Continuing Education Requirements for Traffic Safety Instructors

Summary: Public and private schools intending to offer Traffic Safety Education (TSE) are required, under Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 392-153-014, to apply annually to the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) for program approval. Programs must be approved by OSPI in order to enter valid completion information into the Department of Licensing's (DOL) License Express for Business.

Governor Inslee hereby directs that Washington State and United States flags at all state agency facilities be lowered to half-staff on Wednesday, May 15, 2019, in recognition of the annual Peace Officers Memorial Day.

Flags should remain at half-staff until close of business or sunset on May 15, 2019.

Of Notable Interest

Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

What is the Fundamental Course of Study (FCS)? A four day (28 hour) curriculum, the FCS is the core training all paraeducators must receive before working with students and their families, or at a minimum, by established deadlines. Learn more about the FCS.

What action is required? This new legislative funding decision means school districts are now required to provide two days of training on the FCS to all instructional paraeducators during the 2019-20 school year.

Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

What is the Fundamental Course of Study (FCS)? A four day (28 hour) curriculum, the FCS is the core training all paraeducators must receive before working with students and their families, or at a minimum, by established deadlines. Learn more about the FCS.

For the past five years, Battle Ground Public Schools (BGPS) has provided a variety of social 2/21/2020

emotional learning supports for students thanks to a national grant called Project AWARE. The primary goal of AWARE is to implement programs designed to address the mental health needs of children, youth, families/caregivers and communities. In partnership with OSPI (which served as the fiscal agent and lead agency), Educational Service District 112, and two other Washington school districts (Marysville and Shelton), our goal was to design and pilot a program working with community providers to deliver direct mental health services in schools. After reviewing requests for qualifications and developing memorandums of understanding with two community mental health service agencies, master's level mental health therapists were made available in all of BGPS' comprehensive schools at least one day per week. NEW! 2019-20 Mental Health Collaboration RequirementIn an effort to improve mental health supports for students, the legislature passed new legislation in 2018 to increase professional collaboration between school counselors, school social workers, school psychologists, other school staff, and local professional licensed counselors or mental health centers where available. Starting with the 2019-20 school year and within existing resources, school districts with 2,000 or more students must provide a minimum of 6 hours of professional collaboration focused on recognizing signs of emotional/behavioral stress, including but not limited to substance abuse, violence, youth suicide, screening, current resources and possible referrals.

NEW! 2019-20 Mental Health Collaboration RequirementIn an effort to improve mental health supports for students, the legislature passed new legislation in 2018 to increase professional collaboration between school counselors, school social workers, school psychologists, other school staff, and local professional licensed counselors or mental health centers where available. Starting with the 2019-20 school year and within existing resources, school districts with 2,000 or more students must provide a minimum of 6 hours of professional collaboration focused on recognizing signs of emotional/behavioral stress, including but not limited to substance abuse, violence, youth suicide, screening, current resources and possible referrals.

Of Notable Interest

Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

What is the Fundamental Course of Study (FCS)? A four day (28 hour) curriculum, the FCS is the core training all paraeducators must receive before working with students and their families, or at a minimum, by established deadlines. Learn more about the FCS.

What action is required? This new legislative funding decision means school districts are now required to provide two days of training on the FCS to all instructional paraeducators during the 2019-20 school year.

Training and preparation for school districts?We will host an informational webinar on June 6, from 12 to 1:30 p.m., to share new updates, and answer any questions you may have. Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

What is the Fundamental Course of Study (FCS)? A four day (28 hour) curriculum, the FCS is the core training all paraeducators must receive before working with students and their families, or at a minimum, by established deadlines. Learn more about the FCS.

What action is required? This new legislative funding decision means school districts are now required to provide two days of training on the FCS to all instructional paraeducators during the 2019-20 school year.

