Hi Stephanie,

I'm an editor at BuzzFeed News in NY.

I'm currently fact checking a piece from a contributor, Brian Palmer, about Virginia's recent decision to grant money to the clean up of East End Cemetery.

I understand he was in touch with you.

I'm wondering if you can confirm two things for me:

- He submitted a FOIA request which revealed the following: Between 7/1/07 and 6/30/16, Virginia paid a total of \$728,325.00 to the United Daughters of the Confederacy and \$28,500 to the Sons of Confederate Veterans to fulfill their <u>statesanctioned</u> role to care for Confederate graves and cemeteries.
- You told him about a show called "Confederate Gold", which we understand is actually now called *Rebel Gold*, whose cast and crew damaged a slave homestead causing Virginia to spend \$5,000 to repair the historic site. (Can you tell me which year this occurred and how much was exactly spent?







Stephanie,

For 2015-2016 fiscal year, DHR Threatened Sites funded one slave relate project, the recovery of data from the Hairston Plantation in Pittsylvania County. Discovery TV had come in to film a show "Confederate Gold" and partially destroyed a well and a slaves' quarters storage pit. DHR funded a \$4,999 project for Hurt and Profitt, Inc. to salvage the remnants of the pit.

The only other project was related to Jordan's Journey, Prince George County, in 1989-1993, where several African-Americans were recovered. In the timeframe of occupation (first half 17^{th} c), they were not technically slaves. The amount of the project is unknown.

Going through the TS projects from 1985 to present, they are the only slave related projects with which I am familiar.

We received the April 2, 2019, reply from the Office of the Attorney General to our March 29 email. Thank you.

In this email, OAG states: "The Historical African American Cemetery & Graves Fund is solely administered by DHR. While this Office may provide legal advice to DHR, this Office has no discretion over whether to disburse funds, which organizations may receive those funds, or the process by which those decisions are made."

The Department of Historic Resources (DHR) informed us in a March 21, 2019, email (as well as a May 2018 email) that "staff at DHR are under advice of OAG counsel not to disburse funds for work at cemeteries where there are questions regarding ownership, as is the case with East End Cemetery."

We request that OAG clarify what agency/ies was/were responsible for the hold on disbursements so that we may determine the appropriate channels and methods through which to obtain full disclosure regarding the application process for funds under the Historical African American Cemeteries and Graves provision of the state code. We make the same request of DHR. (Ms. Williams: If you require us to make this request directly to DHR in a separate email, please let us know and we will do so.)

Further, so that we may gain clarity on this matter, we request that OAG provide to us—or make public—

any of its directives to DHR or other government entities regarding the Historical African American Cemeteries and Graves fund.

We understand that OAG may claim exceptions/exemptions for legal advice to state agencies under Virginia's FOIA law. We request public records that fall outside this category, particularly those that will explain the respective roles of state agencies in any stage of the process relating to the creation, oversight, or functioning of the fund.

In August 2017, the Friends of East End Cemetery (FoEE) submitted our application to the Department of Historic Resources (DHR) for the funds that would be made available for restoration efforts at East End Cemetery through the Historical African American Cemetery and Graves provision of the Code of Virginia.

We followed the procedure that DHR outlined: provide proof of FoEE's 501(c)(3) status and registration with the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS).

After we submitted a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request in April 2018, DHR informed us in its reply that it had not finalized the application process or finished creating procedures and regulations to evaluate grant requests and make

Again, as applicants under DHR's original process, we ask DHR to clarify our status and not to release any funding for East End Cemetery restoration until FoEE has been allowed to participate in the new application process. Further, if any award has been made or is pending for East End Cemetery restoration funds, we request that this process be frozen.

Please provide us with the appropriate materials so that we may apply for the funding through a fair and transparent process.

As we have documented, FoEE is qualified to receive these funds because it is a certified "charitable corporation . . . that has been granted tax-exempt status under § 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and whose primary purpose is the preservation of historical cemeteries and graves" as specified in § 10.1-2211.2 of the Code of Virginia as modified by HB 1547 (2017) and HB 284 (2018) relating to historic African American cemeteries. In addition, FoEE is a registered charity with VDACS, as we have noted.

DHR previously contacted us about the ownership of East End Cemetery and the need for the owner's approval to be granted funds. We provided detailed information on the cemetery's ownership from 1897 through 2017. Nowhere in these bills can we find any reference to having the permission of a cemetery's owner being a qualification for receiving these funds. Please clarify the source of this requirement.







Dear Attorney General Herring:

We, the Friends of East End Cemetery (FoEE), understand from a March 21, 2019, email that we received from the Department of Historic Resources (DHR) that "staff at DHR are under advice of OAG counsel not to disburse funds for work at cemeteries where there are questions regarding ownership, as is the case with East End Cemetery." This email was in response to a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request that FoEE filed.

FoEE has learned from DHR that funds have been allocated under Code of Virginia 10.1-2211.2 for restoration efforts at East End Cemetery, a historic African American cemetery located primarily in Henrico County. FoEE, the sole 501(c)(3) organization doing that restoration work, submitted an application for such funds to DHR in 2017 according to the process outlined at the time.

We learned from DHR in April 2018, once again through a FOIA, that a formal application procedure would be put in place. We received no notification that such a procedure or process had officially been established.

We write to OAG as an applicant for these state funds to ask under what terms and through what procedures will these funds be allocated?

Further, we ask that OAG not authorize or allow any disbursement of funds for East End Cemetery restoration by any agency of the Commonwealth of Virginia until all such terms and procedures have been disclosed publicly and all parties that have applied, including those such as FoEE that submitted applications under previous procedures, have had their applications openly reviewed.

We also request that before any awards are made that OAG offer the transparency on these matters that we have been denied by other state agencies. To obtain the most basic information, we have had to submit FOIA requests. As citizens of the Commonwealth, applicants to the state for funding originally approved for a "qualified charitable organization... whose primary purpose is the preservation of historical cemeteries and graves," and the de facto stewards of East End Cemetery since June 2013, we are entitled to fair, informed, and open consideration in this process.

We look forward to discussing this matter further with you.

Stephanie Williams and I have conferred regarding the questions posed in your email and we agree that there is no state law or DHR requirement "to secure permission of a cemetery owner to operate at that private cemetery." Rather, "Attachment D" in the application requests "written approval from the current owner of a proposed scope of work." In order to ensure this agency's responsible administration of this grant program, we have deemed it necessary to require non-property owners to submit proof that the property owner agrees with the kind and type of work a third party intends to perform.

Slave grave sites? No. Traditionally the GA only had the Confederate grave program. Basic underlying theory was that those graves were men who fought for Virginia and didn't qualify for federal military grave markers/cemeteries. Rev War has been added fairly recently. Slave graves are natural progression of expectations that we have included in LAS's since early 1990s, but that has still not passed.

GA grants to sites associated with formerly enslaved African Americans (not specific grave program) may have occurred as part of the general historic preservation grants that were stopped as a result of Cucinelli's "no grants to charities" AG opinion, but those would have been case-by-case, project specific, and I was not sufficiently involved in those grants to remember what individual grants were for.



After conferring with our state Archaeologist, I did find that just this past year DHR, through our Threatened Sites programs, did fund one slave project, the recovery of data from the Hairston Plantation in Pittsylvania County. Discovery TV had come in to film a show "Confederate Gold" and partially destroyed a well and a slaves' quarters storage pit. DHR funded a \$4,999 project to salvage the remnants of the pit. Information about our Threatened Sites program can be found on our website. www.dhr.virginia.gov.

The only other project we know of was related to Jordan's Journey in Prince George County from 1989-1993 where several African-Americans were recovered. However, in the timeframe of occupation, the first half of the 17th century, they were not technically slaves. The amount of this project is unknown.

I do not know what session you are referring to with HB 1273. This past session, 2016, we did work with and support Delegate McQuinn's HB122. However, she failed to put in a budget amendment for the study, so although it passed out of the Rules Committee, it was left in Appropriations on those grounds alone. In the 2015 session, we worked with Delegate Bob Marshall on his HJ 542; however, his study experienced the same exact fate. We encouraged him to reintroduce the study in this year's 2016 session, but for reasons we do not know, he did not.

Slave grave sites? No. Traditionally the GA only had the Confederate grave program. Basic underlying theory was that those graves were men who fought for Virginia and didn't qualify for federal military grave markers/cemeteries. Rev War has been added fairly recently. Slave graves are natural progression of expectations that we have included in LAS's since early 1990s, but that has still not passed.

GA grants to sites associated with formerly enslaved African Americans (not specific grave program) may have occurred as part of the general historic preservation grants that were stopped as a result of

Cucinelli's "no grants to charities" AG opinion, but those would have been case-by-case, project specific, and I was not sufficiently involved in those grants to remember what individual grants were for.



The only other project we know of was related to Jordan's Journey in Prince George County from 1989-1993 where several African-Americans were recovered. However, in the timeframe of occupation, the first half of the 17th century, they were not technically slaves. The amount of this project is unknown.

I do not know what session you are referring to with HB 1273. This past session, 2016, we did work with and support Delegate McQuinn's HB122. However, she failed to put in a budget amendment for the study, so although it passed out of the Rules Committee, it was left in Appropriations on those grounds alone. In the 2015 session, we worked with Delegate Bob Marshall on his HJ 542; however, his study experienced the same exact fate. We encouraged him to reintroduce the study in this year's 2016 session, but for reasons we do not know, he did not.



Dear Ms. Williams:

The following is a summary of the research the Friends of East End Cemetery have compiled regarding the past and present ownership of the cemetery property as well as the corporate status of the former burial associations. Over the past several years we have gathered documentary records from the property record offices in the City of Richmond and the County of Henrico, court records at the Henrico County Circuit Court, and archival records of the State Corporation Commission (SCC) of Virginia. Enclosed you will find the property deeds for the grounds dating back to 1891 as well as the entire case file of the 1970 court case referenced below.

The founding East End Burial Association (which we will refer to as EEBA-1891) purchased the cemetery grounds in two parcels in 1897 and 1917. By 1959, EEBA-1891's founders and board members had died and the organization was legally defunct as a result of non-filing of required corporate papers with the SCC (see the 1970 case file regarding this revocation of corporate status).

Despite the legal termination of EEBA-1891 in 1959, burials continued through the 1960s. The burials that occurred during this time were technically not legal, as a legally defunct organization can no longer transact any business other than winding down its business—essentially, settling any debts it has, selling off or transferring any remaining assets (including real estate), and/or (if a 501c3) finding another similarly situated nonprofit to carry on its mission/business. If no person remains who is authorized to carry on the defunct organization's business, the organization's assets can be placed into receivership by court order. The receivership's duty is to carry out the wind-down process and assign any remaining assets to an appropriate entity (again, if a 501c3, another nonprofit with similar mission/goals would be appropriate).

When Interstate 64 was built in the mid-1960s and the new bridge over the interstate (from

Nine Mile Road) was put in, Henrico County wanted to extend the Stony Run road to East Richmond Road (there was no road there prior to about 1970, according to aerial photos). However, since EEBA-1891 was legally defunct and there were no living board members, there was no one left for the county to deal with.

