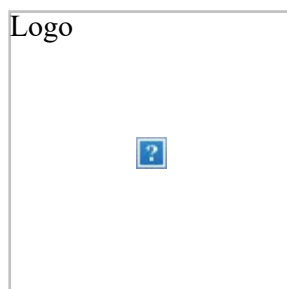
**Presenter: Ashley Owen, LMSW**