In partnership with OSPI (which served as the fiscal agent and lead agency), Educational Service District 112, and two other Washington school districts (Marysville and Shelton), our goal was to design and pilot a program working with community providers to deliver direct mental health services in schools. After reviewing requests for qualifications and developing memorandums of understanding with two community mental health service agencies, master's level mental health therapists were made available in all of BGPS' comprehensive schools at least one day per week. NEW! 2019-20 Mental Health Collaboration RequirementIn an effort to improve mental health supports for students, the legislature passed new legislation in 2018 to increase professional collaboration between school counselors, school social workers, school psychologists, other school staff, and local professional licensed counselors or mental health centers where available. Starting with the 2019-20 school year and within existing resources, school districts with 2,000 or more students must provide a minimum of 6 hours of professional collaboration focused on recognizing signs of emotional/behavioral stress, including but not limited to substance abuse, violence, youth suicide, screening, current resources and possible referrals.

NEW! 2019-20 Mental Health Collaboration RequirementIn an effort to improve mental health supports for students, the legislature passed new legislation in 2018 to increase professional collaboration between school counselors, school social workers, school psychologists, other school

staff, and local professional licensed counselors or mental health centers where available. Starting with the 2019-20 school year and within existing resources, school districts with 2,000 or more students must provide a minimum of 6 hours of professional collaboration focused on recognizing signs of emotional/behavioral stress, including but not limited to substance abuse, violence, youth suicide, screening, current resources and possible referrals.

To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

Legislature Opens up Multiple Pathways to Graduation for StudentsToday, Governor Inslee signed House Bill 1599 into law. The legislation provides students with several options to demonstrate college and career readiness. Below is Superintendent Chris Reykdal's statement. OLYMPIA—May 7, 2019—Until today, Washington state was one of the last in the nation to link state assessments to graduation.

State assessments were intended to serve as a tool to measure how well the K–12 system was doing. The assessments were not intended to be used to measure the progress and performance of individual students, and they certainly were not intended to serve as a barrier to high school graduation.

Ensuring students have access to a graduation pathway that aligns with their postsecondary goals has been my top policy priority for the past two years. I began this work in 2017 when I requested House Bill 2224, which provided options for students who did not pass state assessments to demonstrate readiness to graduate in other ways.

With the passage of House Bill 1599, students will now have multiple pathways to demonstrate readiness to graduate, and each pathway must be aligned to the student's High School and Beyond Plan.

The pathways include:

Completing a sequence of career and technical education (CTE) courses that lead to workforce entry, an approved apprenticeship, or postsecondary education. Completing and qualifying for college credit in dual credit programs in English language arts (ELA) or math. Meeting a certain score on the SAT or ACT. Meeting or exceeding standard on state assessments in ELA or math. Earning high school credit in a high school transition course in ELA or math. Meeting standard on the armed services vocational aptitude battery. The inclusion of a CTE pathway is vital to the success of our state's economy and it

will make a significant difference in the lives of our students. This pathway will allow students opportunities to select coursework that aligns with their postsecondary goals, with the intention of putting them on a path toward a career they love.

In addition to these important pathways, the bill also provides flexibility in meeting the 24 credits required for graduation. This option is available if students take courses aligned to their High School and Beyond Plan and postsecondary goals, and if they have met all other graduation requirements.

Finally, the bill extends the assessment waiver for students in the classes of 2019 and 2020 who did not pass the state assessment. Students in these cohorts will have the same options for graduation as students in the Class of 2018.

This is a significant step forward for our students and communities and required legislators on both sides of the political aisle, K–12 and higher education advocates, and business organizations to come together. I am thankful for the collaboration and hard work it took to pass this important legislation.

For the past five years, Battle Ground Public Schools (BGPS) has provided a variety of social emotional learning supports for students thanks to a national grant called Project AWARE. The primary goal of AWARE is to implement programs designed to address the mental health needs of children, youth, families/caregivers and communities. In partnership with OSPI (which served as the fiscal agent and lead agency), Educational Service District 112, and two other Washington school districts (Marysville and Shelton), our goal was to design and pilot a program working with community providers to deliver direct mental health services in schools. After reviewing requests for qualifications and developing memorandums of understanding with two community mental health service agencies, master's level mental health therapists were made available in all of BGPS' comprehensive schools at least one day per week. NEW! 2019-20 Mental Health Collaboration RequirementIn an effort to improve mental health supports for students, the legislature passed new legislation in 2018 to increase professional collaboration between school counselors, school social workers, school psychologists, other school staff, and local professional licensed counselors or mental health centers where available. Starting $\frac{2}{21}$

with the 2019-20 school year and within existing resources, school districts with 2,000 or more students must provide a minimum of 6 hours of professional collaboration focused on recognizing signs of emotional/behavioral stress, including but not limited to substance abuse, violence, youth suicide, screening, current resources and possible referrals.

Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

Legislature Opens up Multiple Pathways to Graduation for StudentsToday, Governor Inslee signed House Bill 1599 into law. The legislation provides students with several options to demonstrate college and career readiness. Below is Superintendent Chris Reykdal's statement. OLYMPIA—May 7, 2019—Until today, Washington state was one of the last in the nation to link state assessments to graduation.

State assessments were intended to serve as a tool to measure how well the K–12 system was doing. The assessments were not intended to be used to measure the progress and performance of individual students, and they certainly were not intended to serve as a barrier to high school graduation.

Ensuring students have access to a graduation pathway that aligns with their postsecondary goals has been my top policy priority for the past two years. I began this work in 2017 when I requested House Bill 2224, which provided options for students who did not pass state assessments to demonstrate readiness to graduate in other ways.

With the passage of House Bill 1599, students will now have multiple pathways to demonstrate readiness to graduate, and each pathway must be aligned to the student's High School and Beyond Plan.

The pathways include:

Completing a sequence of career and technical education (CTE) courses that lead to workforce entry, an approved apprenticeship, or postsecondary education. Completing and qualifying for college credit in dual credit programs in English language arts (ELA) or math. Meeting a certain score on the SAT or ACT. Meeting or exceeding standard on state assessments in ELA or math. Earning high school credit in a high school transition course in ELA or math. Meeting standard on the armed services vocational aptitude battery. The inclusion of a CTE pathway is vital to the success of our state's economy and it

will make a significant difference in the lives of our students. This pathway will allow students opportunities to select coursework that aligns with their postsecondary goals, with the intention of putting them on a path toward a career they love.

In addition to these important pathways, the bill also provides flexibility in meeting the 24 credits required for graduation. This option is available if students take courses aligned to their High School and Beyond Plan and postsecondary goals, and if they have met all other graduation requirements.

Finally, the bill extends the assessment waiver for students in the classes of 2019 and 2020 who did not pass the state assessment. Students in these cohorts will have the same options for graduation as students in the Class of 2018.

This is a significant step forward for our students and communities and required legislators on both sides of the political aisle, K–12 and higher education advocates, and business organizations to come together. I am thankful for the collaboration and hard work it took to pass this important legislation.

Mental health: A state of well-being in which one realizes one's own abilities, can cope with the normal stresses of life and self-regulate during stressful times, can work productively and fruitfully, and is able to make a contribution to the community. (Adopted in 2016 K12 Health Learning Standards)

Mental disorder: A medical condition characterized by mental or emotional problems severe or persistent enough to interfere with daily functioning. (Adopted in 2016 K12 Health Learning Standards)

Social-Emotional Outcomes Improved Through Project AWAREBy Sandy Mathewson, Director of Social Emotional Learning, Battle Ground Public Schools

For the past five years, Battle Ground Public Schools (BGPS) has provided a variety of social emotional learning supports for students thanks to a national grant called Project AWARE. The primary goal of AWARE is to implement programs designed to address the mental health needs of children, youth, families/caregivers and communities. In partnership with OSPI (which served as the fiscal agent and lead agency), Educational Service District 112, and two other Washington school districts (Marysville and Shelton), our goal was to design and pilot a program working with community providers to deliver direct mental health services in schools. After reviewing requests for qualifications and developing memorandums of understanding with two community mental health service agencies, master's level mental health therapists were made available in all of BGPS' comprehensive schools at least one day per week. NEW! 2019-20 Mental Health Collaboration RequirementIn an effort to improve mental health supports for students, the legislature passed new legislation in 2018 to increase professional collaboration between school counselors, school social workers, school psychologists, other school staff, and local professional licensed counselors or mental health centers where available. Starting with the 2019-20 school year and within existing resources, school districts with 2,000 or more students must provide a minimum of 6 hours of professional collaboration focused on recognizing signs of emotional/behavioral stress, including but not limited to substance abuse, violence, youth suicide, screening, current resources and possible referrals.