At that time, three individuals (Irma R. Gee, Edna B. Singleton, and Otto L. Singleton) created a "new" nonprofit, also called East End Burial Association (which we will refer to as EEBA-1970), and filed suit in Henrico County court to place the cemetery and its assets (the 16-acre property and about \$15,000 in the bank) into receivership.

The court-appointed receiver awarded the assets (including title/ownership of the property) to EEBA-1970, which then legally continued ownership/operation of the cemetery. At some point in the 1970s or 1980s (by 1982), Earl Gray appears to have become one of the board members of EEBA-1970 (or was at least authorized to conduct business for EEBA-1970 as the registered agent). By 1993, Irma Gee, the last of the other EEBA-1970 board members passed away, leaving Mr. Gray as the apparent sole "owner" of the cemetery or authorized agent of EEBA-1970.

EEBA-1970 itself became legally defunct in 1987 when it was "purged" from the SCC system. According to the SCC, once an entity has been purged, "it is not eligible for reinstatement or restoration"—meaning that an entity cannot be reconstituted with its assets (the property, in the case of East End Cemetery) intact.

Enclosed you will find all of the supporting documentation referenced here. We have also enclosed the obituary for Mr. Gray from earlier this year. It is our understanding that there is now no living person associated with EEBA-1970 and therefore no legal owner of East End Cemetery. As we've written before, we would maintain that the status of the property as an abandoned asset last held by a qualified but now defunct charitable organization and our group's status as a 501(c)(3) constituted to preserve East End Cemetery meets the requirements established in HB 1547 for us to qualify for funding.

This is our understanding based on the documents in our possession. If DHR has additional documentation related to this matter, we would appreciate your sharing it with us.

Thank you for your reply to our application for HB 1547 funding to support our preservation efforts at East End Cemetery.

As you may be aware, the Friends of East End have been working with community support since June 2013 to reclaim and preserve the 16-acre cemetery. According to Henrico County property records, the grounds were last owned by the East End Burial Association, a nonprofit organization reincorporated in 1970 after its predecessor (of the same name, incorporated in 1897) became legally defunct in 1959.

According to the State Corporation Commission, the later incarnation of the East End Burial Association became legally defunct in 1987.

The property itself has been abandoned for roughly 30 years since the association ceased operations.

As part of our research efforts, the Friends of East End located and contacted the last surviving member of the East End Burial Association, Earl Gray, in early 2015 to confirm the legal status of the cemetery and to request access to burial records. Mr. Gray told us that the cemetery had gone into default. He was equivocal about burial records, telling our representative that he might have them, but never providing anything. (Relatives of the deceased also made inquiries and received similar replies.) Mr. Gray verbally granted permission to volunteers to continue restoration and preservation efforts. Mr. Gray passed away earlier this year without providing any further information about the former burial association that we know of.

It is the understanding of the Friends of East End that the cemetery currently has no legal

owner. We would maintain that the status of the property as an abandoned asset last held by a qualified (but now defunct) charitable organization and our group's status as a 501(c)(3) dedicated to the preservation of this particular cemetery meets the requirements established in the legislation to qualify for funding.

We welcome further information from your department on how to proceed and will gladly provide any additional documentation needed to facilitate our request.

The following is a summary of the research the Friends of East End Cemetery have compiled regarding the past and present ownership of the cemetery property as well as the corporate status of the former burial associations. Over the past several years we have gathered documentary records from the property record offices in the City of Richmond and the County of Henrico, court records at the Henrico County Circuit Court, and archival records of the State Corporation Commission (SCC) of Virginia. Enclosed you will find the property deeds for the grounds dating back to 1891 as well as the entire case file of the 1970 court case referenced below.

The founding East End Burial Association (which we will refer to as EEBA-1891) purchased the cemetery grounds in two parcels in 1897 and 1917. By 1959, EEBA-1891's founders and board members had died and the organization was legally defunct as a result of non-filing of required corporate papers with the SCC (see the 1970 case file regarding this revocation of corporate status).

Despite the legal termination of EEBA-1891 in 1959, burials continued through the 1960s. The burials that occurred during this time were technically not legal, as a legally defunct organization can no longer transact any business other than winding down its business—essentially, settling any debts it has, selling off or transferring any remaining assets (including real estate), and/or (if a 501c3) finding another similarly situated nonprofit to carry on its mission/business. If no person remains who is authorized to carry on the defunct organization's business, the organization's assets can be placed into receivership by court order. The receivership's duty is to carry out the wind-down process and assign any remaining assets to an appropriate entity (again, if a 501c3, another nonprofit with similar mission/goals would be appropriate).

When Interstate 64 was built in the mid-1960s and the new bridge over the interstate (from Nine Mile Road) was put in, Henrico County wanted to extend the Stony Run road to East Richmond Road (there was no road there prior to about 1970, according to aerial photos). However, since EEBA-1891 was legally defunct and there were no living board members, there was no one left for the county to deal with.

At that time, three individuals (Irma R. Gee, Edna B. Singleton, and Otto L. Singleton) created a "new" nonprofit, also called East End Burial Association (which we will refer to as EEBA-1970), and filed suit in Henrico County court to place the cemetery and its assets (the 16-acre property and about \$15,000 in the bank) into receivership.

The court-appointed receiver awarded the assets (including title/ownership of the property) to EEBA-1970, which then legally continued ownership/operation of the cemetery. At some point in the 1970s or 1980s (by 1982), Earl Gray appears to have become one of the board members of EEBA-1970 (or was at least authorized to conduct business for EEBA-1970 as the registered agent). By 1993, Irma Gee, the last of the other EEBA-1970 board members passed away, leaving Mr. Gray as the apparent sole "owner" of the cemetery or authorized agent of EEBA-1970.

EEBA-1970 itself became legally defunct in 1987 when it was "purged" from the SCC system. According to the SCC, once an entity has been purged, "it is not eligible for reinstatement or restoration"—meaning that an entity cannot be reconstituted with its assets (the property, in the case of East End Cemetery) intact.

Enclosed you will find all of the supporting documentation referenced here. We have also enclosed the obituary for Mr. Gray from earlier this year. It is our understanding that there is now no living person associated with EEBA-1970 and therefore no legal owner of East End Cemetery. As we've written before, we would maintain that the status of the property as an abandoned asset last held by a qualified but now defunct charitable organization and our group's status as a 501(c)(3) constituted to preserve East End Cemetery meets the requirements established in HB 1547 for us to qualify for funding.

This is our understanding based on the documents in our possession. If DHR has additional documentation related to this matter, we would appreciate your sharing it with us.

The following is a summary of the research the Friends of East End Cemetery have compiled regarding the past and present ownership of the cemetery property as well as the corporate status of the former burial associations. Over the past several years we have gathered documentary records from the property record offices in the City of Richmond and the County of Henrico, court records at the Henrico County Circuit Court, and archival records of the State Corporation Commission (SCC) of Virginia. Enclosed you will find the property deeds for the grounds dating back to 1891 as well as the entire case file of the 1970 court case referenced below.

The founding East End Burial Association (which we will refer to as EEBA-1891) purchased the cemetery grounds in two parcels in 1897 and 1917. By 1959, EEBA-1891's founders and board members had died and the organization was legally defunct as a result of non-filing of required corporate papers with the SCC (see the 1970 case file regarding this revocation of corporate status).

Despite the legal termination of EEBA-1891 in 1959, burials continued through the 1960s. The burials that occurred during this time were technically not legal, as a legally defunct organization can no longer transact any business other than winding down its business—essentially, settling any debts it has, selling off or transferring any remaining assets (including

real estate), and/or (if a 501c3) finding another similarly situated nonprofit to carry on its mission/business. If no person remains who is authorized to carry on the defunct organization's business, the organization's assets can be placed into receivership by court order. The receivership's duty is to carry out the wind-down process and assign any remaining assets to an appropriate entity (again, if a 501c3, another nonprofit with similar mission/goals would be appropriate).

When Interstate 64 was built in the mid-1960s and the new bridge over the interstate (from Nine Mile Road) was put in, Henrico County wanted to extend the Stony Run road to East Richmond Road (there was no road there prior to about 1970, according to aerial photos). However, since EEBA-1891 was legally defunct and there were no living board members, there was no one left for the county to deal with.

At that time, three individuals (Irma R. Gee, Edna B. Singleton, and Otto L. Singleton) created a "new" nonprofit, also called East End Burial Association (which we will refer to as EEBA-1970), and filed suit in Henrico County court to place the cemetery and its assets (the 16-acre property and about \$15,000 in the bank) into receivership.

The court-appointed receiver awarded the assets (including title/ownership of the property) to EEBA-1970, which then legally continued ownership/operation of the cemetery. At some point in the 1970s or 1980s (by 1982), Earl Gray appears to have become one of the board members of EEBA-1970 (or was at least authorized to conduct business for EEBA-1970 as the registered agent). By 1993, Irma Gee, the last of the other EEBA-1970 board members passed away, leaving Mr. Gray as the apparent sole "owner" of the cemetery or authorized agent of EEBA-1970.

EEBA-1970 itself became legally defunct in 1987 when it was "purged" from the SCC system. According to the SCC, once an entity has been purged, "it is not eligible for reinstatement or restoration"—meaning that an entity cannot be reconstituted with its assets (the property, in the case of East End Cemetery) intact.

Enclosed you will find all of the supporting documentation referenced here. We have also enclosed the obituary for Mr. Gray from earlier this year. It is our understanding that there is now no living person associated with EEBA-1970 and therefore no legal owner of East End Cemetery. As we've written before, we would maintain that the status of the property as an abandoned asset last held by a qualified but now defunct charitable organization and our group's status as a 501(c)(3) constituted to preserve East End Cemetery meets the requirements established in HB 1547 for us to qualify for funding.

This is our understanding based on the documents in our possession. If DHR has additional documentation related to this matter, we would appreciate your sharing it with us.



The following is a summary of the research the Friends of East End Cemetery have compiled regarding the past and present ownership of the cemetery property as well as the corporate status of the former burial associations. Over the past several years we have gathered documentary records from the property record offices in the City of Richmond and the County of Henrico, court records at the Henrico County Circuit Court, and archival records of the State Corporation Commission (SCC) of Virginia. Enclosed you will find the property deeds for the grounds dating back to 1891 as well as the entire case file of the 1970 court case referenced below.

The founding East End Burial Association (which we will refer to as EEBA-1891) purchased the cemetery grounds in two parcels in 1897 and 1917. By 1959, EEBA-1891's founders and board members had died and the organization was legally defunct as a result of non-filing of required corporate papers with the SCC (see the 1970 case file regarding this revocation of corporate status).

Despite the legal termination of EEBA-1891 in 1959, burials continued through the 1960s. The burials that occurred during this time were technically not legal, as a legally defunct organization can no longer transact any business other than winding down its business—essentially, settling any debts it has, selling off or transferring any remaining assets (including real estate), and/or (if a 501c3) finding another similarly situated nonprofit to carry on its mission/business. If no person remains who is authorized to carry on the defunct organization's business, the organization's assets can be placed into receivership by court order. The receivership's duty is to carry out the wind-down process and assign any remaining assets to an appropriate entity (again, if a 501c3, another nonprofit with similar mission/goals would be appropriate).

