to take the time to eat healthy meals: breakfast, lunch, snack, and dinner.

• Spend time outdoors to get some fresh air or take a walk. Find things to enjoy during non-working hours.

• Use breathing exercises and mediation to help alleviate stress and anxiety.

The emotional and mental toll our frontline health care workers are experiencing may have a lasting toll for years to come. Nevertheless, health care workers will only become more vital in the battle to decrease COVID-19 cases and other viruses that will emerge in the years to come.



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Julie Jefferson


Communications Director (Lummi Indian Business Council)

"I would like to be remembered as someone who used whatever talent she had to do her work to the very best of her ability."

-Ruth Bader Ginsburg

Ruth Bader Ginsburg (RBG) was a trailblazer for women's rights in America. When discussing her legacy, RBG said, "To make life a little better for people less fortunate than you, that's what I think a meaningful life is. One lives not just for oneself but for one's community." That quote encompasses the type of person Ruth was, a champion for those who could not defend themselves.

RBG was well-known for the work she did before becoming a Supreme Court Justice, when she served as an advocate for the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) and became the designer of a legal strategy to bring cases to the courts that would ensure that the 14th Amendment's guarantee of equal protection applied to gender.

"I had the good fortune to be alive and a lawyer in the late 1960s when, for the first time in the history of the United States, it became possible to argue before the courts, successfully, that society would benefit enormously if women were regarded as persons equal in statue to men," she said in a commencement speech in 2002.


In 1980, President Jimmy Carter nominated Ruth to a seat on the DC circuit appeals court. She would be confirmed by the U.S. Senate on June 18, 1980. She would stay on the DC circuit appeals court until August 9, 1993 when President Bill Clinton nominated by to the U.S Supreme Court, role she would hold for the next 27 years.

At the Supreme Court, she was best known for the opinion she wrote in the United States v. Virginia which held the all-male admissions policy at the state funded Virginia Military Institute was unconstitutional for its ban on women applicants. Steve Vladeck, Supreme Court analyst and law professor at the University of Texas School of Law said that the decision "more than any other, epitomized the justices effort to establish true sex equality as a fundamental constitutional norm, and its effects are continuing to reverberate today."

RBG died on September 18, 2020 in Washington D.C. after a long and tough battle with pancreatic cancer. She fought long and hard, not just for her life, but for all of us. She was a defender for the underdog, the disenfranchised, and the people viewed least important by society and was the protector for civil, social, and women's rights. Her legacy must live on through us. Her hard work must not be brushed under the rug or pushed to the side by those willing to undermine certain civil liberties.

While RBG may no longer be with us, her memory and legacy of her anti-discrimination work will continue to live on in each of us. She stayed for as long as she could. In RBG's name, we will continue to seek justice for all.


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Members of state-wide Criminal Justice Work Group Read Ibram X. Kendi's, "How to Be an Antiracist"



HSEM Institute: Future Workshops

Our Center will focus on expanding the training and education activities available through the HSEM Institute. These trainings will provide professional development opportunities for faculty, industry professionals, and students. Trainings will be in the All-Hazards Emergency Management fields (Criminal Justice, HSEM, Occupational Health and Safety, EMT/EMS, Fire Command/Fire Services and Cybersecurity).

Business Continuity Planning, Resilience and Recovery, FEMA fundamentals, and Mental Health in Disaster Management have been identified as priority training. These courses will help students, faculty, and industry professionals gain awareness of industry needs, while staying current, and leveraging existing strengths and partnerships. Instructors will be industry experts who will provide well-developed courses and/or trainings that will benefit to those participating.

When Disruption Becomes the New Normal: Pathways to Resilient Communities will engage our public-private partners to become more disaster prepared so they will be ready, be connected, and be resilient.

The capacity of a business, organization, or community to rebound from a variety of impacts from an unforeseen event such as an economic disaster or sudden economic downturn is the focus of our "Pathways to Resilient Communities" training program. Unanticipated events can be catastrophic such as a major earthquake in which there is major damage and loss of life, major emergency such as a multi-jurisdictional flood, or an emergency such as a challenge to life safety require immediate action to prevent loss of life and can have major impact on the survival of a business, organization and community in the short and long-term. The ultimate goal of every organization is to protect critical resources and minimize loss in order to remain operational and profitable in our communities.

After a disaster, the Small Business Administration estimates that roughly 25-30% of businesses never reopen and those that do recover often suffer financial hardships after financing repairs and reclaiming their customer bases. We can give businesses, organizations, and communities the tools they need to effectively plan for disasters by becoming more resilient.

The training will not focus solely on the catastrophic, the content will address a range of disruptions that can happen in varying degrees which communities can anticipate and mitigate. We will teach a range of tools that can be used to "manage" a range of disruptions, we can create a more robust and durable community. The training will not only equip you with the tools you need to executive a business/organizational resiliency and disaster planning, but also designed to help you respond to addressing the resistance that occurs to change. This training will offer solutions for you to address the resistance whether it be lack of knowledge of the threat, the lack of motivation enough to act, or are not open to new ideas.