Re: Directory changes to schools for the 2019-20 school year

Summary: The Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) is responsible for establishing a numbering and classification scheme used to identify each school in our state. Of Notable Interest

Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

What is the Fundamental Course of Study (FCS)? A four day (28 hour) curriculum, the FCS is the core training all paraeducators must receive before working with students and their families, or at a minimum, by established deadlines. Learn more about the FCS.

What action is required? This new legislative funding decision means school districts are now required to provide two days of training on the FCS to all instructional paraeducators during the 2019-20 school year.

Training and preparation for school districts?We will host an informational webinar on June 6, from 12 to 1:30 p.m., to share new updates, and answer any questions you may have. This webinar is intended for school districts but is open to the public. 

Legislature Opens up Multiple Pathways to Graduation for StudentsToday, Governor Inslee signed House Bill 1599 into law. The legislation provides students with several options to demonstrate college and career readiness. Below is Superintendent Chris Reykdal's statement. OLYMPIA—May 7, 2019—Until today, Washington state was one of the last in the nation to link state assessments to graduation.

State assessments were intended to serve as a tool to measure how well the K–12 system was doing. The assessments were not intended to be used to measure the progress and performance of individual students, and they certainly were not intended to serve as a barrier to high school graduation.

Ensuring students have access to a graduation pathway that aligns with their postsecondary goals has been my top policy priority for the past two years. I began this work in 2017 when I requested $\frac{2}{21/2020}$

House Bill 2224, which provided options for students who did not pass state assessments to demonstrate readiness to graduate in other ways.

With the passage of House Bill 1599, students will now have multiple pathways to demonstrate readiness to graduate, and each pathway must be aligned to the student's High School and Beyond Plan.

The pathways include:

Completing a sequence of career and technical education (CTE) courses that lead to workforce entry, an approved apprenticeship, or postsecondary education. Completing and qualifying for college credit in dual credit programs in English language arts (ELA) or math. Meeting a certain score on the SAT or ACT. Meeting or exceeding standard on state assessments in ELA or math. Earning high school credit in a high school transition course in ELA or math. Meeting standard on the armed services vocational aptitude battery. The inclusion of a CTE pathway is vital to the success of our state's economy and it will make a significant difference in the lives of our students. This pathway will allow students opportunities to select coursework that aligns with their postsecondary goals, with the intention of putting them on a path toward a career they love.

In addition to these important pathways, the bill also provides flexibility in meeting the 24 credits required for graduation. This option is available if students take courses aligned to their High School and Beyond Plan and postsecondary goals, and if they have met all other graduation requirements.

Finally, the bill extends the assessment waiver for students in the classes of 2019 and 2020 who did not pass the state assessment. Students in these cohorts will have the same options for graduation as students in the Class of 2018.

This is a significant step forward for our students and communities and required legislators on both sides of the political aisle, K–12 and higher education advocates, and business organizations to come together. I am thankful for the collaboration and hard work it took to pass this important legislation.

Mental health: A state of well-being in which one realizes one's own abilities, can cope with the normal stresses of life and self-regulate during stressful times, can work productively and fruitfully, and is able to make a contribution to the community. (Adopted in 2016 K12 Health Learning Standards)

Mental disorder: A medical condition characterized by mental or emotional problems severe or persistent enough to interfere with daily functioning. (Adopted in 2016 K12 Health Learning Standards)

Social-Emotional Outcomes Improved Through Project AWAREBy Sandy Mathewson, Director of Social Emotional Learning, Battle Ground Public Schools

For the past five years, Battle Ground Public Schools (BGPS) has provided a variety of social emotional learning supports for students thanks to a national grant called Project AWARE. The primary goal of AWARE is to implement programs designed to address the mental health needs of children, youth, families/caregivers and communities. In partnership with OSPI (which served as the fiscal agent and lead agency), Educational Service District 112, and two other Washington school districts (Marysville and Shelton), our goal was to design and pilot a program working with community providers to deliver direct mental health services in schools. After reviewing requests for qualifications and developing memorandums of understanding with two community mental health service agencies, master's level mental health therapists were made available in all of BGPS' comprehensive schools at least one day per week. NEW! 2019-20 Mental Health Collaboration RequirementIn an effort to improve mental health supports for students, the legislature passed new legislation in 2018 to increase professional collaboration between school counselors, school social workers, school psychologists, other school staff, and local professional licensed counselors or mental health centers where available. Starting with the 2019-20 school year and within existing resources, school districts with 2,000 or more students must provide a minimum of 6 hours of professional collaboration focused on recognizing signs of emotional/behavioral stress, including but not limited to substance abuse, violence, youth suicide, screening, current resources and possible referrals.