When Interstate 64 was built in the mid-1960s and the new bridge over the interstate (from Nine Mile Road) was put in, Henrico County wanted to extend the Stony Run road to East Richmond Road (there was no road there prior to about 1970, according to aerial photos).

However, since EEBA-1891 was legally defunct and there were no living board members, there was no one left for the county to deal with.

At that time, three individuals (Irma R. Gee, Edna B. Singleton, and Otto L. Singleton) created a "new" nonprofit, also called East End Burial Association (which we will refer to as EEBA-1970), and filed suit in Henrico County court to place the cemetery and its assets (the 16-acre property and about \$15,000 in the bank) into receivership.

The court-appointed receiver awarded the assets (including title/ownership of the property) to EEBA-1970, which then legally continued ownership/operation of the cemetery. At some point in the 1970s or 1980s (by 1982), Earl Gray appears to have become one of the board members of EEBA-1970 (or was at least authorized to conduct business for EEBA-1970 as the registered agent). By 1993, Irma Gee, the last of the other EEBA-1970 board members passed away, leaving Mr. Gray as the apparent sole "owner" of the cemetery or authorized agent of EEBA-1970.

EEBA-1970 itself became legally defunct in 1987 when it was "purged" from the SCC system. According to the SCC, once an entity has been purged, "it is not eligible for reinstatement or restoration"—meaning that an entity cannot be reconstituted with its assets (the property, in the case of East End Cemetery) intact.

Enclosed you will find all of the supporting documentation referenced here. We have also enclosed the obituary for Mr. Gray from earlier this year. It is our understanding that there is now no living person associated with EEBA-1970 and therefore no legal owner of East End Cemetery. As we've written before, we would maintain that the status of the property as an abandoned asset last held by a qualified but now defunct charitable organization and our group's status as a 501(c)(3) constituted to preserve East End Cemetery meets the requirements established in HB 1547 for us to qualify for funding.

This is our understanding based on the documents in our possession. If DHR has additional documentation related to this matter, we would appreciate your sharing it with us.

Thank you for your reply to our application for HB 1547 funding to support our preservation efforts at East End Cemetery.

As you may be aware, the Friends of East End have been working with community support since June 2013 to reclaim and preserve the 16-acre cemetery. According to Henrico County property records, the grounds were last owned by the East End Burial Association, a nonprofit organization reincorporated in 1970 after its predecessor (of the same name, incorporated in 1897) became legally defunct in 1959.

According to the State Corporation Commission, the later incarnation of the East End Burial Association became legally defunct in 1987.

The property itself has been abandoned for roughly 30 years since the association ceased operations.

As part of our research efforts, the Friends of East End located and contacted the last surviving member of the East End Burial Association, Earl Gray, in early 2015 to confirm the legal status of the cemetery and to request access to burial records. Mr. Gray told us that the cemetery had gone into default. He was equivocal about burial records, telling our representative that he might have them, but never providing anything. (Relatives of the deceased also made inquiries and received similar replies.) Mr. Gray verbally granted permission to volunteers to continue restoration and preservation efforts. 



Good morning, Ms. Langan and Ms. Williams.

This provision, which you point out is not a law but a requirement imposed by DHR, has given Parity LLC veto power over any other organization applying for such funding. The effect is to give Parity LLC exclusive claim to taxpayer dollars.

DHR's rule has granted Parity LLC/Enrichmond, as owner AND applicant for these funds, the power to eliminate any and all competition for these funds, regardless of the qualifications of that applying organization. This is precisely what Parity did with the Friends of East End.

My position is that this rule cedes governmental power to a single nongovernmental entity. This is undemocratic and profoundly unfair.

I too look forward to working together with the owner of the cemeteries—as well as the state organization's that subsidized and enabled Parity/Enrichmond's acquisitions of the cemeteries—but under a new regime that is transparent, has adequate state oversight, and is fair to the grassroots groups that have done the work of cemetery reclamation. We are not there yet.

Thank you for responding to our email and for your kind comments about our accomplishments at East End Cemetery.

We note the explanation that "staff at DHR are under advice of OAG counsel not to disburse funds for work at cemeteries where there are questions regarding ownership, as is the case with East End Cemetery." We will direct our questions regarding disbursement to Attorney General Mark Herring, whose office is cc'd here.

This leaves a fundamental matter unaddressed in DHR's reply: As a qualified applicant under the procedures you specified in 2017, what steps, if any, must FoEE take to update our application for 10.1-2211.2 funds under DHR's new process and guidelines?

We see this an urgent matter because funds for East End have already been allocated. Moreover, under alterations made to 10.1-2211.2 in 2018, Enrichmond, which has played little role in the actual restoration of the cemetery, is now eligible to receive these funds.

We do not say there is bias on the part of DHR. Rather, we see a lack of transparency to this process that is concerning, and that we believe has rendered it problematic and potentially unfair to all applicants. This is why we seek clarity from DHR.

It is DHR's understanding that East End Cemetery is being acquired by the EnRichmond Foundation and that they will apply for the funds once that is official. As for the African American Burial Ground for the Enslaved at Belmont, the only thing I know is that according to a newspaper article it is owned by the Loudoun Freedom Foundation. If they qualify under the legislation, they could apply, and I suppose that Loudoun could also apply for the funds. These funds are reverting, so what is not disbursed in a fiscal year is returned to the General Fund.

Deputy Director Williams:

In August 2017, the Friends of East End Cemetery (FoEE) submitted our application to the Department of Historic Resources (DHR) for the funds that would be made available for restoration efforts at East End Cemetery through the Historical African American Cemetery and Graves provision of the Code of Virginia.

We followed the procedure that DHR outlined: provide proof of FoEE's 501(c)(3) status and registration with the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS).

After we submitted a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request in April 2018, DHR informed us in its reply that it had not finalized the application process or finished creating procedures and regulations to evaluate grant requests and make awards. Although we applied for these funds under the standing procedures, we were never notified by DHR that a full application process had been put in place.

We learned through a DHR reply to a March 2019 FOIA that funds for cemetery care and maintenance have been released to other qualified organizations during the past year. Also, we have learned that the initial year's funds for East End Cemetery have been allocated by the legislature, although DHR has not released them to date. We understand further that these funds will be disbursed after the Enrichmond Foundation acquires East End Cemetery.

Again, as applicants under DHR's original process, we ask DHR to clarify our status and not to release any funding for East End Cemetery restoration until FoEE has been allowed to participate in the new application process. Further, if any award has been made or is pending for East End Cemetery restoration funds, we request that this process be frozen.

Please provide us with the appropriate materials so that we may apply for the funding through a fair and transparent process.

As we have documented, FoEE is qualified to receive these funds because it is a certified "charitable corporation . . . that has been granted tax-exempt status under § 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and whose primary purpose is the preservation of historical cemeteries and graves" as specified in § 10.1-2211.2 of the Code of Virginia as modified by HB 1547 (2017) and HB 284 (2018) relating to historic African American cemeteries. In addition, FoEE is a registered charity with VDACS, as we have noted.

DHR previously contacted us about the ownership of East End Cemetery and the

need for the owner's approval to be granted funds. We provided detailed information on the cemetery's ownership from 1897 through 2017. Nowhere in these bills can we find any reference to having the permission of a cemetery's owner being a qualification for receiving these funds. Please clarify the source of this requirement.

Since June 2013, thousands of volunteers coordinated by FoEE have cleared and documented roughly 6.5 acres and nearly 3,200 marked graves at East End Cemetery. We are the qualified nonprofit organization leading the restoration effort—both the physical and the historical reclamation of the cemetery. At the very least, FoEE's stewardship of East End Cemetery, our unbroken commitment to its protection and preservation, and our clear track record of accomplishments merit serious consideration by DHR of our application.

Thank you for your attention to this matter. We look forward to your reply.

It's not far, so I'd be happy to visit it with them if they'd like. This would just give me a sense of if there are any on site issues causing the cracking. My guess is that it is just the concrete giving way. The break in the arm of the cross will be very susceptible to freeze-thaw damage where water gets in in the winter and it freezes and expands and widens the crack, then it thaws and can start the process all over again. I'm going to attach some contacts for them to the end of this email. I would really talk to Howard Wellman. He might be able to do something for the part that already broke off. He might also have some advice for the crack in the arm. I would guess that protecting this marker from the elements in some way is the best bet. I'm not sure if they have the option of preserving it indoors and putting out a replica. On the plus side, there doesn't seem to be any sign of iron on the interior which is a good thing for it's future preservation. Let me know if they have any other questions or if I can help in any other way!

Hi Brian -

I think you're referring to Article 3, Chapter 57 (attached), most enacted 1919 or thereabouts - the pertinent section appears to be 57-32, but the verbiage is "may" rather than "shall", which indicates to me that this statute allows for but does not mandate. It would be worth your time/expense to have an attorney chase this down, though. Virginia Code is a notoriously shaggy thing, and there may be case law that is more pertinent to this question. My feeling is that black cemeteries were not so much exempted as ignored.

I've also attached a copy of Section 54.1 -- speaks to the prohibition against selling a plot, etc. billed as "perpetual care" in the absence of adequate provision for such. It was passed in 1998, and I'm sure all kinds of bad behavior went on for decades before anyone thought about legislating against it.

Big gap between the two... I can't find any continuity there, or much of anything predating the 1990s that specifically references perpetual care. Again, it may be more useful to chase down case law.

Sorry I couldn't be of more help!

After the Civil War, the tracks were rebuilt and the village of Bumpass grew into a thriving community, boasting a school, post office, three mercantile stores, undertaker, and a lumber mill. The area's Chicken Coop Co., Grasberger Spoon Co., and barrel stave factory shipped goods all over the United States. Sharon Christian and St. Thomas Baptist Churches (both still active) were built within walking distance of the village.

1. Bristol VDOT District; Grayson County

First Court of Grayson County UE-5

Near here, in the barn of William Bourne, was held the first court of this county, May 21, 1793.

First Court of Grayson County UE-5

Grayson County was formed from Wythe County in 1792 at the request of settlers near the New River, who could not easily reach the county seat at present-day Wytheville. The first court of Grayson County was held near here at the farm of William Bourne on 21 May 1793. The county erected its first courthouse ca. 1794 at present-day Old Town, 10 miles southeast of here. Grayson County later shifted its seat westward to present-day Independence, where the court began meeting in 1851.

Providence Church V-19

Half a mile northeast stands Providence Presbyterian church, built probably in 1749 and little altered since. John Todd, Senior, a founder of Hampden-Sydney College, was pastor for forty years (1753-1793). Hanover Presbytery met there in October, 1762.

Providence Church V-19

Providence Church, ca. 1747, was among the earliest Presbyterian churches built in Virginia. Its first minister was Samuel Davies, the eloquent New Side preacher who led the Hanover Presbytery and later became president of the College of New Jersey (now Princeton University). John Todd, pastor from 1752 to 1793, established a classical school at his nearby house and was an original trustee of Hampden-Sydney College. George Whitefield, the evangelical itinerant who helped spark the Great Awakening, preached here in 1755. Providence is one of the few remaining wood-frame colonial churches in Virginia.

Towne Fields WY-7

This site, two and a half miles west, was the first seat of local government on the Eastern Shore. Francis Bolton preached there in 1623, and the first church was built before 1632. The oldest

continuous county records in the English Colonies began there in 1632. The first courthouse (built for that purpose) on the Eastern Shore was erected in 1664 and used until Court moved to the Eastville area in 1677.