Of Notable Interest

Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

What is the Fundamental Course of Study (FCS)? A four day (28 hour) curriculum, the FCS is the core training all paraeducators must receive before working with students and their families, or at a minimum, by established deadlines. Learn more about the FCS.

What action is required? This new legislative funding decision means school districts are now required to provide two days of training on the FCS to all instructional paraeducators during the 2019-20 school year.

Training and preparation for school districts? We will host an informational webinar on June 6, from 12 to 1:30 p.m., to share new updates, and answer any questions you may have. This webinar is intended for school districts but is open to the public. Registration information will be announced soon. We are attending the WSPA meeting on May 31, in Southcenter, to present on the Paraeducator Certificate Program and how to implement it. Fundamental Course of Study "Train the Trainer" days will take place on the following days: June 24, 2019: ESD 101, Spokane, WAJune 26, 2019: ESD 121, Renton, WAJune 27, 2019: ESD 112, Vancouver, WAAn Implementation Toolkit will be available for districts by July 1, 2019. This toolkit will include resources used and created by Paraeducator Pilot grantees, which can be used as guidance for school districts. Questions? Of Notable Interest

Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

What is the Fundamental Course of Study (FCS)? A four day (28 hour) curriculum, the FCS is the core training all paraeducators must receive before working with students and their families, or at a minimum, by established deadlines. Learn more about the FCS.

What action is required? This new legislative funding decision means school districts are now required to provide two days of training on the FCS to all instructional paraeducators during the 2019-20 school year.

Training and preparation for school districts? We will host an informational webinar on June 6, from 12 to 1:30 p.m., to share new updates, and answer any questions you may have. This webinar is intended for school districts but is open to the public. Registration information will be announced soon. Legislature Opens up Multiple Pathways to Graduation for StudentsToday, Governor Inslee signed House Bill 1599 into law. The legislation provides students with several options to demonstrate college and career readiness. Below is Superintendent Chris Reykdal's statement. OLYMPIA—May 7, 2019—Until today, Washington state was one of the last in the nation to link state assessments to graduation.

State assessments were intended to serve as a tool to measure how well the K–12 system was doing. The assessments were not intended to be used to measure the progress and performance of individual students, and they certainly were not intended to serve as a barrier to high school graduation.

Ensuring students have access to a graduation pathway that aligns with their postsecondary goals has been my top policy priority for the past two years. I began this work in 2017 when I requested

House Bill 2224, which provided options for students who did not pass state assessments to demonstrate readiness to graduate in other ways.

With the passage of House Bill 1599, students will now have multiple pathways to demonstrate readiness to graduate, and each pathway must be aligned to the student's High School and Beyond Plan.

The pathways include:

Completing a sequence of career and technical education (CTE) courses that lead to workforce entry, an approved apprenticeship, or postsecondary education. Completing and qualifying for college credit in dual credit programs in English language arts (ELA) or math. Meeting a certain score on the SAT or ACT. Meeting or exceeding standard on state assessments in ELA or math. Earning high school credit in a high school transition course in ELA or math. Meeting standard on the armed services vocational aptitude battery. The inclusion of a CTE pathway is vital to the success of our state's economy and it will make a significant difference in the lives of our students. This pathway will allow students opportunities to select coursework that aligns with their postsecondary goals, with the intention of putting them on a path toward a career they love.

In addition to these important pathways, the bill also provides flexibility in meeting the 24 credits required for graduation. This option is available if students take courses aligned to their High School and Beyond Plan and postsecondary goals, and if they have met all other graduation requirements.

Finally, the bill extends the assessment waiver for students in the classes of 2019 and 2020 who did not pass the state assessment. Students in these cohorts will have the same options for graduation as students in the Class of 2018.