Town Fields WY-7

About two miles west was Town Fields, the first seat of local government on Virginia's Eastern Shore. English tenants settled there in 1620 after the Virginia Company of London set aside 500 acres to be used as a source of income for the Secretary of the Colony. In 1632 a commission was appointed to oversee the colony's Eastern Shore settlements. The commission began holding court at Town Fields later that year, and its minutes are the genesis of the oldest continuous court records in the United States. Northampton County built its first courthouse at Town Fields in 1664. The county seat moved to present-day Eastville in 1677.

Lynchburg Defenses R-4

During the Civil War, a line of trenches and fortified artillery positions extending past here were built late in 1863 to defend Lynchburg against attack from the north. Brig. Gen. Francis T. Nicholls was responsible for ensuring that the local militia, invalids, and convalescents properly manned the fortifications. On 12 June 1864, Nicholls ordered the local militia and invalids into these lines to repel a possible advance by Federal cavalry commanded by Brig. Gen. Alfred Duffié, but the Federals altered their course to Lexington. Soon after, the Confederates moved into defense works south of the city to face Maj. Gen. David Hunter's assault on 17-18 June 1864.

Lynchburg Defenses R-4

Confederate earthworks and artillery positions, likely built by enslaved African Americans, were established near here late in 1863 to defend Lynchburg against attack from the north. On 12 June 1864, Confederate Brig. Gen. Francis T. Nicholls, commander of the post of Lynchburg, ordered local militia and convalescent soldiers into these works to repel a possible advance by Federal cavalry under Brig. Gen. Alfred Duffié, but the Federals turned away before reaching this point. Soon after, Nicholls's men moved into defensive works in Lynchburg. Reinforced by Lt. Gen. Jubal A. Early's corps, they helped repel Union Maj. Gen. David Hunter's assault from the southwest on 17-18 June.

Appomattox Court House Confederate Cemetery MG-1

Here were buried eighteen Confederate soldiers who died April 8 and 9, 1865 in the closing days of the War Between the States. The remains of one unknown Union soldier found some years after the war are interred beside the Confederate dead. About 500 yards east of this cemetery is the McLean House where Lee and Grant signed the surrender terms.

Appomattox Court House Confederate Cemetery MG-1

Union and Confederate forces engaged in combat near here on 8 and 9 April 1865, in the closing days of the Civil War. A number of Confederate soldiers who died during this campaign were buried outside formal cemeteries. Local women established the Ladies Memorial Association of Appomattox in May 1866 to provide a final resting place for these soldiers. Here, on land donated by John Sears, the bodies of 18 Confederates were reinterred on 1 Dec. 1866. The names of 10 of them are unknown. One unknown Union soldier is also buried here.

Female Collegiate Institute F-54

Two miles east is the site of the first college for women in Virginia, the Female Collegiate Institute. Opened in 1837, it failed in 1843. Reopened in 1848, it survived until 1863. The school building has been destroyed but the "President's Cottage" still stands.

Female Collegiate Institute F-54

About two miles east, along the Richmond-Lynchburg stage road, is the site of the Female Collegiate Institute, the first college for women chartered in Virginia. Established in 1837, the college offered a rigorous curriculum including courses in rhetoric, moral philosophy, chemistry, mathematics, Greek, and Latin. Much of its leadership and support came from Methodist clergymen. The Institute closed in 1843 and was reopened in 1849. After closing permanently in 1863, it housed residents of northern Virginia displaced during the Civil War. The main building was demolished in 1906.

March to Appomattox F-59

Part of Lee's army passed here retreating westward, April 8, 1865. The Sixth (Wright's) Corps of Grant's army passed here, in pursuit, in the afternoon of the same day, moving on toward Appomattox.

March to Appomattox F-59

Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee's surplus artillery and wagon trains, under Brig. Gen. Reuben Lindsay Walker, passed here on the night of 7 April 1865, retreating westward along the Buckingham Plank Road. Lee, traveling with Lt. Gen. James Longstreet's combined First and Third Corps, followed the next day. The Federal Sixth Corps under Maj. Gen. Horatio G. Wright was in close pursuit. The columns proceeded through the small village of New Store, about five miles west of here. On 9 April, at Appomattox Court House, Lee surrendered the Army of Northern Virginia to Lt. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant.

Henry and Randolph's Debate FR-10

Here, in March 1799, took place the noted debate between Patrick Henry and John Randolph of Roanoke on the question of States' Rights. Henry denied the right of a state to oppose oppressive Federal laws. Randolph affirmed that right. This was Henry's last speech and Randolph's first. Henry died three months later.

Henry and Randolph FR-10

Early in 1799, at the urging of George Washington, Patrick Henry emerged from retirement to run for Charlotte County's seat in the Virginia House of Delegates. He gave a speech here in March in front of a large crowd. Although Henry had opposed the ratification of the U.S. Constitution in 1788 because he feared a strong federal government, he now warned that states must not undermine federal law. John Randolph of Roanoke, a candidate for the U.S. House of Representatives, rose to defend states' rights. This was Henry's last public speech and Randolph's first. Each man won his election. Henry died three months later.

Edgehill FR-6

Three miles north is Edgehill, home of Clement Carrington. He ran away from Hampden-Sydney College to join the Revolutionary army, served in Lee's Legion, 1780-81, and was wounded at Eutaw Springs, September 8, 1781.

Edgehill FR-6

Three miles north is the site of Edgehill, built ca. 1810 for Clement Carrington (1762-1847). During the Revolutionary War, Carrington left his studies at Hampden-Sydney College, served under Lt. Col. Henry "Light-Horse Harry" Lee, and was wounded at the Battle of Eutaw Springs in South Carolina on 8 Sept. 1781. Carrington owned several plantations and many enslaved African Americans. Historian Hugh Blair Grigsby, Carrington's son-in-law, lived at Edgehill after Carrington's death. Grigsby was president of the Virginia Historical Society and chancellor of the College of William and Mary. Edgehill burned in the 1930s.

William H. Crawford RA-6

William Harris Crawford was born in this vicinity, February 24, 1772. Early in life he was taken to Georgia and became a leading politician of the era. He was United States Senator; Minister to France; Secretary of War and of the Treasury; candidate, 1824, for the Presidency, which was decided by the House of Representatives.

William H. Crawford (1772-1834) RA-6

William Harris Crawford was born in this vicinity on 24 Feb. 1772 and moved with his family to Georgia during his childhood. He studied law, served in the state legislature, and in 1807 was elected to the U.S. Senate, where he championed the Bank of the United States and supported the War of 1812. Pres. James Madison appointed Crawford minister to France in 1813, secretary of war in 1815, and secretary of the treasury in 1816, a post he held for eight years under Pres. James Monroe. He reorganized the treasury and oversaw several major improvements to the federal infrastructure. Crawford was an unsuccessful candidate for U.S. president in 1824.

Second Battle of Manassas C-27

The center of Lee's army rested here on August 30, 1862; Jackson was to the north of this road, Longstreet to the south. Late in the afternoon, after Jackson had repulsed Pope's assaults, Longstreet moved eastward, driving the Union forces facing him toward Henry Hill. Jackson advanced southward at the same time.

Second Battle of Manassas C-27

East of here, near Groveton, Confederates under Maj. Gen. Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson engaged Union troops under Maj. Gen. John Pope on the evening of 28 Aug. 1862, beginning the Second Battle of Manassas. The following day, Pope repeatedly attacked Jackson's position but was repulsed. On 30 Aug. the battle concluded when Pope's Fifth Corps was routed at Deep Cut and Confederate Maj. Gen. James Longstreet's corps launched a furious counterattack, sweeping the Union forces eastward toward Centreville. The battle resulted in more than 22,000 total casualties.

Dahlgren's Raid SA-14

Here Colonel Ulric Dahlgren, Union cavalryman, coming from the north, turned east. Dahlgren, who acted in concert with Kilpatrick, left Stevensburg, Culpeper County, on February 28, 1864, and moved toward the James River, tearing up the Virginia Central Railroad near Frederick's Hall. He went on toward Richmond, burning mills and barns.

Dahlgren's Raid SA-14

Union Col. Ulric Dahlgren and his cavalry left Culpeper County on 28 Feb. 1864 and rode toward Richmond in a raid designed by Brig. Gen. H. Judson Kilpatrick to free Federal prisoners of war. Here on the morning of 1 March, Dahlgren's troops turned east and moved down the James River, burning mills and barns in their path. A number of enslaved African Americans left with the Federal column. Repulsed five miles from Capitol Square, Dahlgren headed north and east of Richmond in search of Kilpatrick and was killed on the night of 2 March in King and Queen County.

Scotchtown W-214

A mile north is Scotchtown, Patrick Henry's home, 1771-1777. Dolly Madison, President James Madison's wife, lived here in her girlhood. Lafayette was here in May, 1781, retreating northward before Cornwallis. Cornwallis passed here in June, 1781, moving westward.

Scotchtown W-214

Scotchtown, about a mile north of here, was built ca. 1719 for Charles Chiswell, a land speculator and iron mine owner. Patrick Henry bought the property by 1771 and lived there until he sold it in 1778. During these years he represented Virginia at the First and Second Continental Congresses, delivered his "Liberty or Death" speech in Richmond in March 1775, and served for six months as commander in chief of the Virginia militia. He also helped write the Virginia Constitution and Declaration of Rights and was elected the first governor of the independent Commonwealth of Virginia. Henry's first wife, Sarah, died at Scotchtown in 1775.

Craig's Mill SN-45

Two miles south of Kenbridge stood Craig's Mill on Flat Rock Creek. There flour was ground and supplies were stored for the Revolutionary army. Tarleton, the British cavalryman, burned the mill in July, 1781, when raiding through the Southside. Rev. James Craig, the owner, is said to have been forced to help kill hogs for the troopers.

Craig's Mill SN-45

Two miles southwest of Kenbridge stood Craig's Mill on Flat Rock Creek. The Rev. James Craig, minister of Cumberland Parish and proponent of American independence, purchased the property in 1775 and built a complex that included a fulling and grist mill, grain storehouse, cloth-finishing shop, and blacksmith's shop. In July 1781 the mill was serving as an American supply depot when British Lt. Col. Banastre Tarleton raided Southside Virginia. Tarleton's cavalry burned Craig's milling establishment, destroyed his crops and livestock, and held him prisoner while searching for arms at his nearby home, the Glebe of Cumberland Parish.

Cloverdale Furnace AK-82

Here was situated Cloverdale Furnace, an early iron industry, developed by Carter Beverly, in 1808.

Cloverdale Furnace AK-82

Robert Harvey established an agricultural and industrial complex here about 1790 that processed iron ore. The operation, known as Cloverdale Furnace, expanded in the 19th century under the ownership of John Tayloe III. About 150 enslaved African Americans worked here, many in highly skilled positions. A second Cloverdale Furnace, built eight miles northeast of here in the 1840s, was also largely operated by enslaved workers. The furnace supplied high-quality gun metal to the Tredegar ironworks in Richmond during the 1840s and 1850s, but production lagged during the Civil War. Union Brig. Gen. William W. Averell's cavalry burned Cloverdale in June 1864.

Virginia Inventors A-51

A mile and a half northwest, Cyrus H. McCormick perfected, in 1831, the grain reaper. In that vicinity, in 1856, J. A. E. Gibbs devised the chainstitch sewing machine.

Virginia Inventors A-51

At Walnut Grove farm, about a mile northwest of here, Cyrus H. McCormick and Jo Anderson, an enslaved African American, developed a mechanical grain reaper by 1831. McCormick later built a factory in Chicago and, using innovative marketing techniques, far outsold other manufacturers. The reaper revolutionized agricultural efficiency. James E. A. Gibbs, who patented a number of improvements to the sewing machine, was born near here in 1829. His company, Willcox and Gibbs, became a leading producer of commercial sewing machines late in the 19th century.

Sevier's Birthplace A-34

Near here was born John Sevier, pioneer and soldier, September 23, 1745. He was a leader in the Indian wars and at the battle of King's Mountain, 1780. He was the only governor of the short-lived state of Franklin and the first governor of Tennessee. Sevier died in Georgia, September 24, 1815.

Sevier's Birthplace A-34

John Sevier, frontiersman, was born near here on 23 Sept. 1745. By 1773 he and his family had moved to western North Carolina (present-day Tennessee), where he fought against the Cherokee and engaged in land speculation. As a lieutenant colonel in the North Carolina militia, Sevier won fame for his role in defeating Loyalist forces at King's Mountain in 1780. After the Revolution he was governor of the breakaway state of Franklin, which never received official recognition. Elected Tennessee's first governor in 1796, he served for five additional terms before representing the state in the U.S. House of Representatives.



I do not recall having heard from anyone at Belmont either. According to a news article I read last session, it is owned by the Loudon Freedom Foundation.



Stephanie Williams and I have conferred regarding the questions posed in your email and we agree that there is no state law or DHR requirement "to secure permission of a cemetery owner to operate at that private cemetery." Rather, "Attachment D" in the application requests "written approval from the current owner of a proposed scope of work." In order to ensure this agency's responsible administration of this grant program, we have deemed it necessary to require non-property owners to submit proof that the property owner agrees with the kind and type of work a third party intends to perform.

With another round of funding available after July 1, I remain hopeful that the FOEE and enRichmond find a mutually agreeable way to work together.

Preparing a PIF

A PIF consists of three equally important parts:

1. **Form:** Complete the attached form to the best of your ability, using your own research about the property to be evaluated as well as any information that DHR has provided. Your PIF will not be evaluated if it is missing any of the following information:

Evergreen Cemetery is located directly east of downtown Richmond, where the City borders Henrico County. The topography features plateaus with deep cut creek ravines. The 59 acre cemetery is adjacent to Oakwood Cemetery on the west; East End Cemetery, immediately to the north; and is also adjacent to areas that are referred to as the Pauper's Cemetery. Evergreen Cemetery is accessed from Evergreen Road on the north, extending from Nine Mile Road. Evergreen Road passes through East End Cemetery. Evergreen is marked by a gate, two brick piers that both display panels showing the name "Evergreen Cemetery." The entrance area consists of an open field (with burials) edged by a circular road network. This field area is referred to as the "new" cemetery. The older historic section, dating to the pre-WWII era, is on the west side of the property, forming a bluff, edged by a hill that drops to Stony Run, the western border of the property. Most of the western and southern sections of the property are heavily wooded.

Evergreen Cemetery is 59.2 acres and is comprised mostly of wooded area. The "new" Evergreen cemetery, known as Metropolitan Memorial Park when the owners updated the design, is an open field surrounded by a circular drive. It is somewhat overgrown with high grass, but there are no large trees. The open field features modest sized headstones, and some metal tag markers. The field area is approximately one eighth of the cemetery. The original James T. Redd and Sons plan shows a moderately regular gridded area with several wider east-west vehicle roads subordinated smaller roads and paths that run north-south and east-west. At the center of the cemetery there are some triangular block and a curvilinear street. That one curved lot is where the Walker family is buried, including Maggie Walker. The prominent Mitchell and Farrar families are also buried close by. When the landscape was open, this was a bluff with a southern and western view towards Fulton, Church Hill and downtown Richmond.

Many of the older family plots are edged in concrete curbing, some include iron work, bars and chains, and some show traditional African American funerary decoration, such as the use of tiles; conch shells, and Yucca plantings. There is at least one mausoleum structure, one that is within 50 yards south of the Walker family burial area.

Not all burials are marked: some may have never been marked, some have lost their markers or headstones. The Find A Grave website lists 8,480 recorded interments. The headstones range in style from simple sparsely marked stone markers to the more elaborate carved works, such as the large cross for Maggie Walker or the carved shrouded angel for John Mitchell. Some markers are simple metal tags on stands. Overall, the wester area, the older section, of the cemetery is heavily overgrow with trees, vines and kudzu. Recent efforts to clear the cemetery have kept the central section open and some of the subordinated smaller roads towards the north, a flatter section of landscape, are open. The majority of the burial plots, headstones, ornamental curbing is obscured by the dense vegetation.

The oldest known documented burial ground for Richmond's African American community is in Shockoe Valley, near Broad Street and old 15th Street, the area that is close to Interstate 95 and the network of railroad tracks that lead to Main Street Station. This burial ground may dates to the mid-18th century.

The register-listed Barton Heights cemetery located on a sloping hillside overlooking Bacon's Quarter Branch Valley, consists of six contiguous burial grounds that African American churches and fraternal organizations established beginning in 1815. The six cemeteries are Cedarwood (originally Phoenix Cemetery), Union Mechanics (formerly Union Burial Ground), Methodist, Ebenezer, Sons and Daughters of Ham, and Sycamore. Together they are important reflections of what African Americans achieved in establishing cemeteries for their own. Burial societies helped establish the cemeteries offering death benefits, the most basic of insurance. These burial societies were the precursors of the benevolent organizations and fraternal orders and the black insurance companies of the later 19th and early 20th centuries. The Barton Heights Cemeteries are the final resting place of prominent African Americans in the city. [NPS Itinerary]

Further to the north and to the east, more African American cemeteries developed from the mid nineteeth into the early twentieth century. These include Woodland Cemetery (Henrico County), East End Cemetery (Henrico County), Pauper's Cemetery (City of Richmond and Henrico County) and Evergreen Cemetery (City of Richmond). Oakwood Cemetery (white burials) lies just south of the East End and Evergreen cemeteries.

The land in which Oakwood, Evergreen, East End and Pauper's cemeteries sits on today was part of a 333 acre patent issued on April 27, 1686 to Samuel Bridgewater (1637-1704) that ran between Stony Run and Gillie Creeks and up to current Nine Mile Road. Around 1669, Samuel likely would have owned a small amount of land near Gillie (Gilly) Creek. A year later he acquired another 404 acres in what is now the Fulton area. Both grants to expand on his property were in exchange for Samuel's paying the passage for immigrants to the Virginia colony at 50 acres per sponsored person. The intent was to plant tobacco and wheat. Unfortunately, the land in Henrico County was not conducive to crops. The landscape was undulating with steep ravines, groves of trees, and mixed quality soil, which produced either high yield low quality crops, or unprofitable high quality with low yields. This was true despite the fact his neighbor John Rolf (Pocahontas) planted the first tobacco crops in Virginia 80-years earlier at Varina Plantation. At that time Henrico was also called Varina Parish. Samuel and his wife Frances were no strangers to colonial courts. He was dealing extensively with William Paggen & Co., of London, and ran up a debt of 8,542 pounds of tobacco. In 1688 he mortgaged 400 acres and personal property to John Pleasants, Paggen's consignee, to satisfy the debt. The note was finally satisfied after Samuel's death, when, in 1708, his three sons bought back the deed being held in trust. Several changes in ownership as well as division of the land occurred, including a grant on February 5, 1798 to Reuben Smith Blakey (1758-1833) of what previously was known as the Thomas Calder farm. Calder left no heirs and Blakey, who was renting the land, purchased it and it became known as Blakey's Mill well into the 20th century. Joseph Anthony Starke was selling 200 acres he

acquired in 1842, with 120 acres cleared and wheat planted by Sept 1852, including a dwelling house 60x30 and out buildings to sell or trade. It was here during the Civil War that various artillery companies camped. In 1873, on the property's edge, one of the last formal gun duels in Virginia between Page McCarty and John Brooke Mordecai took place. But by the mid-1850s, much of this land had been spent and was then considered "Condemned Ground." The committee for cemeteries came across a need to take over "pieces of land in Henrico county, condemned some years since for a burying ground near the eastern limits of the city." This is how Oakwood Cemetery got its start. Oakwood is directly adjacent to Evergreen, East End and Pauper's cemeteries.

On August 24, 1891 the Evergreen Cemetery Association was founded and purchased the land once known as Lots 4 & 5 of the former Reuben Blakey property. They are seen on an 1849 survey map lying along a high ridge overlooking the valley formed by Stony Run. It was to be a cemetery for people of "color" who were discriminated against, and one section close to East Richmond Road was reserved for shunned Mulattos, Native Americans, and Asians. The view and landscape mimicked the beauty of Hollywood Cemetery and even featured stepped walkways and a decorative garden fountain now long gone. Evergreen became the final resting place for many of Richmond's leading African- American citizens, including Maggie Lena Walker, John Mitchell, Jr., Alfred D. Price, Col. Thomas W. Mitchell, William M. T. Forrester, and the Rev. Andrew Bowler. One of the cemetery founders was secretary Daniel Joseph Farrar Sr. (1862-1923) and a rare photograph of his grave (courtesy of the Swem Library at William & Mary College) gives a sense of how the landscape looked in the glory days. By 1899 Evergreen were already struggling and owed back taxes when William H. Kennon tried, unsuccessfully, a legal takeover of the cemetery. Land was added, most likely in 1902, to its current 59.2 acre size. Then owner Roderick Randal Beard (1875-1952) was seen to hold stockholder meetings advertised in the 1909 newspapers. He was still owner in 1947 when an outside investor named H. E. Hicks from Washington, DC became the new owner. Big plans were in the works promising modernization, perpetual care, and construction of new roads, which never materialized.

Sometime prior to 1964 Richmond City had possession of the proper ties per tax cards which, oddly, start in 1958 for these cemeteries. As with the East End Cemetery, perpetual care was not a provision within the charter and it wasn't long before the grounds started to be dotted with overgrowth, escalated in part due to Jim Crow laws and The Great Migration north. By the 1950s it was already an unmanageable dumping ground with some people abandoning their plots or disinterring loved ones to new locations. There was even a petition to remove Maggie Walker's grave, but the cost was prohibitive. Today nature has turned it into a virtual jungle. On January 15, 1970 - Metropolitan Memorial Services, Inc. (DB 662-C p 454) paid \$50,000 and came in with a whole different attitude. Immediately, they placed a newspaper ad stating that families could no longer maintain their own gravesites in the old sections but had to go through them. It depended on who you asked as to how the cemetery was run. When asked for the policies in writing, they refused. In a 1972 interview the major stockholder, Oley Burgess "O.B." Rust Jr. (1916-1975), who purchased Woodland and Evergreen said "What these people don't realize is that they don't own those gravesites; they just have burial rights there." "When we bought the cemeteries, we did not buy the obligations but the property." His company didn't want either of the older cemeteries but had to buy them as a package deal for the land it did want, which was an underdeveloped and cleared part of Evergreen. This section was named Metropolitan Memorial Park (today dubbed "new" Evergreen). At the time it was well maintained and under perpetual care but they soon went bankrupt. Claiming the cemetery was full by 1968, it is said that they began burying bodies under roads and paths or wherever they could find a spot. The Braxton mausoleum was mysteriously vandalized during this same time.