This is a significant step forward for our students and communities and required legislators on both sides of the political aisle, K–12 and higher education advocates, and business organizations to come together. I am thankful for the collaboration and hard work it took to pass this important legislation.



Continuing Education Requirements for Traffic Safety Instructors

Summary: Public and private schools intending to offer Traffic Safety Education (TSE) are required, under Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 392-153-014, to apply annually to the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) for program approval. Programs must be approved by OSPI in order to enter valid completion information into the Department of Licensing's (DOL) License Express for Business.

Flag Lowering 5-15-19 (Peace Officers Memorial Day)

Governor Inslee hereby directs that Washington State and United States flags at all state agency facilities be lowered to half-staff on Wednesday, May 15, 2019, in recognition of the annual Peace Officers Memorial Day.

Flags should remain at half-staff until close of business or sunset on May 15, 2019.

Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

What is the Fundamental Course of Study (FCS)? A four day (28 hour) curriculum, the FCS is the core training all paraeducators must receive before working with students and their families, or at a minimum, by established deadlines. Learn more about the FCS.

What action is required? This new legislative funding decision means school districts are now required to provide two days of training on the FCS to all instructional paraeducators during the 2019-20 school year.

Training and preparation for school districts? We will host an informational webinar on June 6, from 12 to 1:30 p.m., to share new updates, and answer any questions you may have. This webinar is intended for school districts but is open to the public. Registration information will be announced soon. We are attending the WSPA meeting on May 31, in Southcenter, to present on the Paraeducator Certificate Program and how to implement it. Legislature Opens up Multiple Pathways to Graduation for StudentsToday, Governor Inslee signed House Bill 1599 into law. The legislation provides students with several options to demonstrate college and career readiness. Below is Superintendent Chris Reykdal's statement. OLYMPIA—May 7, 2019—Until today, Washington state was one of the last in the nation to link state assessments to graduation.

State assessments were intended to serve as a tool to measure how well the K–12 system was doing. The assessments were not intended to be used to measure the progress and performance of individual students, and they certainly were not intended to serve as a barrier to high school graduation.

Ensuring students have access to a graduation pathway that aligns with their postsecondary goals has been my top policy priority for the past two years. I began this work in 2017 when I requested House Bill 2224, which provided options for students who did not pass state assessments to demonstrate readiness to graduate in other ways.

With the passage of House Bill 1599, students will now have multiple pathways to demonstrate readiness to graduate, and each pathway must be aligned to the student's High School and Beyond Plan.

The pathways include:

Completing a sequence of career and technical education (CTE) courses that lead to workforce entry, an approved apprenticeship, or postsecondary education. Completing and qualifying for college credit in dual credit programs in English language arts (ELA) or math. Meeting a certain score on the SAT or ACT. Meeting or exceeding standard on state assessments in ELA or math. Earning high school credit in a high school transition course in ELA or math. Meeting standard on the armed services vocational aptitude battery. The inclusion of a CTE pathway is vital to the success of our state's economy and it will make a significant difference in the lives of our students. This pathway will allow students opportunities to select coursework that aligns with their postsecondary goals, with the intention of putting them on a path toward a career they love.

In addition to these important pathways, the bill also provides flexibility in meeting the 24 credits required for graduation. This option is available if students take courses aligned to their High School and Beyond Plan and postsecondary goals, and if they have met all other graduation requirements.

Finally, the bill extends the assessment waiver for students in the classes of 2019 and 2020 who did not pass the state assessment. Students in these cohorts will have the same options for graduation as students in the Class of 2018.

This is a significant step forward for our students and communities and required legislators on both sides of the political aisle, K–12 and higher education advocates, and business organizations to come together. I am thankful for the collaboration and hard work it took to pass this important legislation.

Continuing Education Requirements for Traffic Safety Instructors

Flags should remain at half-staff until close of business or sunset on May 15, 2019.

Of Notable Interest

Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

What is the Fundamental Course of Study (FCS)? A four day (28 hour) curriculum, the FCS is the core training all paraeducators must receive before working with students and their families, or at a minimum, by established deadlines. Learn more about the FCS.

What action is required? This new legislative funding decision means school districts are now required to provide two days of training on the FCS to all instructional paraeducators during the 2019-20 school year.

Training and preparation for school districts? We will host an informational webinar on June 6, from 12 to 1:30 p.m., to share new updates, and answer any questions you may have. This webinar is intended for school districts but is open to the public. Registration information will be announced soon. We are attending the WSPA meeting on May 31, in Southcenter, to present on the Paraeducator Certificate Program and how to implement it. Fundamental Course of Study "Train the Trainer" days will take place on the following days: June 24, 2019: ESD 101, Spokane, WAJune 26, 2019: ESD 121, Renton, WAJune 27, 2019: ESD 112, Vancouver, WAAn Implementation Toolkit will be available for districts by July 1, 2019. This toolkit will include resources used and created by Paraeducator Pilot grantees, which can be used as guidance for school districts. Questions? Legislature Opens up Multiple Pathways to Graduation for StudentsToday, Governor Inslee signed House Bill 1599 into law. The legislation provides students with several options to demonstrate college and career readiness. Below is Superintendent Chris Reykdal's statement. OLYMPIA—May 7, 2019—Until today, Washington state was one of the last in the nation to link state assessments to graduation.

State assessments were intended to serve as a tool to measure how well the K–12 system was doing. The assessments were not intended to be used to measure the progress and performance of individual students, and they certainly were not intended to serve as a barrier to high school graduation.

Ensuring students have access to a graduation pathway that aligns with their postsecondary goals has been my top policy priority for the past two years. I began this work in 2017 when I requested House Bill 2224, which provided options for students who did not pass state assessments to demonstrate readiness to graduate in other ways.

With the passage of House Bill 1599, students will now have multiple pathways to demonstrate readiness to graduate, and each pathway must be aligned to the student's High School and Beyond Plan.

The pathways include:

Completing a sequence of career and technical education (CTE) courses that lead to workforce entry, an approved apprenticeship, or postsecondary education. Completing and qualifying for college credit in dual credit programs in English language arts (ELA) or math. Meeting a certain score on the SAT or ACT. Meeting or exceeding standard on state assessments in ELA or math. Earning high school credit in a high school transition course in ELA or math. Meeting standard on the armed services vocational aptitude battery. The inclusion of a CTE pathway is vital to the success of our state's economy and it will make a significant difference in the lives of our students. This pathway will allow students opportunities to select coursework that aligns with their postsecondary goals, with the intention of putting them on a path toward a career they love.

In addition to these important pathways, the bill also provides flexibility in meeting the 24 credits required for graduation. This option is available if students take courses aligned to their High School and Beyond Plan and postsecondary goals, and if they have met all other graduation requirements.

Finally, the bill extends the assessment waiver for students in the classes of 2019 and 2020 who did not pass the state assessment. Students in these cohorts will have the same options for graduation as students in the Class of 2018.

This is a significant step forward for our students and communities and required legislators on both sides of the political aisle, K–12 and higher education advocates, and business organizations to come together. I am thankful for the collaboration and hard work it took to pass this important legislation.

Kindergarten Transition Resource HighlightsThree of the major goals of WaKIDS are to 1) promote a shared understanding of kindergarten readiness; 2) improve the preparedness of children, families, schools, and communities; and ultimately, 3) provide a smooth transition for children and families.

Increasingly, communities are looking for ways to do their part to meet these goals. OSPI encourages schools and teachers to promote, accept and use kindergarten information provided by families and preschool providers. Schools and kindergarten teachers may promote particular kinds of resources but should also be open to the various different ways that families may choose to share information about their children.

While there are many possible means for the sharing of information, OSPI is promoting the use of two specific resources:

Introducing Me! Booklet:

This booklet is used by kindergarten teachers during the Family Connection meeting to guide conversations and build relationships. Schools must now print their own copies to distribute to families, during kindergarten registration or at the Family Connection meetings.

Families may also be encouraged to complete an Introducing Me! booklet by their child's preschool teacher. Schools and kindergarten teachers should be prepared to provide families with an Introducing Me! booklet, as well as accept completed booklets that families may bring with them.