For the past 6-years, John G. Shuck has been volunteering his time organizing crews to help clear both Evergreen and East End. In 2014 he estimated that approximately 5% has been tackled with the help of numerous organizations and a few dedicated average citizens. Virginia Department of Historic Resources staff helped as part a public service day. Forest Ranger James "Jim" Bell, who worked at Evergreen years prior to Shuck, started a group in 2000 called the Virginia Foundation for the Preservation of Historic Black

Cemeteries. Shuck is part of Virginia Roots, Inc., a non-profit organization founded in 2010 by author of black history and researcher Veronica A. Davis in Hampton.

The cemetery restoration work is ongoing. John Shuck has established a Face Book page and there is a web site that coordinates donations and volunteer service.

African American Burial Societies

Burial societies helped establish the cemeteries offering death benefits, the most basic of insurance. These burial societies were the precursors of the benevolent organizations and fraternal orders and the black insurance companies of the later 19th and early 20th centuries.

In 2011, the Virginia Historic Resources Board, approved a Historic Highway Marker for Evergreen Cemetery, it reads:

In 1891, Evergreen Cemetery was established as a preeminent resting place for many of Virginia's most influential African-American residents. These include Maggie L. Walker, president and founder of the St. Luke Penny Savings Bank, and John Mitchell, Jr., champion of African-American rights and editor of the Richmond Planet newspaper. J.Henry Brown, a stonemason by trade, designed many of the tombstones erected here. By the early 1970s, the cemetery had fallen into disrepair. In 1975, volunteers from the Maggie L. Walker Historical Foundation led an effort to restore Evergreen to its original glory.

Research for many of the descriptions are the work of John Shuck and Nadia K. Orton, but there are also many family members who have contributed to the site.

Christopher "Chris" Baker: Unknown-1919. From the Richmond Times Dispatch Obituary: "Custodian of Medical College Morgue Dead - Chris Baker served at the Institution for the Past Seventy Years - Chris Baker, colored, former custodian of the dissecting room of the Medical College of Virginia, and holding the distinction of never having been farther from the building in which he lived than Memorial Hospital, died yesterday morning at 1:15 o'clock at the scene of his lifework."

John Andrew Bowler: 1862-1935. Reverend and Educator

Reverend Nelson Benjamin Brown: Unknown-1934.

Sergeant Edmond Carter: Unknown-1922. U.S. Colored Infantry.

Hinton Thomas Coleman: Unknown-1942. U.S. Army Private Quarter Master Corps (1912)

Frances Cooney: Unknown-1919. Memberships listed on headstone: Women Ideal Benf. Club No. 1, Lincoln Benf. Club No. 1, Helena Social Club No. 1, Sons & Dau's Star of Bethlehm No. 1, Four & Twenty Elders Mt. N. L. No. 5, Women Mesiah Club No. 2, Presd. Union No. 1, Sick & Distress Club No. 1

Arthur Hiawatha Edwards: 1897-1957. "Virginia SC2 USNRF World War I"

Daniel J. Farrar, Sr.: 1862-1923. According to African-American Architects: A Biographical Dictionary 1865-1946, Daniel J. Farrar, Sr. was involved with fourteen buildings in the 1890s as designer, builder, or both. He was the contractor on the now-demolished St. Luke Penny Savings Bank. There was an expansion of home ownership by blacks in the city of Richmond, VA following the Civil War, many constructed by Daniel and financed by his father, Joseph. Farrar was a member of many fraternal organizations including the Elks and Masons, and was Secretary of the Evergreen Cemetery Assn. He was a resident of the Jackson Ward community and lived at 610 North First Street. His funeral was held at Ebenezer Baptist Church. Built by Blacks (Richardson) reports that he is interred in the hilltop section of Evergreen Cemetery near the graves of Maggie Walker and John Mitchell, Jr.

William Manning T "W.M.T." Forrester: 1847-1910. Black leader who served as the Grand Master of the Grand United Order of Odd-Fellows in America (colored) for 35-years. Was also the secretary of the Independent Order of St. Luke before Maggie L. Walker took over. And was the founder of Greenwood Cemetery, the early incarnation of Evergreen Cemetery.

Private Daniel Gordon: Unknown-1898. Served 3 years in the 54th Regiment Massachusetts Infantry (Colored)

William H. Hankins: 1858-1902. "Captain 48 US VOL INF"

Wilfred Baker "Freddie Baker" Johnson: 1912-1945. "Virginia CPL 365 INF"

Dr. Joseph Endom Jones: 1852-1922.

1st Sergeant Josiah Jones: Unknown-1914. Battery B, 2nd Regiment, U.S. Colored L. Artillery

Dr. Marie Janie "Janie" Boyd Jones: 1869-1963: "Practiced medicine in Richmond from 1914 to 1962."

Dr. Miles Berkley Jones: 1862-1931. Physician.

Sarah Garland Boyd Jones: 1865-1905. Sarah Garland (Boyd) Jones was the first black person and first woman to be certified to practice medicine by the Virginia State Board of Medicine. She graduated in 1883 in a class of six from the Richmond Colored High and Normal School along with Maggie L. Walker and Wendell Dabney. Her father, George W. Boyd, was considered Richmond's premier black builder. (He built the Maggie L. Walker house which is a national historic site.) Sarah received her teaching diploma and was hired to teach at Baker Street School (built by her father). There she met Miles Berkley Jones who also was a teacher. Miles and Sarah were married at the Second Street Baptist Church in 1888.

Unable to teach after she married, Sarah decided to become a doctor. She moved to Washington, DC in 1890 to attend Howard Institute Medical College returning to Richmond, VA on weekends. In 1893 she finished her studies and moved back to Richmond, becoming the first black person to pass the medical exam by the Virginia Board of Medicine. Miles decided to become a doctor also and specialized in the treatment of ear, nose, and throat diseases. Sarah, Miles, and Dr. Oswald Barrington Bowser co-founded the Richmond Hospital aka Women's Central Hospital. It was a twenty-five bed facility that treated only black female patients, but was staffed by both black and white physicians. In 1901 the Board opened a training school for nurses within the hospital. It remained open until 1920.

On May 11, 1905 Sarah became ill and died suddenly at her home at 908 N. Third St. Her funeral was held at Second Baptist Church. She was eulogized by Dr. George Ben Johnston, cofounder of Johnston-Willis Hospital. Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery. At the time of her death, Jones was the only black woman in the commonwealth practicing medicine. She was a member of the Star of Bethlehem Fountain of True Reformers (Rosebud Chapter), and was a founding member of the Medical and Chirurgical Society.

In 1912 the hospital was incorporated and named the Sarah G. Jones Memorial Hospital in Sarah's honor. In 1932 the hospital moved to Overbrook Road near Virginia Union University and in 1945 the name was changed to Richmond Community Hospital.

Sarah was born in 1865 in Albemarle County, VA to George W. and Ellen Boyd. She had one sister, Marie Boyd. (Sources: Richmond Times Dispatch and Inspiring African American Women of Virginia (Veronica Davis).

Private Edward Mitchell: Unknown-1905. Served in the 54th Regiment Massachusetts Infantry. Enlisted in 1863.

Elizabeth Draper Mitchell: 1851-1922. Slave, Washer Woman, Domestic. Maggie Lena Walker's mother.

John Mitchell, Jr.: 1863-1929. Civil Rights Pioneer. Though born a slave he became one of the first Black newspaper editors in the United States, the first Black candidate for Governor of a southern state, and one of the first two Black bank presidents. The child of a family which remained as servants to their pre-Civil War master, Mitchell was educated in the same Richmond school system that produced Maggie Walker. After working as a teacher in the then-segregated schools he got his start in journalism by writing articles for the "New York Globe" then joined the staff of the "Richmond Planet", becoming its editor in December of 1884 and remaining in the job until his death. The demise of General Billy Mahone's Readjuster Party in the early 1880s paved the way for Jim Crow laws in Virginia and forced Mitchell to become an active reformer who was to crusade for better treatment of Blacks by the court system and for the end of lynching. Though wellknown as a defender of his fellow blacks he supported anybody he considered unfairly oppressed, on one occasion intervening to stop the execution of a mentally incompetent 15 year old white boy accused of rape. In 1895 he organized a six month boycott of the segregated Richmond streetcars that bankrupted the trolley company. A successful politician he represented Jackson Ward, then called the 'Black Wall Street', on the Richmond Board of Aldermen for several years begining in 1892 and also served as a delegate to at least two Republican National Conventions during the era when Republican leadership in the Old South was largely black; in 1902 Mitchell founded and chartered the Mechanics' Savings Bank and was later the first Black man to address the American Bankers' Association. Thru his bank he ran the quasi-secret Knights of Pythias until regulation changes forced the separation of financial institutions from fraternal societies and along the way became quite wealthy, even owning some white neighborhoods in which he was not allowed to live. In 1921 Mitchell ran an unsuccessful campaign as a Republican to be Governor of Virginia; financial scandals clouded his final years with his bank going under in 1923 and at his death after collapsing in his office he was buried in an unmarked grave next to that of his mother. Today the Library of Virginia houses a large collection of material on his life and career. In 2012, through the efforts of volunteers from the Richmond Black History Project, Mr. Mitchell's grave finally was marked with an appropriate headstone. Looking back at his struggles he once said: "The best remedy for a lyncher or a cursed midnight rider is a 16-shot Winchester rifle in the hands of a dead-shot Negro who has nerve enough to pull the trigger". (bio by: Bob Hufford)

Thomas William Mitchell: 1869-1900. He was the manager of the Richmond Planet and brother of the editor, John Mitchell."

George Mosby: Unknown-1938. "Virginia Pvt. [Co L] 811 Pioneer Inf." (World War I)

Dr Jeremiah Milton Newman: 1880-1956. Physician.

Ora Arneta Johnson Newman: 1894-1963. Assistant Principle of Maggie Walker High School/former professor at Howard University and Virginia Union University.

Charles Augustus Page: 1922-1946. "Virginia TEC. 5 4002 Trans. Corps. Truck Co. World War II"

Alfred Douglas Price: 1860-1921. Founder of the A.D. Price Funeral Home in Jackson Ward. Reinterred in Riverview Cemetery.

Violet E. Robinson: 1918-1945. Faculty George Mason School.