Available in 19 languages, booklets can be printed in color or black and white. These will no longer be provided to districts by OSPI or Educational Service Districts. Print Introducing Me! Booklets.

The Washington State's Kindergarten Transition Summary Form:

The Kindergarten Transition Summary Form, which can be found here, is a multi-faceted tool created to 1) establish shared expectations for school readiness between PreK & K teachers, 2) provide a means of communication children's skills and abilities, 3) support children and families as they transition into kindergarten, and 4) provide information to help schools and K teachers get to know each child prior to the start of school.

Some communities have developed their own preschool to kindergarten transition forms, or may prefer to share other types of information. Whatever the method of sharing may be, schools should look for an indication that families have been involved and give permission for information to be shared.

WaKIDS 101 Training - New ModelNEW Training Model for WaKIDS 101WaKIDS 101 is the one-time training required for all kindergarten teachers new to WaKIDS in 2019-20, including certificated Special Education teachers who provide instruction for kindergarten students with disabilities. If the responsibility of instruction is shared by multiple teachers, it is necessary that each teacher be trained.

Teachers must have attended a WaKIDS 101 training in order to administer each of the three components of the WaKIDS kindergarten entry transition process: Family Connection, Whole-child Assessment, and Early Learning Collaboration.

Beginning in July 2019, the WaKIDS 101 training will change from a two-day, in-person training to a one-day, in-person training, followed by a six-hour online course through Canvas. Teachers will have two weeks from the date of the in-person training to complete the online training. Teachers who do not complete both the in-person and the online sections of the training will not be permitted to conduct WaKIDS.

With the new training model, teachers will also have the option to remain involved with Canvas online community throughout the year, for continued learning and support with WaKIDS and full-day kindergarten. By the end of the training, and with completion of Interrater Reliability Certification, teachers will be prepared to begin implementing WaKIDS.

OSPI will monitor teacher involvement and completion of the in-person and online sections. Districts will be notified if teachers do not complete both sections of the WaKIDS 101 training.

Districts will be reimbursed through iGrants, up to a cap, for new teachers who will conduct WaKIDS in 2019-20 to participate in the in-person and online training sections of the WaKIDS 101 training, and to complete Interrater Reliability Certification. Districts will be notified about available funding through iGrants after September 30, 2019.

Continuing Education Requirements for Traffic Safety Instructors

Programs must be approved by OSPI in order to enter valid completion information into the Department of Licensing's (DOL) License Express for Business.

Of Notable Interest

Two days of professional development now required for all instructional paraeducators Washington State is heavily invested in ensuring all instructional paraeducators receive professional development to support our most diverse and vulnerable student populations. To support this commitment, during the 2019 legislative session, the Professional Educator Standards Board requested \$25.5 million per school year to fully fund the Paraeducator Certificate Program. The certificate program was developed to offer statewide, standards-based professional development for all paraeducators, and to support a career growth ladder for those who wish to pursue a teaching profession.

What was funded? The legislative session came to an end on April 28, revealing an allocated amount of \$12,001,000 for Washington school districts to provide two days of training (14 hours) to their paraeducators on the Fundamental Course of Study during school year 2019-20.

What is the Fundamental Course of Study (FCS)? A four day (28 hour) curriculum, the FCS is the core training all paraeducators must receive before working with students and their families, or at a minimum, by established deadlines. Learn more about the FCS.

What action is required? This new legislative funding decision means school districts are now required to provide two days of training on the FCS to all instructional paraeducators during the 2019-20 school year.

Training and preparation for school districts? We will host an informational webinar on June 6, from 12 to 1:30 p.m., to share new updates, and answer any questions you may have. This webinar is intended for school districts but is open to the public. Registration information will be announced soon. We are attending the WSPA meeting on May 31, in Southcenter, to present on the Paraeducator Certificate Program and how to implement it. Fundamental Course of Study "Train the Trainer" days will take place on the following days: June 24, 2019: ESD 101, Spokane, WAJune 26, 2019: ESD 121, Renton, WAJune 27, 2019: ESD 112, Vancouver, WAAn Implementation Toolkit will be available for districts by July 1, 2019. This toolkit will include resources used and created by Paraeducator Pilot grantees, which can be used as guidance for school districts. Questions?