Robert C. Shelton: 1896-1962. "Virginia Private US Army World War I"

Dr Albert Alonzo Tennant: 1880-1938. Physician

Armstead Walker, Jr.: 1860-1915. Wed to Maggie Lena Walker. He was a building contractor. The successful husband of the famous Maggie Walker was shot to death on the back porch of his home by his son, Russell. The shooting was accidental. Russell mistook his father for a burglar for whom both were searching. The father and son had borrowed a handgun after being disturbed by suspected burglars. The next night when awakened again by sounds from the roof, the two went searching, armed. Nothing was found from the roof. Russell went back the way he came up. Armstead went the other way, to a second story back porch. When Russell came upon his father from the other direction, he mistook him for the burglar they had heard. He had no knowledge that his father had not followed him. Russell shot Armstead through the head, killing him instantly. A Richmond detective arrested Russell, due to a discrepancy in the account. Maggie Walker bailed him out. Russell was twenty-five at the time, his father, fifty-four. There was talk of some discord between the two, but Russell and his mother discredited that. The trial was sensational and contentious. A verdict of not guilty was reached. Russell buried his face in his hands and thanked God, while Maggie Walker wept for joy. The crowded courtroom was divided.

Maggie Lena Mitchell Walker: 1867-1934. Noted African American businesswoman, civil leader, newspaper founder, lecturer and the first African American woman bank president in the United States. Inspite of humble beginnings in post-Civil War Richmond, Virginia, Maggie Lena Walker became one of the most profoundly influential activists of her time in a wide range of local and national black organizations. Her business acumen, personality, and lifelong commitment to a beneficial burial society fueled her climb to success. She believed that Black American women had an instrumental part to play in the economic and political success of the Black American community. Walker won special renown as head of the Independent order of Saint Luke (founded in 1903), a society through which she created businesses that provided employment for African Americans, especially black women, in over twenty states. As a result, she became the first woman bank president in the United States. As a leader her successes and vision offered tangible improvements in the way of life for African Americans and women. Walker retired for health reasons in 1933 and died a year later. The bank survived the depression and remains solvent to this day as the oldest continually black-owned and black-run bank (St. Luke Bank and Trust Company) in the nation. In addition to her work for the Independent Order of Saint Luke, Walker was active in civic groups. Among them were the National Association of Colored Women (NACW) and the Virginia Interracial Commission. To assist race relations she helped to organize and served locally as vice president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and was a member of the NAACP board. (bio by: Curtis Jackson)

Russell Eccles Talmadge Walker: 1890-1923. The first child of Armstead and Maggie Walker. His birth was very difficult. The three doctors used forceps to the extant of causing damage. Russell was not expected to survive. His mother was bedridden for five months afterward. In June 1915 Russell Walker shot and killed his father after mistaking him for an intruder. He was arrested for murder and, after five months awaiting trial, was declared innocent. Russell Walker never recovered from the accident, however, and after eight years battling depression and alcoholism, he died on November 23, 1923.

Margaret Wallace: 1839-1911. Margaret Wallace was born in Virginia as a slave prior to the Civil War and lived c. 1839-1911. She appears to have lived most of her adult life in Richmond, VA. She first appears in the 1880 Census of Richmond, VA living at 709 North Fourth St., Richmond, Henrico, Virginia. She is listed in the 1880 census with her husband, James Wallace, age 30 – a driver, and she was 40 – a nurse, along with her daughter Nora Williams – one limb lost, age 20, her son-in-law Phil Williams – worked for the rail road, age 23 and (his?) sister Mary Williams, age 20, who also was a nurse.

In 1880, Margaret Wallace also appears in the Richmond Census as working as a nursemaid for the Richard Buffon Lee family who lived at 838 W. Grace St., Richmond, VA. Richard and Mary Jo Day Lee had two children: Ronald Currie Lee age 3 and Mary Day Lee age 1. Also living with them was Mary Jo Day's mother Mary Ann Hampton Day and her daughter (Mary Jo's sister) Elizabeth Jane Day (who eventually married Charles Winn.) At this time, Richard also employed a coachman, a cook, three servants and a nurse or nanny.

She next appears in 1900, age 61, working for the Pleasanton L. Conquest family in Richmond, Madison Ward, 110 Cherry St., Richmond City, Virginia as a nurse. She was widowed by this time.

In 1910, Margaret Wallace appears again, living and perhaps working at the boarding house owned by Charles W. Winn and his wife Elizabeth Jane Day Winn and their two daughters: Mary Day Winn and Elizabeth Jarvis Winn plus 13 boarders, and five staff including herself.

It is significant that both Mary Day Winn and Elizabeth Jarvis Winn chose to have a formal portrait of themselves taken with Margaret Wallace – clearly showing their respect and affection for her and her 30 year connection with the Lee/Day/Winn Families. In the photograph, she is 71 years old, wearing wire rimmed glasses, with her left eye askew or with a cataract.

Margaret Wallace died February 3, 1911 in Richmond and was buried at Evergreen Cemetery, Richmond City, Virginia in Plot: Section K. There is a touching inscription on her simple granite head stone which reads: Margaret Wallace died February 3, 1911 – "Erected by her white friends in loving memory of her faithfulness."

Good afternoon.

We received the April 2, 2019, reply from the Office of the Attorney General to our March 29 email. Thank you.

In this email, OAG states: "The Historical African American Cemetery & Graves Fund is solely administered by DHR. While this Office may provide legal advice to DHR, this Office has no discretion over whether to disburse funds, which organizations may receive those funds, or the process by which those decisions are made."

The Department of Historic Resources (DHR) informed us in a March 21, 2019, email (as well as a May 2018 email) that "staff at DHR are under advice of OAG counsel not to disburse funds for work at cemeteries where there are questions regarding ownership, as is the case with East End Cemetery."

We request that OAG clarify what agency/ies was/were responsible for the hold on disbursements so that we may determine the appropriate channels and methods through which to obtain full disclosure regarding the application process for funds under the Historical African American Cemeteries and Graves provision of the state code. We make the same request of DHR. (Ms. Williams: If you require us to make this request directly to DHR in a separate email, please let us know and we will do so.)

Further, so that we may gain clarity on this matter, we request that OAG provide to us

—or make public—any of its directives to DHR or other government entities regarding the Historical African American Cemeteries and Graves fund.

We understand that OAG may claim exceptions/exemptions for legal advice to state agencies under Virginia's FOIA law. We request public records that fall outside this category, particularly those that will explain the respective roles of state agencies in any stage of the process relating to the creation, oversight, or functioning of the fund.

We also reiterate our request to OAG to freeze the disbursement of restoration funds for East End Cemetery until all applicants, including the Friends, have had an opportunity to make their case in a clear, open, and fair process. To this end, we will update our application for the funding in the coming days, following the procedures instituted by DHR. We request that the state allow us to complete this process.

If such a freeze is beyond OAG's purview, we request your timely advice on how we may pursue such a freeze or injunction through our government organs. As applicants for the funds, we believe that it would be irresponsible and unfair for the state to disburse such funds until the public obtains answers to fundamental questions.

We look forward to discussing this matter further with you.

Thank you for contacting Attorney General Mark Herring and for writing to our Office regarding East End Cemetery and the Virginia Department of Historic Resources (DHR). The Attorney General is appreciative of your group, and others like it, that endeavor to restore and preserve the beauty and integrity of historically significant African American cemeteries, such as East End and Evergreen cemeteries.

The Historical African American Cemetery & Graves Fund is solely administered by DHR. While this Office may provide legal advice to DHR, this Office has no discretion over whether to disburse funds, which organizations may receive those funds, or the process by which those decisions are made. It is our understanding that as of April 1, 2019 the property in question was transferred to Enrichmond by the Circuit Court of Richmond City, which may affect the application and grant awarding process, so we recommend you continue to stay in close contact with DHR regarding your interest in the program.

Dear Attorney General Herring:

We, the Friends of East End Cemetery (FoEE), understand from a March 21, 2019, email that we received from the Department of Historic Resources (DHR) that "staff at DHR are under advice of OAG counsel not to disburse funds for work at cemeteries where there are questions regarding ownership, as is the case with East End Cemetery." This email was in response to a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request that FoEE filed.

FoEE has learned from DHR that funds have been allocated under Code of Virginia 10.1-2211.2 for restoration efforts at East End Cemetery, a historic African American cemetery located primarily in Henrico County. FoEE, the sole 501(c)(3) organization doing that restoration work, submitted an application for such funds to DHR in 2017 according to the process outlined at the time.

We learned from DHR in April 2018, once again through a FOIA, that a formal application procedure would be put in place. We received no notification that such a procedure or process had officially been established.

We write to OAG as an applicant for these state funds to ask under what terms and through what procedures will these funds be allocated?

Further, we ask that OAG not authorize or allow any disbursement of funds for East End Cemetery restoration by any agency of the Commonwealth of Virginia until all such terms and procedures have been disclosed publicly and all parties that have applied, including those such as FoEE that submitted applications under previous procedures, have had their applications openly reviewed.

We also request that before any awards are made that OAG offer the transparency on these matters that we have been denied by other state agencies. To obtain the most basic information, we have had to submit FOIA requests. As citizens of the Commonwealth, applicants to the state for funding originally approved for a "qualified charitable organization... whose primary purpose is the preservation of historical cemeteries and graves," and the de facto stewards of East End Cemetery since June 2013, we are entitled to fair, informed, and open consideration in this process.

We look forward to discussing this matter further with you.

USE OF FUNDS

Briefly describe the cemetery, its physical condition, types of markers, memorials, and monuments, and describe the scope of work for this state-funded project by answering the following questions.

Historic Evergreen Cemetery is a 60-acre parcel situated in the East End of Richmond, Virginia, and is the resting place for many of the city's notable African American leaders of the 19th and 20th centuries, including Maggie L. Walker, John Mitchell, Jr., and Dr. Sarah Garland Boyd Jones. Founded in 1891 by the Evergreen Cemetery Association, the cemetery served as one of the principal resting places for African Americans in Richmond through 1970. Beginning in 1970, the cemetery changed hands several times, entering a nearly fifty-year period of decline and neglect. Though the first organized volunteer clean-up efforts began in the mid-1970s, nearly one-sixth of the cemetery remains overgrown and in need of clearing, repair, and restoration.

There is a wide range of headstones, markers, memorials, and monuments at Evergreen. While most known headstones are granite or marble, others consist of concrete or slate. In the case of perhaps as many as half of the cemetery's interments, aluminum "courtesy markers," rather than headstones, mark grave sites. As a part of the restoration process, we seek to replace the courtesy markers, which were intended to be temporary, with proper headstones throughout the cemetery.

In nearly every instance, family plots and individual grave markers require repair, replacement, or restoration. Family plots were typically framed by concrete and can include inlaid ceramic tiles denoting the family name. Markers and monuments often feature delicate and elaborate iconography featuring symbols of fraternal organizations, vegetation, animals, and other symbols.

The Enrichmond Foundation has embarked on a multiyear restoration effort that will secure, preserve, and maintain Historic Evergreen Cemetery for future generations.

1. Is routine care and maintenance needed? What kind?

Yes. The roughly ten acres of Evergreen Cemetery that have been cleared by volunteers and Enrichmond staff require constant care and maintenance to maintain a manicured appearance and accessibility for families and visitors, and to prevent the return of undergrowth and invasive plants. From spring to fall, all grassy/cleared areas fall under a weekly rotation of mowing and weed trimming, demanding a significant, ongoing investment of time and labor.

As additional cemetery plots and sections are cleared by volunteer groups and Enrichmond staff, these areas are folded into the regular maintenance rotation, increasing demands on time, labor, and equipment.

In addition to regular maintenance of cleared areas, there is much work to be done in sections that have not yet been systematically cleared of undergrowth, debris, or brush. For example, there are hundreds of trees in the cemetery that require trimming or removal due to safety issues or deleterious effects to cemetery infrastructure, including gravestones and family plots.

Nearly 2.5 miles of accessways have been opened over the past year and, as a result, regular cleaning and trimming is required along these paths and roadways, to ensure visitor safety and accessibility. Erosion control continues to be a concern.

Finally, the cemetery's paths and roadways require constant maintenance and repair. Addressing drainage issues, erosion, and the persistent presence of potholes requires regular attention and resources.

2. Is restoration of monuments, grave markers needed? How do you intend to perform this work? Have you consulted DHR for guidance?

Yes. Nearly all of the monuments, grave markers, and existing infrastructure on the cemetery's sixty acres require restoration.

The Enrichmond Foundation formed a restoration Executive Planning and Review Team (ExPRT) comprising 25 descendant family members and institutional stakeholders. This advisory team is composed of 25 descendant family and key institutional stakeholders and began its monthly meetings in June 2018 at partner institution Virginia Union University. ExPRT members have helped to increase awareness of the restoration planning process, spark community volunteer participation onsite, and are inspiring other groups across the City of Richmond to work together to help honor long-marginalized public spaces and parks, especially those associated with African American historical memory. Members of the ExPRT include descendants of Evergreen and East End families, as well as longtime volunteer leaders who have championed the preservation and maintenance not only of Evergreen, but of adjacent East End Cemetery and nearby Paupers Cemetery located on Stony Run Parkway. The group is committed to expanding community involvement in and awareness of preservation needs of African American sacred places throughout the city and region. In September, the ExPRT adopted its vision and mission statements for a restored Evergreen Cemetery. Positioning Evergreen as a national treasure, the team defined its vision as seeking "to inspire present and future generations to honor the nation's African American cultural, historical, and spiritual inheritance." The team defined Evergreen's mission moving forward as striving "to reveal and celebrate African American cultural and spiritual experiences, legacies, and places through public programming." Community development, wellness, and equity are primary concerns of the ExPRT, and the seeds of sustainability are sown in the very fabric of the group itself, as members include leaders from the Black History Museum & Cultural Center of Virginia, Elegba Folklore Society, the African American Historical and Genealogical Society, the Maggie L. Walker National Historic Site, and Virginia Union University.

In October 2018, the ExPRT is facilitating nine Community Conversations in the City of Richmond concerning the restoration of Evergreen. The goal of the meetings is to increase awareness of the project, invite community members to share questions, ideas, and memories, and to spark greater volunteerism and involvement in maintenance, improvements, and wellness in and around Evergreen's East End community.

Results of the Community Conversations will then be presented by the ExPRT to a consultant planning team, which will then draw-up preliminary designs for Evergreen's restoration by February 2019. The preliminary designs will then be presented to the general public for comment and suggestions. The goal is to have a final restoration plan for Evergreen Cemetery in hand by June 2019, with Phase I of the restoration process commencing by Fall 2019.

The Virginia Department of Historic Resources (DHR) has been quite helpful in an advisory capacity and with drawing-up the Preliminary Information Form for Evergreen Cemetery in January 2017. We look forward to DHR guidance and involvement throughout the restoration planning and implementation phases.

3. Is erection of new markers, memorials, or monuments needed? Have you consulted DHR for guidance?

Yes. Restoration of Evergreen Cemetery will involve the repair of existing markers, memorials, and monuments, as well as the installation of new and replacement markers, memorials, and monuments. Again, The DHR has been quite helpful in an advisory capacity and with drawing-up the Preliminary Information Form

for Evergreen Cemetery in January 2017. We look forward to DHR guidance and involvement throughout the restoration planning and implementation phases.

In order to support the fiscally responsible administration of these funds, "certified statement" shall include the following:

CITIZENS' GUIDE TO CEMETERY MAINTENANCE

In general, DHR strongly recommends thorough documentation of the cemetery both BEFORE and AFTER any maintenance, repair, rehabilitation, or other work. This documentation can be useful to future caretakers, and may also be helpful with fundraising and increasing public awareness of your unique historic resource.

Vegetation Management:

- 1. <u>Ornamental and traditional plantings</u>: In Virginia, several plant and tree species were traditionally used as both ornaments and grave markers. We recommend taking care not to damage or remove the following species as they may have been purposefully planted by the family or community:
 - a. Trees: include willow, holly, magnolia, oak, cedar, dogwood.
 - b. Shrubs: include gardenia, camellia, sweetbush, boxwood, rose.
 - c. Plants: include flowering bulbs (daffodil, crocus), periwinkle/vinca, running cedar, yucca.
- 2. Mowing/trimming grass: Try to avoid using riding or deck mowers around monuments, fences and other cemetery features (these are difficult to control in tight spaces, and the blades can throw rocks or otherwise damage fragile headstones). Hand-trimming around monuments and fences is best when possible. If string trimmers are used, we recommend installing the lightest/softest cord available and keeping the head of the trimmer aimed at the ground and away from monuments, fences, etc. Try to keep grass clippings from accumulating on headstones wet or decomposing grass causes staining and biological growth that can be very difficult to remove.
- 3. <u>Trimming/pruning trees and shrubs</u>: Regular maintenance of trees and shrubs can prevent damage to headstones and other cemetery features. Removal of dying, dead, or unstable limbs before they can fall is recommended if this activity can be done safely. Pruning trees and shrubs away from headstones allows air to circulate, which can help to prevent mildew, moss, and other biological growth. Trees that show signs of disease, crown death, or other loss of stability should be assessed by a tree specialist to determine whether they pose a threat to headstones or graves. If trees must be removed this should be performed by a professional tree service. Stumps should be left in place, not pulled or otherwise removed. A stump grinder may be used if the stump is located away from monuments or other cemetery features. <u>NOTE</u>: grant funds cannot be used for tree removal.
- 4. <u>Climbing vine removal</u>: Vine species that <u>do not</u> attach themselves to monuments (honeysuckle, kudzu, etc.) can be removed by clipping at ground level and gently pulling away. Vine species that attach (including all species of ivy) should be clipped at the ground surface and again at about six inches up the stem, and then be allowed to die back completely. Once the vine has died back completely leaves dry, stems snap easily gently pull the vegetation away from the monument. If the vine does not easily release, leave it alone and try again in a few weeks.
- 5. <u>Herbicide use</u>: Broadcast herbicides (both sprays and granular forms) are generally not recommended as they can cause spalling or staining of monuments. To avoid damaging headstones and fences, herbicide can be painted onto the cut ends of removed vines, saplings, etc. with a small paintbrush to discourage regrowth. Be sure to read all directions and use safety gear.

Care of Existing Monuments:

- 1. <u>Conditions assessment</u>: When possible, a conditions assessment of all markers, fences, and other cemetery features is recommended. This should include both written and photographic documentation for future reference. Inscriptions should be recorded.
 - a. <u>Monuments</u>: Is the monument in place, leaning, or fallen? What is it made of? Is the inscription legible and can it be transcribed? Is there any visible damage to the monument and, if so, what kind/where? Is there any visible biological growth and, if so, what kind/where?
 - b. <u>Fences</u>: What is the fence made of? Is the fence in place, leaning, or fallen? Are portions missing? Does the fence enclose the entire cemetery? If not, how many monuments or other markers does the fence enclose? What is it made of? Is there any visible damage and, if so, what kind/where? Is

- there any visible biological growth and, if so, what kind/where?
- c. Walls and other enclosures: What type of wall/enclosure? Is it intact or damaged in any way? Does it enclose the entire cemetery? If not, how many monuments or other markers does it enclose? Is there any visible damage and, if so, what kind/where? Is there any visible biological growth and, if so, what kind/where?
- 2. <u>Basic cleaning</u>: The Department of Historic Resources recommends that monuments be cleaned with nothing stronger than clear running water and a soft, natural-bristle brush, using circular motions to avoid abrading the monument. If soiling or biological growth does not respond to this method, the Department strongly recommends contacting the Department or a conservation professional rather than utilizing any commercial cleaning products.
 - a. The black crust often visible on marble monuments cannot be effectively treated it is an environmental byproduct resulting from a chemical reaction between the marble and acid rain. Attempts to remove this crust will result in damage to the underlying stone.
 - b. Mosses may sometimes be removed by thoroughly wetting the accumulation and carefully peeling it away with a wooden or rubber spatula. If the moss does not easily come away, or if any evidence of stone damage is noted, do not attempt further removal.
 - c. Lichens grow beneath the surface of stone monuments and are extremely difficult to remove without damage to the underlying stone. If lichen removal is desirable the Department strongly recommends working with a conservation professional to prevent damage.
- 3. <u>Repairs</u>: The Department recommends working with a trained stonemason or monument company when monuments require repair. The use of mortar, epoxy, mastic, and other commercially-available adhesives is not recommended as repairs made using these materials are unreliable at best and may result in the monument failing in another location.
- 4. Resetting: Stone generally weighs between 150 and 175 pounds per cubic foot. This means that the average monument may outweigh the person attempting to reset it a recipe for considerable damage to both the stone and anyone around it. As a result, the Department recommends that leaning or fallen monuments be reset by a monument company or trained cemetery personnel.

Installation of New Monuments: Small modern markers that lie flat on the ground may be relatively easily installed by cemetery caretakers. The Department recommends that larger or upright monuments be installed by a monument company to avoid injury. <u>Note</u>: care should be taken to avoid excavation of more than a few inches as the depth of historic interments is notoriously unpredictable. Graves may be as shallow as 1.5 feet below modern ground surface.

Maintenance and Repair of Fences, Walls and Other Enclosures:

- Conditions assessment: As with monuments, this should include both written and photographic documentation.
- 2. <u>Treatment of decorative iron fencing</u>: Painted fencing that is generally in good condition can be treated where necessary with a commercial rust inhibitor and repainted. Unpainted fencing and fencing that is damaged or missing sections should be assessed and treated by a professional.
- 3. <u>In-kind repairs to stone, brick, and concrete walls and enclosures</u>: "In-kind" is replacement with materials matching that which already exists. Protective clothing and safety gear is recommended when working with stone and brick.
- 4. <u>In-kind repairs to wood and woven wire fencing</u>: Rotted or broken fenceposts should be replaced in the existing postholes. Additional excavation should be avoided.

Maintenance and Repair of Mauseoleums and Other Structures: Mausoleums, crypts, and other fully or partially aboveground funerary structures can be constructed of stone, brick, concrete, or a mixture of building materials. Repairs should be performed by or under the supervision of a mason. As these structures usually house human remains, the Department strongly recommends that efforts be made to contact the family or descendants and

request permission if the structure must be opened or dismantled in any fashion. DO NOT expose or disturb human remains without first contacting the Department. Installation of Wayfinding and Interpretive Signage: To avoid inadvertent disturbance of interments, the Department recommends installation of wayfinding and other signage along public paths and roadways only. If installation at or near gravesites is preferred, care should be taken. In-kind Repairs to Existing Paths, Roads, and Parking Areas: The Department recommends the use of same or similar surface treatments when repairing existing paths, roads, and parking areas.
